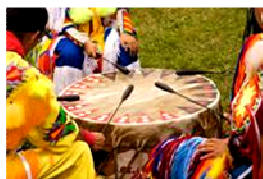
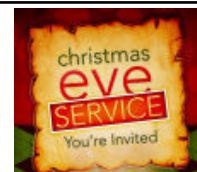

President's Message



Early in November, your board of trustees spent a Sunday afternoon on a retreat together. Rev. Gail presented material that will help us be clearer and more productive in our role as a board. We also spent time increasing our understanding of how to best recruit and support the many volunteers that are so vital to the life of our church community. Finally, we reviewed the wishes and suggestions that emerged during discussions at our "strengthening the tribe" all church luncheon on October 20. What follows is an overview of those wishes and suggestions which seemed to organize themselves around four general themes or goals.

First: to attract and keep young adults and their children.

Suggestions for achieving this goal:

Facebook, YouTube, Instagram, young representation in all Sunday services, youth oriented events before and after church, rename from "church" to "community", "fellowship", or "congregation", use our beautiful grounds for youth oriented activities and activities or events for children

Second: to grow our congregation:

Suggestions for achieving this goal:

Make sure every Sunday service is conducted with visitors and newcomers in mind. Fewer hymns, more choir and more recorded music, ads in community publications.

Third: to have more visibility in the community.

Suggestions for achieving this goal:

Flyers about us to handout at community events, free concerts, drum circles, and other events.

Fourth: to become more financially solvent:

Suggestions for achieving this goal:

Attract members through advertising and through community events, apply for grants.

As I look over these goals and ideas I've come to realize that there is a larger mission or dream that informs all of them. In other words, why do we want to grow the congregation? The answer is that we want to achieve these goals in order to continue to be a viable and vibrant Unitarian Universalist church. We want to continue to be here and to be a liberal religious haven for ourselves and for the people we hope will find us in the future. We cherish our home church and our dream is that it will continue to thrive and prosper in the years to come.

We your Board of Trustees are grateful to those who participated at the all church luncheon for providing us a sense of what members of the congregation consider important goals for the future

You most probably have ideas to add to this discussion. Please feel free to see or call any board member and have that conversation. In addition, we plan to provide another forum opportunity during which we can continue to share our ideas and aspirations with each other.

Experiencing Holiday Colors



The primary colors we usually associate with the Christmas portion of our holiday season are green and red. Both of these colors likely have filtered down through the ancient Celtic Yule holiday. Some of these traditions likely also go back at least to the Roman holiday of Saturnalia where people brought greens into their homes during the winter. Finland and the Lapps likely also contributed to the mash up of colors and holiday customs we now experience.

However, I want to look at red and green and one other color - blue - that we don't usually associate with the positive aspects of holiday revelry from a little different perspective. Despite knowing intellectually that not everyone has great memories of holidays past or will necessarily be looking forward with great anticipation to the one coming up, most of us get caught up in the craze of over buying, over decorating, over eating and maybe over drinking and wonder why it just isn't working for us.

So let's think about those colors. Green is the color of the trees and wreaths but it is also the color associated with jealousy and envy and those are certainly emotions many of us feel at this time of year. We may think everyone has more money to spend than we do. We may assume that everyone has somewhere more exciting to go than we do. We may be envious of those who have the resources to get home for the holidays. When I talk to people about these kinds of things, I find the envy is often based on misconceptions.

When I think about red and the holidays, I go first to Santa's traditional suit, but we also associate red with anger and the holidays can cause a lot of us to get angry. A store can be out of something we want. Someone doesn't get us a present we think is comparable to the one we found for them. We can literally get angry from the stress of trying too hard to have a good time.

The color blue is often associated with being depressed or down. We have the blues we say. Holidays can be very painful experiences for lonely people and for those who are grieving the loss of a beloved. This is especially hard when it may be the first holiday without the loved one.

So my hope is that as we prepare for our Holiday Church decorating party, the Yule Ritual, Holiday Vespers and the holiday concert and all the holiday themed services coming up, we keep in mind that at every occasion someone is feeling green, red or blue and that we will have empathy and compassion for them at this season of joy, peace and good will. Don't max out your credit cards this season, max out your compassion.

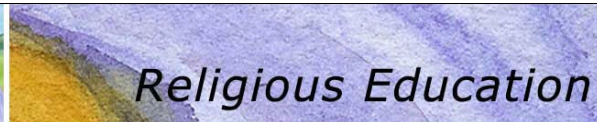

I am conflicted. I read the recent UU World magazine article that talked about how we need to not be just a place for folks to find an individual religious experience, but that we should be at the forefront of trying to make changes in the world. The article talked about how community for community's sake is not enough, and we need to make our church communities more responsible for the community at large. This was, of course, my interpretation of the article, which could be completely wrong, but that is how I read it. I found myself thinking "well, that is a good idea, but much of the time, many folks in our little community are just getting through the week". I am involved in doing mercy work, and I try to commit as much time as I can to justice work. Justice work is harder of course, because one often works really hard on projects only to see little or no result. Mercy work is easy; you give a hungry person food, and they are not hungry any more, at least not today. So, back to the UU World. I agree that we need to be out there doing more. The problem is, our community is made up of individuals, many of whom are in need of justice or mercy work themselves. Sometimes people really are looking for some sort of spiritual solace, awakening, or touch point. If you think about it, if each individual in the world was really living a totally moral, concerned life instead of the lives we actually do, the world would be pretty awesome. No more 99% vs 1%. Nice idea, but we are not there yet. So, I am imploring those of you who can, get more involved in both justice and mercy work, but, I am not sure that we can beat ourselves up because our folks are looking for an individual religious experience and a sense of community. I have been studying the Apostle Paul lately and when I read the article, I thought, "Hey, the UU World must have the Apostle Paul writing for them." Paul did not give a whit for the early Christians' individual faith experiences. He was concerned that everyone was behaving morally in his Christian communities, and that the focus was on the spreading of the good news. It was all about the community, not the individual. This may have been part of the reason Paul is such a figure of controversy. I get the feeling that he did not have a lot of friends!! Anyway, like I said, those of you who can, get out there. Work at the food bank, a local school or homeless shelter. Get involved in Bold Justice (I just met the new organizer for our church, Greer, and she is delightful), or one of the many things that Lore and Bob Bender are always finding for folks to do. Let us as individuals move our congregation toward the goal, as individuals, working together. But, if you come for the service, a meditation or the music, maybe that is ok too.

Sam Pacetti is one who brings it all together. A fingerstyle guitar wizard. A deft songwriter, capable of haunting depth and wry humor in the space of one song. An impassioned and ecstatic vocalist, as well as a mesmerizing live performer, seamlessly melding head-spinning guitar pyrotechnics and raw emotion into one breathtaking package. Tradition and innovation neatly balance in Sam Pacetti's music, the whole infused by a relentless intelligence intent on musical and philosophical synthesis. Martin Simpson, Richard Thompson, Joni Mitchell and Merle Travis are touchstones to Pacetti, and while there are strong elements of the American primitive school of guitar wizardry throughout his work, there is a powerful raw emotionality evident as well - an earthy sensuality more reminiscent of a Greg Brown or a red-dirt blues master than of a musical academician.



Brian Tate "plays the bass and he is a man of few words. But words don't take us where we need to go when it comes to the bass. Brian will take you there." Brian also curates the Tuesday night Downtown Jazz Series at The Corner.

These days it's hard to do something new with just an acoustic guitar, but that's what Michael Jordan is all about. Placing the instrument flat wise across his lap, he combines alternate tunings with tapping techniques and percussion on the body of the guitar creating sounds that defy the formal approach of playing the acoustic. His use of haunting harmonics and his unique voice, coupled with reflective heady lyrics, build a wall of sound like no other, at times giving the aura of a full band. During a performance, Michael will quite often switch between lap style and formal positioning of the guitar, providing a dynamic wide-ranging experience for viewers, spanning from blissfully beautiful to maniacal rants to catchy hooks. Whether he's street performing or playing a big stage be prepared to be amazed, shocked, uneasy and hugged at the same time.

**UUA President Peter Morales attends the 8th World Assembly of Religions for Peace:
 "Welcoming the Other"**

As I attend the Religions for Peace World Assembly in Vienna, I can't help but feel deep pride as a Unitarian Universalist. There are more than six hundred religious leaders here from all over the world—Muslims, Christians, Jews, Hindus, Buddhists and Sikhs. There are even smaller groups like Zoroastrians and Jains (at only four million). We UU's are probably the smallest group here—and yet we are in no small part responsible for the existence of this body. The first president of the UUA, Dana Greeley, played a critical role in the founding of this organization. Our Japanese partners, the Rissho Kosei-kai, were also part of founding Religions for Peace. It was a joy to see these good Japanese colleagues again and share a meal with them..



What is perhaps most striking at this conference is how easily and naturally all these people—from every part of the world and from virtually every religious group—can work together. These are leaders committed to making their religious traditions agents of peace and harmony in the world. They unanimously reject hatred and violence.

Once more I am impressed by how the great struggles in the world today are not really between different religions and cultures. The conflicts are among the reactionary elements of the world's religions and cultures. Progressive Jews, Muslims, Christians and others have learned how to draw upon their deep traditions and yet to also appreciate other traditions as well.

During the conference I served on a panel at a workshop dealing with education for peace. In my brief remarks I drew upon our own UU tradition, going back to Sophia Fahs and before, of pioneering the teaching about other religious traditions in a respectful way. I went on to add my own conviction that we need to move beyond the cognitive teaching about other faiths to an interpersonal and experiential encounter with other faiths in their cultural contexts. Our fledgling learning service efforts in the College of Social Justice is a fine example of this.

Religion, alas, is still used to justify unspeakable violence. Such violence makes news. Here in Vienna, a vital global effort that we UU's helped to create uses religion as a means to spread understanding, compassion and peace. Cooperation is quiet. Appreciative understanding is silent. They do not make big news. However, when we finally get to the point where the world has learned to live in harmony and peace, enlightened religious leaders like these good people here in Vienna will have done much to make such a world possible.

What a humbling privilege it is to be here as a representative of our faith.

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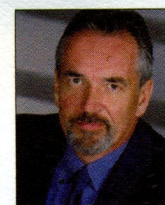

December 1 - Advent and Adventure - The season of Advent is about waiting and one thing we are always waiting for is to see the next adventure life will bring us. Rev. Gail will reflect on what an adventure really is and how one can change us completely. Alfredo Tamburrino will be gracing us with his skills on the flute.

December 8 - Good Will and Blessings to All - Rev. Gail will look at two of the terms often associated with this season. Along with peace on earth, the concept of good will to all humans is found in the Gospel of Luke. "God, bless us every one" is the phrase attributed to Tiny Tim in Dickens' "A Christmas Carol." We surely can't love everyone or even like everyone but can we have good will toward everyone and bless them?

December 15 - Holiday Service The young people in our Religious Education program along with our Director of Religious Education, Susan Friend, will present a memorable service of cheer and merriment for the holiday season

December 22 - Old, Old, Old Christmas - Rev. Gail and her friend and colleague, John Ross will look at some of the extremely ancient legends and traditions that appear in some of the symbols and stories of the Christmas season. Learn about the contributions of ancient shamans, Zoroastrians and others that underlie the stories we think we know.
