Mulling Over Holiday Memories

As most of you know I was never a very traditional person. This started in childhood when I was never interested in dolls. Baby dolls were particularly uninteresting to me and even the more adult dolls generally did not attract me a lot. But one year when I was nine, I fell in love with a doll. It was a doll with lots of very very long red hair. It was a Madame Alexander doll which meant that it was a very dressed up and lady like doll with very fine features. It was love at first sight. I think I wanted to be that doll. I loved red hair and was always drawn to people in the movies with red hair. I think perhaps because it was differentnot ordinary and was so noticeable. I always loved Lucille Ball and her bright hair. Anyway I wanted that doll. I had to have that doll. I drove



my parents crazy. It was not really a doll they could easily afford. I promised that I would forgo all other Christmas and Birthday presents practically for life if I could have that doll now. I made my father go with me to look at the doll every day. Eventually, I think he fell in love with the doll too. She was quite a charmer. They kept insisting it was not going to happen but I had faith. I knew that my father especially liked to make me happy. I knew we had relatives of some means who might be pressed into helping purchase that doll given that it had given the family hope that I might grow up to be a regular girl after all. They had been worried as in past years I had asked for guns, bows and arrows, electric trains and tools sets. I don't know if they even thought about the possibility that I might be gay but they were puzzled and I was constantly being told "You can't do that, you are a girl." So my interest in "the doll" was something that everyone was excited about.

Christmas Eve came. I was sort of aware of the Santa reality but still felt the holiday was magical. I went to bed early but woke about 3:00 a.m. and there under our tiny tree (tiny because we lived in a small apartment) was "the red headed doll". I grabbed and admired her and started to talk to and sing to her. Now I have the worst singing voice in the world so my parents woke up and told me to cease and desist. I sat up all night and admired my new doll. I kept her for years. She cost my

parents a fortune. We spent more money on her clothes than we did on mine. To this day I don't know why the "red headed glamour doll" hooked me so much. I didn't really play with her. It was more like she was a ritual object or meditation tool. But it is my favorite Christmas memory from childhood. It was a family legend that got exaggerated by later generations. Younger relatives even know about the Christmas when I sat up all night getting acquainted with the red headed doll.

I know not everyone had happy Christmas memories from childhood but I hope all of you got something once as a gift that made you as happy as my glamour doll made me. If you didn't, let this be the year you indulge yourself in something that does. Novelist Tom Robbins says, " It is never too late to have a happy childhood." What better time of the year to address that issue. In the hope we can all share some childish fun this season.

Jan 25 Thandeka – Unitarian Universalist Theology of Personal Experience


The cost for all four sessions will be \$20 or \$6 per class. Join us for some exploration in the new year. *Rev. Gail*

UUCFL Finance Notes

As we approach the end of the financial year, completing your pledge for 2010 is most important. If you have not yet fully funded your 2010 pledge, please do so now. Your continued contribution in this last month of the year will save us from unnecessary financial stress and help us start next year strong. Funds not



utilized this year will be used to build operational reserves. These reserves will serve as a cushion of a few months worth of operating expenses. Think of it as the 'emergency funds' of three to six months income that financial advisors recommend we maintain in our personal/family account to help guard against unexpected loss of income and alleviate the stress of

living paycheck to paycheck.

Another key part of a good financial plan is developing a realistic budget (and then sticking to it). A good budget for the church would meet community needs within the financial resources available. The congregational budget workshop on Sunday December 12 at 12:45 pm is your opportunity to participate in this process.



Doug could out-ballad Bobby Helms if he wanted to, but he's content keeping his vocals minimal, understated behind Telishia's voice, which sounds like a polished Kitty Wells, cooing heartfelt ballads with an unassuming downhome charm." - Metro Pulse, Knoxville, TN

Year-End Charitable Giving: Consider UUCFL

As we approach the end of the calendar year, there may be an opportunity for you to lower your 2010 income tax bill through a charitable gift to UUCFL. How much depends on your tax bracket and other factors. However, making a gift is more than just smart tax planning... it's an opportunity to make a difference in our community.

There are a number of ways to accomplish a gift that not only decreases your tax bill, but can dramatically make a difference to UUCFL and its mission. Of course you can always give a cash donation, which allows a deduction of up to 50% of your adjusted gross income. If you give more than 50% of what you make, you can carry forward the excess over the next 5 years.

A gift of appreciated stocks, bonds or mutual funds from your portfolio to UUCFL has some unique advantages to you and is regarded as an extremely efficient method of gifting. The tax savings to you are two-fold. First, you get to avoid the capital gains on the appreciated securities. Second, you receive an income tax deduction for the full fair market value of the securities at the time of the gift. Securities should generally be owned for more than a year to qualify for the tax advantages. Gifts must be made before December 31st and in the case of mutual funds, which are typically not immediately transferable, you would want to make the gift far enough in advance before December 31st to allow time for processing.

Life insurance gifts allow donors who no longer need the insurance policy to take advantage of a charitable deduction. A paid-up policy allows the donor a deduction equal to the replacement value of the policy or the total amount of premiums paid into the policy (the "basis"). If you are considering a donation of life insurance, the charitable organization needs to be named as the owner and beneficiary of the policy, it must be done before December 31st and it must be irrevocable.

More complex gifting strategies include life income gifts, where a piece of property or an investment account (for example) are donated to a qualified charitable organization. The donor continues to enjoy the use of the property or an income stream during their lifetime and gets a nice tax deduction for the charitable gift. Upon the death of the donor, the charity then receives the unrestricted remainder of the gift.

Donors should consult with their tax and financial advisors, as well as the non-profit organization before making a gift.

Charitable giving is an essential part to our own personal financial planning. However the primary motivation is always the intent to make our world a better place. And what better way is there than a gift to UUCFL?
