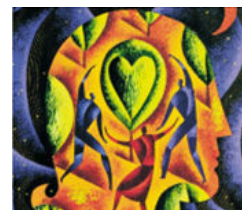

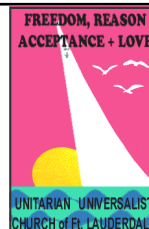

President's Message

"Illness is the night side of life, a more onerous citizenship. Everyone who is born holds dual citizenship, in the kingdom of the well and in the kingdom of the sick. Although we all prefer to use the good passport, sooner or later each of us is obliged, at least for a spell, to identify ourselves as citizens of that other place." – Susan Sontag, Illness as Metaphor

As a Unitarian Universalist, I feel all seven of our principles are the backbone of our faith, but I find myself particularly drawn to the seventh principle, which is "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part." To me, this means that everything is connected, and everything has some effect on everything else. Most of all, lessons learned can come at the most unexpected times and places.

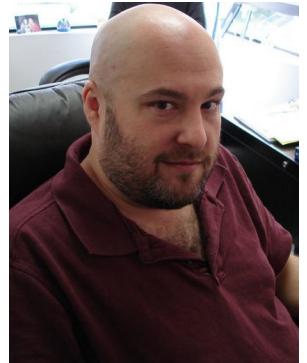
For the past three months, I have been blindsided by illness. I have had to reduce my workload to concentrate on hospital stays, doctor visits, endless testing, blood draws, biopsies and innumerable phone calls. The process of being sick can be as exhausting as illness itself.

At the onset of my illness, unexpected advice from an unexpected source informed me that "...it may not seem so now, but you have been given a gift. Learn what you need from the experience." Understandably, I was skeptical. What could this curve ball to my existence possibly show me?

As it has turned out, the lessons have been many and powerful. I've learned that illness can be conquered. I've learned that everything I do has an impact on both my illness and wellness. I've learned to advocate for myself. I've learned that my church family truly cares about my well-being. I've learned first-hand that our friends and church family can make things better. I've learned that I am loved. And aren't those lessons worth the challenge of an illness?

Rev. Susan's Space

Unitarian Universalism is both very old and pretty new as a religion. In one way of looking at it, our Unitarian ancestors go back to the mid-16th century in Romania, Poland and Lithuania or even further back to the Council of Nicea in 325 CE. (We lost that vote.) On our Universalist side, we go back to the Spanish theologian Michael Servetus in the 16th century or the 2nd Council of Constantinople in 553 CE. (We lost that vote, too.) However, we could also argue that modern Unitarian Universalism is a 20th century religion started in 1961 with the merger of Unitarians and Universalism in the U.S. (And, it is no coincidence that the beginning of Post-Modernism with its support of "individual truths" vs. "The Truth" is also said to be 1961.)



I'm proud of the assorted theologians, heretics and martyrs in our past, but I am more or less obsessed with the unique experience of being part of a new religion. I've watched for more than three decades as we've tried to figure out who we are, what we believe and how our faith is practiced. Some things are very certain, but in some areas we have some noticeable gaps. I believe that one of the most unfortunate of those is that we lack a regular cycle of forgiveness and reconciliation such as you will find on a yearly, weekly or even daily basis in other religions. They teach us that human community and individual hearts and souls are not meant to carry grudges and regrets in perpetuity. We need a way to put the past in the past, to ask and offer forgiveness and to make a fresh start. Luckily, as Unitarian Universalists, it is in our power to learn from our elders and create our own rituals.



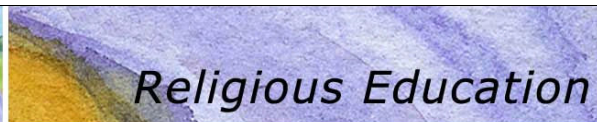
As the Jewish faith goes through their High Holy Days in early October, we will take inspiration from them. We will not imitate them, but we will delve into the symbolism of their observances in a contemporary way that is appropriate for both children and adults and wide variety of belief systems. A major motif of the Jewish New Year of Rosh Hashanah is turning, and I hope that you will turn toward or away depending on your personal needs as we reflect that life is both tart and sweet. In Judaism, the days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are a time for the members of the congregation to be reconciled one to another so that they can ultimately be reconciled with God as a healthy and whole community. I hope that you will take advantage of this opportunity to unburden your heart whether there is something that you need to forgive or some forgiveness that you might seek.

I'm here as a "developmental minister" which means I came here because you had real work that you wanted to do to revitalize your church. You have accomplished many things on your preliminary long-range plan which included bringing me here. Now, we need to continue this work as I discussed in our last newsletter.

Please plan to attend and to encourage others to attend our next visioning event "Looking Backward to Move Forward" which will be an exploration of our history as a congregation on Saturday, October 22 at 6:30 pm. This will be invaluable for me (and other newcomers). The bigger the turnout, the better the result.

Change comes to us in many ways, in different guises, and it can be welcomed with open arms or rejected with a vengeance. Change is hard even when we know we need it. The ultimate change, when we lose someone that means a great deal to us, especially when it is unexpected, is one of the hardest to endure. We are angry; we are sad; we want to crawl into bed and weep and sniffle and be left alone. Sometimes we drink a few too many glasses of wine in an attempt to feel better. As we go through our day, as long as we keep busy, we are sort of ok, but then, when a quiet moment comes, we go back to thinking, grieving, and drinking. As time goes on, most of us will start to rise back to the surface, slowly, and begin to feel good again. It takes longer for others, and some sort of help may be needed, whether with a therapist, a medication, or a combination. Experiencing this kind of change can give us a roadmap perhaps for dealing with other types of change. It is ok to be sad about changes that are uncomfortable for us, but ultimately acknowledging that we too will get through this, and perhaps, just maybe, there may be light at the end of the tunnel. What can be unsettling as well, is when others seem to be delighted with the changes, while we feel nervous, scared, and really unhappy. We never know what the future holds, so that change that frightens us now - the unexpected death, the sudden loss of job - whatever it is, know that we CAN come out on the other side, wiser, and ready to embrace the new. As we head into the holiday season, if any of you have friends or family that you have an uncomfortable relationship with, I encourage you to use the excuse of the holidays to reach out and try and repair, or at least renew. You never know what the next minute in your life may bring, but know that we can be sure that change will be part of it.

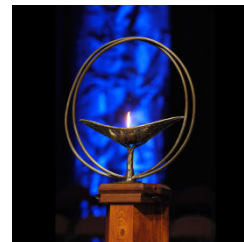
**Name Tags –**

Labyrinth Café ConcertS Presents Tracy Grammer - Saturday October 8 at 7:30pm

Tracy Grammer rose to acclaim as half of the "postmodern, mythic American folk" duo, Dave Carter & Tracy Grammer. From 1998-2001, the duo released three internationally celebrated, folk chart-topping albums featuring Carter's mytho-poetic Americana songcraft and in 2002, toured with Joan Baez, both as featured artists and Baez's band members.



Called "the new voice of modern folk music," the duo was clearly in its ascendancy when in July 2002, Carter suffered a fatal heart attack while the duo was on tour. He was 49; Grammer, 34.

Grammer has become one of folk music's most beloved artists. Renowned for her springwater-clear alto, perfectly intoned violin, and guitar playing that is by turns percussive and delicate, Grammer is also a masterful storyteller with an ease and charisma on stage -- not to mention a riotous sense of humor -- that hardly belie her modest beginnings as Carter's reclusive accompanist. Stories about the duo's first meeting, Carter's quirks and fancies, or Grammer's own misadventures and missteps are woven thoughtfully into the set list to create a uniquely personal evening that connects audiences to performer, to the Carter/Grammer legacy, and most importantly, to one another. Additionally, Grammer has begun down the songwriter's path as part of RealWomenRealSongs, and is sharing her fresh, fledgling efforts -- and the stories behind them -- on her current tour, to the delight of her longtime fans. As one fan put it, "With Tracy, it's never just about the music. It's a soul journey."

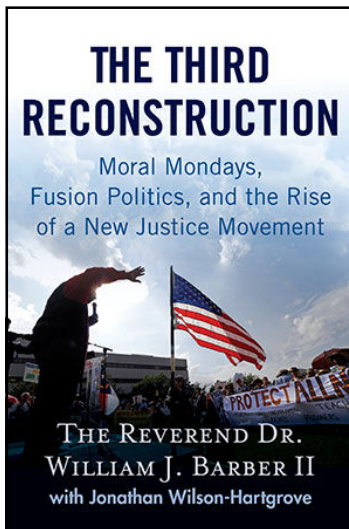

UUA Common Read: The Third Reconstruction

The Third Reconstruction: Moral Mondays, Fusion Politics, and the Rise of a New Justice Movement, by the Rev. Dr. William Barber II and Jonathan Wilson-Hartgrove (Beacon Press, 2016), is the 2016-2017 Unitarian Universalist Common Read. UUs were electrified at General Assembly 2016 by Rev. Barber's call for building and sustaining a movement for justice for all people. The Third Reconstruction offers helpful, practical guidance for engaging with justice movements born in response to local experiences of larger injustices. Congregations, groups, and individuals may purchase the book or find it in a public library and begin reading. A paperback edition will be available for purchase at inSpirit: The UU Book and Gift Shop (uuabookstore.org) in late September; bulk discounts for both hard cover and paperback are available. 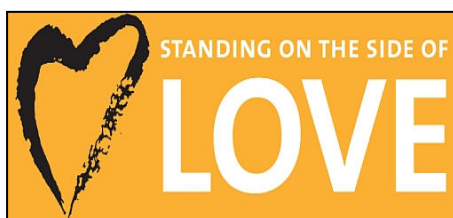

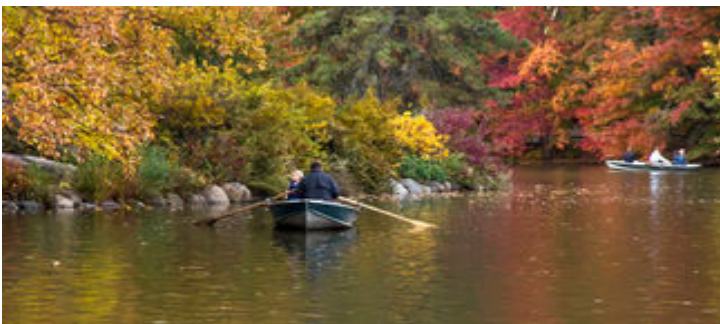
