

If you attended the annual budget meeting on Sunday – thank you for your participation. If you attended a financial meeting prior to the congregational meeting on Sunday – thank you for helping the Finance Committee and Board of Trustees formalize a sound proposed budget.

I love the above quote by one of my favorite philosophers, Marcus Aurelius. I'll take liberty with this particular quote and restate it as, "What's good for the bee-hive is good for the bee". This quote reminds me of how together we are united for the benefit of each one of us. If your life was so busy so that you could not attend the budget meetings let alone had time to review the proposed budget, you know that many church members were involved with the process. We got each other's back.

The meeting structure on Sunday was a huge change from prior congregational budget meetings. The Board and I decided to allow the congregation to learn about our financial challenges and to have input about decisions *before* the congregational meeting. Finance committee meetings were open to everyone, workshops were set-up, and letters with proposed budgets were mailed to each voting member. Presenting one budget at the meeting, I feel, acknowledges the value of church leadership's role and honors the personal time of church members who attend the congregational budget meeting to vote.

My skills in Roberts Rules to Order could use brushing up-on, so I appreciated the assistance of our acting Parliamentarian and for the patience and assistance from the attendees. I will say that the experience of facilitating the budget meeting was nerve racking. I apologize to anyone who may have felt that they were not given enough time to express themselves at the meeting. My intentions were to honor the democratic process and to proceed as the majority ruled. The process works.

Lauding Leadership

The January church budget meeting this year and all that led up to it marked a distinct and I think excellent change in the UUCFL culture. Seeing things handled differently than they have been in the past can often be confusing for people even if we fundamentally agree with the new process. I only heard one or two expressions of concern about the way the budget process and Mission process were handled but even people who were thrilled with our short and efficient yearly budget meeting seemed to feel a tad confused.

I have been to church budget meetings at a number of larger and healthy churches over the years and they are usually very similar to the one we just had. This year the Board decided to really exercise leadership by developing a fiscally responsible budget and presenting one budget to the congregation for final approval.

However, the process leading up to this with open Finance Committee meetings, an after church Budget Workshop and even mailing a copy of the budget ahead of time to all pledging members gave everyone more and earlier access to the church's financial situation than ever before. Finance Committee members and board members were then open to answering questions and incorporating concerns. I think the process had plenty of opportunities for any dissenting opinions and we were then able to have an efficient congregational meeting. I hope that future boards and finance committees will choose to follow this excellent precedent. While the congregation always has final say on big decisions, leaders are elected to lead and spend time on an issue and make recommendations in the best interest of the community as a whole. This year I think they truly did this most effectively. No matter what budget or anything else is ever proposed in a group setting, there will always be some people who disagree. The best forums for disagreements to be expressed are committee or board meetings prior to a full congregational meeting.

I would also like to mention that every income item on this church or any church and most business budgets is always open to change. Pledging members move or die or leave the church. Interest rates vary quarter by quarter. Renters can always leave or be added. The only money we ever know for sure we have is the money in our capital funds and the equity in our building and grounds. Everything else is a moving target and essentially represents a hoped-for best-guess outcome. The economic outlook in our state and the country and the world continues to be precarious and I feel our community is behaving in a responsible fashion in a difficult situation.

The best way we can work to continue to improve our financial sustainability is to provide great services and activities for members, friends and potential members and to be warm and friendly to all those who enter our doors. At the moment all the feedback coming to membership indicates we are doing well at making most of our visitors feel welcome. May our community continue to be a haven for many.

First the folks who agreed to be the BOLD Justice team leaders will meet after church on Sunday February 5 to plan a strategy for turning our membership out for the big events. On March 22 there will be a big rally with all the BOLD Justice churches to prepare us for the Nehemiah Action on April 26 -times and locations to be announced. Both of these events happen on a Thursday evening so mark your calendars now. At the April 26 meeting we want to have as many church members as possible in attendance as we will be bringing in important local officials to hold them directly accountable for moving in positive directions on educational and employment issues.

Prophetic Imperative Class Coming



Starting on Feb. 23 and running for 4 Thursday sessions, we will be offering a course on the prophetic traditions in Christianity and Unitarian Universalism. This will be a follow up to our fall class that

focused mainly on various Hebrew prophets. This class will look primarily at the Gospel of Luke in the Christian scriptures and at the work of UU theologian James Luther Adams and UU minister Rev. Richard Gilbert. One of the main goals of this class is to help us understand the spiritual and historical imperative for the kind of work we are doing with Bold Justice. The class will run from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. and the cost will be \$25.00 or \$8 per session.

Going back to January 8, Susan Moss presented a sermon on "Do the Right Thing" based on a song by Nick Annis, guest soloist of the day. Nick's contemporary songs, half rap and half vocal with guitar accompaniment were well received. The consensus of the congregation after this service was that Susan has a new profession she could pursue - preaching from the pulpit!

February 5 will feature country music with a possible guest appearance. The 12th will be a choir Sunday with a Valentine theme as we present "But Beautiful" which was popular in the 1940's and was arranged for choir in 1994. Are you old enough to remember "Love is funny, or it's sad; or it's quiet, or it's mad; it's a good thing or it's bad; but beautiful etc."?

Choir will be with us on February 26 but the anthem is soon to be determined. You will have to attend to hear what was chosen. The choir continues to fill the "loft" and we thank them for their faithful attendance at Wednesday and Sunday morning rehearsals. They do make a joyful noise thanks to Susan Friend's direction and choice of music.

Labyrinth Café Concerts Presents: Gurf Morlix/Sam Baker - February 11 at 7:30pm



Tempting as it may be, don't just judge Gurf Morlix by the company he keeps, even if it does provide a fine starting point: eminent musical artists like Lucinda Williams, Ray Wylie Hubbard, Warren Zevon, Patty Griffin, Robert Earl Keen, Buddy Miller, Mary Gauthier, Tom Russell, Jim Lauderdale and Slaid Cleaves, to name but a few. As critic Henry Cabot Beck notes on Amazon.com, "If anybody is still looking for a candidate to replace Robbie Robertson in The Band, look no further. Morlix can write, sing, produce, and play nearly every instrument (mostly stringed) and has a bottomless (albeit muddy) range of American musical idioms from which to draw." Through more than four decades of professional music endeavors, Morlix has distinguished himself with his innate musicality, exquisite taste, keen creative instincts, and well-honed ear for not only songwriting but also the elements that bring songs to their fullest fruition.

Sam Baker's is a hard-hewn grace, transcendentally wrought with grit, brutally chiaroscuroed by a weary deliverance sought in common lives. Persistent in Baker's vision is an empathetic evocation of treading life's stilled waters, beauty welled in the dirt of daily endurance. His characters, drawn with the insight of Townes Van Zandt and John Prine, toil unglamorously, overlooked save for Baker's rough, sing-talk psalms giving them fitting voice. His songs are closely observed narratives of eccentric and marginalized people finding meaning in seemingly defeated lives--almost like Leonard Cohen's, if Cohen had been a Baptist raised in west Texas. There is tenderness and vulnerability in Baker's songs, perhaps a product of his own nearly-wasted life. An adventurer of sorts, he was almost killed when the Shining Path Maoist guerrillas blew up a train he was riding in Peru in 1986. Not your usual songwriter bio.

In Memoriam: Shirley Braunstein

On Thursday, January 5, 2012, long-time congregant, Shirley Ann Braunstein, passed away after a long period of illness.

Only two days later, we pulled together as a congregation and produced a memorial for Shirley that I think did our friend, her family, and our church proud. We came in droves on a Saturday night welcoming Shirley's old friends from River of Grass and family. Remembrances and feelings that Rev. Gail, friends, and family expressed from the pulpit brought acknowledging nods, laughter, tears, and an occasional nervous cough.

Music meant a lot to Shirley. In September, she and I had a great time going through her CDs and some of mine and identifying music for her memorial. At the memorial, we all got to sample Shirley's eclectic taste in recorded music from Bach's "Air for G String" to showtunes, "Amazing Grace" on bagpipes--a nod to Shirley's proud Scottish heritage, and a "Dueling Banjos" finale that had everyone clapping along. Shirley, Dot Muise, and Cam Enright had been the three amigas.

At the memorial, Dot deftly played Shirley's favorite Scott Joplin tune "Peacherine Rag" on piano. We sang along with Shirley's hospice chaplain and folk singer Rev. Amy Carol Webb's rousing rendition of Leonard Cohen's "Halleluja". From our hymnals, we sang one of Shirley's favorites--"Abide with Me".

Thanks so much Rev. Gail, Rev. Amy Carol Webb, and all you others who contributed to making Shirley's memorial wonderful. Thanks also to all those who chipped in for Shirley's plaque on our memorial garden wall. We've raised about 2/3 of the funds so far; if you would like to contribute, please write a check to UUCFL Endowment and mention Shirley's plaque in the note field. Finally, thank you, Shirley, for being a dear and true friend to me and many others and for years of service to UUCFL's choir and Building and Grounds committee.
