



President's Message



I was never one for New Year's resolutions. A 2007 study by Richard Wiseman from the University of Bristol involving 3,000 people showed that 88% of those who set New Year resolutions fail, despite the fact that 52% of the study's participants were confident of success at the beginning (I got this from Wikipedia!). There are many reasons noted for failing to keep resolutions, including unrealistic goals, inconsistent record keeping, making too many resolutions, or just plain forgetting to follow through! In other words, we are human, and life (including the expected and unexpected) gets in the way sometimes.

In researching more about resolutions, I found out that making resolutions has a religious history. Also from Wikipedia: "Babylonians made promises to their gods at the start of each year that they would return borrowed objects and pay their debts. The Romans began each year by making promises to the god Janus, for whom the month of January is named. In the Medieval era, knights took the "peacock vow" at the end of the Christmas season each year to re-affirm their commitment to chivalry.

At watchnight services, many Christians prepare for the year ahead by praying and making resolutions." So really, a resolution in the past was a promise (sometimes to a deity) to do what's right.

As we embark on a new political reality this January, I thought it might be apropos to choose one of our principles, and promise (to ourselves and any higher power we recognize) to commit to transforming that principle's words into deeds. Our second principle is "Justice, equity and compassion in human relations." I think we need this concept now more than ever. How would you put this principle into practice?

Our Expanding UU Family - Combining Energies

Dear Members of the UUCFL,

On November 27th, 2016, the Unitarian Fellowship of South Florida voted to merge with UUCFL.

This decision was made by the small 12-person membership of the Fellowship.

The Fellowship was formed in November of 1961 by Dr. John J. Latini, originally named the North Dade Unitarian Universalist Fellowship which met in North Miami Beach. After a few name changes, we moved to Hollywood and settled on the name Unitarian Fellowship of South Florida in 1973.

The Fellowship has been lay-led since 1999, when the former Minister, Rev. Rel Davis, resigned and relocated with the Peace Corps. Our services have been primarily eclectic in nature with a strong dose of philosophical and earth-based spirituality. Regular classes of Yoga, Drumming & Eclectic Mind Shoppe have been meeting throughout the month.



Starting in January, the Eclectic Mind Shoppe will begin meeting at 1 PM on Sundays in the UUCFL Multi-Purpose room. Yoga and Drumming should begin meeting at the church once the Fellowship building has been sold. Over the past four months, we have been working with Rev. Susan, Pres. Jim Giblin and the Board to bridge the merger with UUCFL. In February, the UUCFL will vote on acceptance of the merger.

Much of the reason this decision has been made is that many of the Fellowship members regularly attend CUUPS on Thursdays. My husband Marty and I took over leadership of this group in June of 2014. After much consideration we decided that it was best to pool our resources and focus on supporting one church vs. splitting our time between the two.

We are looking forward to becoming part of the UUCFL family and getting to know everyone on a more personal level. The Fellowship will be going on hiatus for January and most of our members will be attending UUCFL services to help with getting to know each other.

It's been a long wild ride for some of us, being a small island unto ourselves for the past 17 years. We are overdue for some serious change. To quote Andy Warhol, "They always say time changes things, but you actually have to change them yourself."

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Rev. Susan's Space

We are living in divided times that challenge us to remember the old Unitarian adage that "we need not think alike to love alike." Many people are disoriented to find how differently they think from even those who are very near and dear to them. As Unitarian Universalists, I hope that we have an advantage on the majority of folks because we should be familiar with building the just and loving community in the midst of profound disagreement. These days are an opportunity for us to walk our talk and share our saving message of unity within diversity.



The work that we are doing on our UUCFL visioning process is extremely timely. I hope you will participate fully. First, we will hold two sessions to determine the **Shared Values** upon which we will build our new vision for UUCFL. Through an exercise called "Experience of the Holy," we will begin with our own deeply held religious values and engage in fascinating conversations to form consensus. Please attend one of two sessions – Wed., Jan. 18 from 7 to 9 pm or Sat., Jan. 21 10 am to noon.


Next, we will ask "Who Are We? Who Are They?" We'll examine some very special **Demographic Studies** about the community that we serve as well as what we know about ourselves on Mon., Jan 30 from 7 to 9 pm. These special studies for congregations tell us about what is important personally and in social justice to those around us and help us find those who are strongly inclined to be Unitarian Universalists.

Finally, in early February, those of us who are holding anger and grief from times of conflict and controversy at UUCFL will have an opportunity to engage in facilitated **Listening Circles**. Rev. Phil Schulman who is a highly-trained facilitator of Compassionate Conversations and Nonviolent Communication will lead conversations on Sat., Feb. 4 from 3 to 5 pm and Mon., Feb. 6 from 7 to 9 pm. This will help us to process the strong emotions that emerged during the timeline exercise and will be open to past as well as present members of our community. There are limited spaces available, so participate if you have need but not if you are merely curious. Rev. Phil will preach on Sunday, Feb. 5, and everyone can learn about this work then.

But it's not all work during January. There are lots of new opportunities for fun and fellowship, too. Elsewhere in the newsletter, you can read about the proposed merger between our congregation and the Unitarian Fellowship of South Florida. To get started, we will be having an **Adult Religious Education** hour at 1 pm every Sunday beginning January 1 with the Eclectic Mindshoppe metaphysical studies sessions, spiritual crafting workshops and guided meditation and healing circles. Also, starting January 2, UUCFL Member Victoria Abbott will be leading yoga classes each Monday from 6:30 until 8 pm.

Spiritual work in difficult times is challenging. I recommend that you feed your soul and spirit by participating in opportunities for growth, healing and recreation at every opportunity. Some of Rev Susan's January sermons are based on


