### LOOKING BACK TO THE FUTURE

The New Year is always a time for looking back and evaluating where we have come in the last year and developing some fantasies and plans for where we hope the new year will take us. It has been an interesting year for our church. We have lost some longtime members and gained many new members. We have gone through two cycles of Wisdom Wednesdays which have been a great learning and community building experience for many of us. We have enjoyed many celebrations together, pulled off another successful Empty Bowl project, seen the rise of a great teen group, and added a new men's group and the UU Sisterhood to our available program offerings. The Young Minds in Fellowship group has had potluck and movie nights. We have a new regular music program, The Labyrinth Cafe, that is bringing great folk music to our community and attracting some new members to our church. We have a very good religious education program for our children and have developed our own curriculum based on a UU 7 Principle City. We had the very successful Culture Camp here this summer. Our choir is growing again after a slow period. We have a Jazz concert and Chamber concert coming up.

Our Endowment Committee has given out some grants that will help us tighten up our membership system and enhance or audiovisual programs. We have hosted events like the Hemlock Society and the Starhawk presentation on the Free Trade Agreement of the Americas meetings. Many people are graciously increasing their pledges to support our community financially in the coming year. Our NPR campaign is on the air. We have reasons to be proud.

We also face new challenges. Our long time tenant Congregation Etz Chaim will be leaving us early this year which will have a financial impact on us. Our national consultant Dave Richard has laid out some challenges for us and some goals we need to meet before we proceed with a capital campaign to expand our facilities. We are hoping to start the much touted Covenant group program this year also.

I feel certain that when we look back a year from now, we will find that we have met many of these challenges and have much more to look back on with pride. Church life is not easy but every week we are here we save someone's life quite literally, and that is really what this whole enterprise is all about. We are not a business. We are here to serve people and help each other get through life when things are difficult. Blessings on our on-going struggle for a kinder and more just world.

**COMMUNITY OUTREACH LIVES**

Although Community Outreach is currently functioning on a task force basis rather than as a traditional committee there is still a lot going on. Mr. Y, Barbara Steele, a new member, and Rev. Gail are still meeting regularly with the other members of the Broward Coalition to Eliminate Hunger to plan for Empty Bowls 2004 on April 1, 2004, and to coordinate other aspects of the grant. There is even a possibility for some new grant money from the National Faith in Action project which would pay for a coordinator to help turn this into a much bigger program.

Our plan to be a part of the Interfaith Hospitality Network of the Broward Coalition for the Homeless is being coordinated by Sandy Harris with help from Barbara Steele, Judy Knopp and others.

Judy has agreed to be our point person on women's issues and will send out occasional alerts on things to write or call your elected officials about. Susan Moss is active in NOW and is also a good resource.

Sandy is also our point person for issues involving civil liberties and the expansion of the living wage campaign.

In addition, we will be working with Denominational Affairs to keep you informed about national UUA issues like Globalization and the new Study Action issue on Prison Reform. We are planning a guest speaker and discussion forum on that issue this spring. We will also continue to provide you with options for personal action such as the postcards from Amnesty International on the Florida Death Penalty. Let us know about the personal social justice, political action and charitable work that you are involved in, and we can list you as a point person for others to network with. We have numerous Sunday Services scheduled this spring on social justice issues.



**Board Minutes**

The Board of Trustees of the UUCFL met on December 1, 2003. Below is a synopsis of business discussed:

The Treasurer reports that pledges are doing very well for the year but that building rental income is lower than budgeted. The Service Auction was a success bringing in over \$3,200. Expenses overall remain relatively in line with some exceptions. The deficit that was expected this year was mostly alleviated by a loan repayment from River of Grass of \$10,000. Ronnie cautioned the board that this is a one-time payment and to not expect that kind of a bail out in 2004.

The Minister, though unable to attend the Board meeting, reports through e-mail that the Wisdom Wednesday program has been very successful. She continues various pastoral care and social justice activities. Attendance has been bouncing back.

Although the R E Director was unable to attend the Board meeting, Ronnie reports that attendance has been exceptional.

Ronnie, Sara and Jim have begun to do some work on Membership. Ronnie and Jim ran an orientation for interested visitors on November 23<sup>rd</sup> that went very well.

Gloria volunteered to run the 2004 Rummage Sale.

Re-keying of the building will be postponed until February, 2004, pending the Building Usage Committee and/or other volunteers planning renter orientations and getting contracts re-signed.

Bob Van Sickle is currently getting bids on cleaning out the playground area.

Ronnie will be setting up an account through the Church bank so that the Minister, the President, the RE Director and the Office can have debit cards that will allow them to make approved purchases without using their own money and requiring reimbursement. The account will have a cap on the amount that can be charged against it.

► As of November 30<sup>th</sup>, the Canvass has raised \$54,000 with approximately 40 pledging units.

The congregational budget meeting will be on January 4, 2004. The Board will present an actual budget with deficits, if they exist, to the congregation at that time.

The Board felt that Dave Rickard's visit was positive, though clearly there are hurdles to overcome. A true vision and mission statement needs to be created which will drive the building expansion project, as well as other projects and goals, set by the Board and congregation.

### Endowment Is Finally Endowing!

After several lean years, UUCFL Endowment, Inc. is again producing profits, so the holiday elves (a.k.a. trustees) met on Dec. 7th to review the thoughtful proposals which had been submitted by a variety of enterprising UU 's. We are pleased to say that we can at least partially fund all the ideas that were presented. Here is the "gift list".

In the area of Membership, \$520 goes to Nancy Dollar Laign and Rev. Gail for Starter Kits for New Members and \$500 to Ronnie Van Sickle for the Nametag Project. For Buildings and Grounds, \$600 goes to Carol Wilschke for enhancements to the front entrance of the church including trees and foyer benches. \$100 goes to the Children's Choir for new music and supplies.

Various types of audiovisual equipment were requested by several groups including the Labyrinth Cafe producers, UU Sisterhood and Religious Education. \$1700 has been allocated and this will ensure that the church has a working TV, VCR, DVD and digital camera. Also, there will be some additions to the sound equipment as requested by Erik Anderson to enhance concerts and audio productions. Sofia and Kip will receive \$480 allotted for advertising in the *Happy Times*, a free publication given away at the Whole Foods Market and at a variety of community locations.

In addition, two valuable outreaching projects will be funded. The first is \$350 to the Broward County Library to help support the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Pan African Bookfest and Cultural Conference which will be held in April, 2004. This grant is underwritten by the Thelma Daniel and Annette Van Howe Social Justice Fund. The second is \$500 to Hospice of the Gold Coast to support a unique music therapy program developed by Laura Sue Wilansky, the Silver Nightingale.

Finally, \$500 has been earmarked for future sanctuary enhancements as proposed by UUCFL President, Gary Ladka.

Thanks to all who took the time to create the projects and write the grants. We'll look forward to seeing all these things unfold in the next few months. Happy Holidays from Your UUCFL Endowment Trustees!

### OUR MUSIC DIRECTOR

Dot Muise's hands have produced music on the piano for more than seventy years and on the organ for slightly less. They have also been busy on a typewriter as a secretary for many years and recently on her home computer. On Sundays we can hear her playing piano for services, and on Wednesdays we might see her cutting down errant tree branches on our church property or doing general interior maintenance.

Dot's activities don't stop there. She's busy almost every day of the week in a variety of ways: as a volunteer secretary at the VA's Counseling Center, as a reading tutor in an adult literacy program, and as a member of many of our church committees. She is active on Endowment, Sunday Services and Buildings and Grounds Committees. In addition, she has been our Music Director for several decades.

Dot was born into a family of five generations of musicians in Falls River, Mass. At age eight, she began playing the piano when her pianist grandmother paid for her lessons. Thanks to this generosity the whole direction of Dot's life took a musical path, playing for churches and eventually meeting her talented pianist/organist husband Joe. Many of their courting days were spent visiting church pipe organs. Joe tutored her, and eventually she became organist at the local Universalist Church.

Surprisingly, neither Dot nor Joe became full-time professional musicians. Joe worked for the US Post Office for 33 years and also bought, repaired and sold reed organs. Their musical lives became woven into the fabric of their church communities. One highlight remembered was the successful presentation of the Dubois cantata, *The Seven Last Words of Christ*. Joe directed the combined church choirs *and* Dot while she played the organ.

In 1955 Joe designed and built their dream home. They eventually became the parents of four children, two who later died tragically. Losing two children would have been more than they could bear had they not had two others to raise.

In 1969 the family moved to Florida, Joe retired due to a disability and Dot became a city hall secretary, a job which lasted for 17 years. Music necessarily took second place in their working lives; however, many family gatherings became musical events, as Joe's family included five organists. Sadly, the family lost Joe to heart disease in 1980.

The Muise family musical tradition has continued with Dot's son being both a fine tenor and an accomplished organist. Her daughter plays the guitar and recorder and granddaughter sings at her college.

The UU Church of Fort Lauderdale is fortunate that Dot is our Director of Music.
