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

From Your Board President



On June 30 at UUCFL we engaged in what could be a time-honored Unitarian Universalist ritual. To be exact, we turned our Sunday service into a coffee hour.

There were tables and chairs spread around the sanctuary and people helped themselves to coffee, tea and a variety of goodies. That would have been enough to consecrate the hour, but in addition we did discuss some important issues. The focal question was: "what does it mean to be a member of our church?"

Okay, so we didn't tackle issues of global significance such as world peace or climate change. But our discussion truly hit close to home – our church home.

There were five topics on the table (figuratively and literally) each one to be addressed by a series of questions. I like to think of these topics and the questions as food for thought about the joys and obligations of church membership. Or maybe how to get more out of and give more to our church community. There was talk of raising the bar regarding expectations of members. We UUs don't often use such words as "obligation" or "expectations". This is probably because many of us were brought up in dogma-based religions where we felt suffocated by such language.

But on that Sunday in June we collectively leaned toward the idea that maybe there is a need for some sense of duty to ourselves and to our church. In a handout we read, there were some suggested requirements for membership.

First, regular attendance at Sunday service. Second, participation in some faith deepening programs or classes. Third, participation in church outreach mission work in the outside community. Fourth reaching for a higher level of financial contribution. And fifth, being an ambassador of the church by telling others about us and inviting friends to come to church.

Discussion questions attached to each topic included: Does it seem too much to ask UUs to attend church regularly? How can we make attendance more exciting?

What programs or topics might help people deepen their faith and commitment?

What kinds of outreach programs do we already participate in that some people might not know about?

Why do we UU's tend to be less financially generous than most other religious communities (our giving level averages less than 2% of income)

Why don't more of us bring friends to church?

Since there were 10 tables, each topic was discussed by two different groups. The discussions were lively and the reports back to the larger group were full of enthusiasm and insight.

Perhaps Rev. Gail or I will later review what folks came up with in response to these questions. For now I will say that as president of the Board of Trustees I was gratified by the thoughtfulness and enthusiasm people demonstrated in addressing these issues and I would encourage readers to give these matters serious consideration.

Travel and Transcendence

I had originally felt like I needed to write about the Trayvon Martin decision which I know has been upsetting to many on several levels. However, our own Susan Friend, DRE and Choir Director has addressed this issue passionately on her page and our UUA President Peter Morales has made some great comments about it which can be accessed on the web. Therefore since I am traveling as I write this I will speak rather about why for me travel is not a luxury but a necessity.

Even as small child I loved any kind of travel from a day outing to a long family car trip to same strange destination my father had dreamed up. As an adult seeking out new and different experiences in exotic situations has been almost an obsession. I feel I become a different and better person when I travel. I am more open, more friendly, more resourceful and more relaxed than normal. Travel is full of challenges and even scary moments but I handle these things better when I am on the road. I notice places, nature and other people more then I travel. I suppose



it is just that I have less responsibility when I am not working but it is also just that the lure of the unknown is so seductive. On this trip, I made a new friend by doing something kind of unexpected and daring. I have always wanted to stay at the Mabel Dodge Lujan House in Taos, NM. Mabel was a woman ahead of her time and her life story had a great impact on me. She was sort of a Salon leader and patroness of the arts. Her lovely adobe home in Taos was visited and even lived in my many of the great writers and artists of the early part of this century. She lured controversial novelist D.H. Lawrence into her web. Georgia O'Keefe was a frequent visitor. Mabel often had violent fights and partings with her friends but she was also very loyal. Her last of several husbands was a leader of the Taos Pueble named Tony Lujan.

She did a lot of work to improve the lot of the nearby Native Americans. Anyway you can stay at her house if there is not conference or writer's group in residence. A friend from Los Alamos and I agreed to stay there one night in the Willa Cather room. Cather wrote a great deal about the New Mexico area. I love d it so much- no TV, limited cell phone reception, amazing homemade breakfasts, great places to sit and read and journal that I wanted to stay another day. There are no cabs in Taos. There is no bus service back to Santa Fe where I was headed. The lady at the desk there told me about a little private shuttle service called SoulSisters Shuttle. It was new and she did not know enough to recommend it. I called and arranged for a total stranger to pick me up and drive me to Santa Fe. My driver was Robin and we hit it off and when I developed a sinus infection in Santa Fe and was feeling kind of weak, Robin helped me make a couple of

transitions from one location to another, to do some errands and we ended up having a great Mexican meal together and becoming friends. She told me she would be happy to be my driver and personal assistant whenever I was in the area and at a discount cost. It was a great and totally unexpected experience that happened largely because I refuse to give in the seeming constraints of not driving and having limited mobility. I got to do what I wanted because I was willing to take chance in a way I likely wouldn't do at home. I feel that travel is a spiritual and really transcendent experience.

I want to do much more of it. I encourage you too to venture forth and challenge limitations by developing your "on the road" persona.

New Member Orientation Class Offered







'Civil Indigent' - Documentary Film on Homelessness Screening at UUCFL



In conjunction with the 11:00am Sunday Service on August 25, at 1:00pm the movie 'Civil Indigent' will be shown at the church. As the wheels of redevelopment turn in Gainesville, Florida, the battles lines have been drawn in a heated debate over a meal limit that has been imposed on a homeless shelter downtown. 'Civil Indigent' follows Francis 'Pat' Fitzpatrick as he leads the charge against the limit from his protests at City Hall

to his quixotic campaign for a seat on the city commission. Eccentric, outspoken and unpredictable, Pat tests the boundaries of what it means to be an advocate.

Lighting Up UUCFL with New LED Lights



The first phase of "greening" our sanctuary is beginning to take place. The old style high wattage mercury lights over the pulpit are no longer working and will be replaced with new LED fixtures. These new lights actually cost about the same as one replacement bulb for the old style; they draw very little power(30 watts each); they produce almost no heat (you could put your face on them); plus the LEDs come in Red, Green, Blue and Amber which will allow for infinite color mixing possibilities for special events. The system is modular and we will eventually be replacing the house uplighting with these fixtures as well as adding fixtures from the front to shine toward the pulpit.

Also our Building and Grounds Committee is working hand in hand with our Religious Education Committee on improvements and modernization of classrooms 5 & 7 and the RE Wing, and watch for the return of Building and Grounds Workday in a new form starting in October!

UUA President Issues Statement on Historic Decisions on Marriage Equality

June 26, 2013

The Rev. Peter Morales, president of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), issued this statement following the U.S. Supreme Court's historic decisions on marriage equality:

"Today, the U.S. Supreme Court, the highest court of our country, stood on the side of love with its decision in *United States v. Windsor*declaring that the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) is unconstitutional as a deprivation of the equal liberty of persons that is protected by the Fifth Amendment.

This is a proud and momentous day for all who have suffered under this law and felt discrimination based on their sexual orientation. It is a victory for the principle that civil rights belong to all.



In the Proposition 8 case of Hollingsworth v. Perry, the Supreme Court dismissed the appeal over same-sex marriage on jurisdictional grounds, essentially paving the way for marriage equality in California.

While I am disappointed that the Supreme Court did not declare the freedom to marry as a constitutionally-protected "equal protection" right that would apply to all states, I applaud this historic step towards equality.


The Unitarian Universalist Association joined two amicus curiae briefs in these cases with other religious organizations in support of marriage equality. In both cases, the UUA argued that a broad cross-section of religious denominations recognize the dignity of lesbian and gay people and their relationships, recognize the necessary distinction between civil and religious marriage, and recognize that civil marriages of samesex couples will not impinge upon religious beliefs or practices, but rather will prevent one set of religious beliefs from being imposed on others through civil law.

Unitarian Universalists have been vocal supporters of marriage equality for decades. I thank them for their dedicated commitment to our Unitarian Universalist principle of affirming the worth and dignity of every person.

There is still so much work to be done to ensure equal protection for all who live and love in our country. As we know, marriage equality strengthens families, protects children, and ensures the basic rights of citizenship for lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender couples.

It remains my fervent hope that soon marriage equality is afforded to all in this country. Unitarian Universalists will continue to stand on the side of love with all families.
