Wisdom Stories, Wisdom Cinema Coming

Starting on Feb. 13 and going on for 11 subsequent Tuesdays at 7:00pm, we will be offering an exciting new adult religious education experience. We will examine the wisdom traditions of 6 religions focusing on the teaching stories and some of the mystical practices. Then we will offer a movie chosen to take us inside that tradition for some deeper insight. The program kicks off with an introduction to Shaman based tribal religion on Feb. 13 with the movie "Pow Wow Highway" shown on Feb. 20. Together, we can fix this growing problem. From babies to seniors, many more people are looking to us for their food. We are struggling to try and keep pace with the demands being placed on us. Marti says the most urgent need is for the following items: peanut butter, rice, beans, canned meats and tuna, non-refrigerator milk, cereal, canned pastas and canned fruit. Our Endowment Fund gave a recent grant to the CFP and Marti says she only wishes other faith groups were as loyal as we have been over the years.



As Without So Within

A fundamental insight of several spiritual systems is the idea of “as above, so below.” I also like to think in terms of “as without, so within.” With this concept in mind I have recently redone my office and put my new abode (the parsonage if you will) in much better order. I had a friend with some training in interior design visiting over the holidays and we spent a strange and almost mystical day on January 1 putting my house in order. One of the most interesting things she did was help me notice my collections. I really have never thought of myself as a collector. I have never had coin or stamp collection nor really gone about acquiring a large number of any one thing. However, in the eyes of a person trained to observe, my home has become a charming museum of tiny collections and thematically arranged art work. The end result has astounded me. It has made me see my home as a piece of art work that reflects my history, character and personal mythology in ways I have never conceived of before. Likewise the new arrangement of my office seems to have given me a new perspective on my job as a minister and the nature of my relationship with the congregation. Everyone who has been in my office lately has commented on how much more inviting it seems. I now sit at my desk and can face a couple planning a wedding or someone seeking counseling as they sit on the little sofa looking out on our lovely grounds and listen to a little fountain rippling. I have already found it to make a difference in several encounters I have had in the last few weeks.



It makes me feel a little shallow that external changes can have such an effect on my mood and my self concept. However, many spiritual teachings indicated that a peaceful and healing environment can have a huge effect on one's psyche. I will likely always have some messy and chaotic files and I doubt that I will ever be a super organized person who does things way ahead of time . Indeed a new book I heard about argues that it might not always be best to be overly organized. The book is called “A Perfect Mess: The Hidden Benefits of Disorder- How Crammed Closets, Cluttered Offices, and On-the-Fly Planning Making the World a Better Place” by Eric Abrahamson. I love the title and I feel that some of its ideas will always apply to me. However, the benefits of seeing some hidden order and coherence in my possessions has made me open to exploring new ways of being on many levels. I wish for all of you some experiences in 2007 that make you look at your life from a new perspective and see some order and coherence that you did not see before. An please plan a visit to my office just to say hello or to plan a wedding, a renewal of vows, a house blessing or just to talk about a problem or issue. You will have a lovely view and I can turn on the fountain and even burn incense and candles. As we southerners always say “Y'all come now, you hear.”

Mardi Gras is an annual festival which is celebrated on 20th February in 2007. Falling just before Lent, it traditionally marks the last opportunity for fun and feasting before 40 days of "self-denial". Mardi Gras means "Fat Tuesday" in French.

Festivities begin at the beginning of February, leading up to Mardi Gras day, and consist of parades, dancing in the street, costumes and masked balls. The traditional colors of Mardi Gras are purple (justice), green (faith) and gold (power). The modern Carnival tradition developed in Europe in the Middle ages, and is celebrated mainly in Roman Catholic communities in Europe and the Americas today. Some of the most famous celebrations are held in Nice (France), Cologne (Germany), Rio de Janeiro (Brazil) and New Orleans (USA).

on them we each carry our own baggage.






The resolution states:


