President's Message

"You've helped awaken the conscience of the nation," the Obamas wrote earlier this month in a letter of encouragement to the survivors of the deadly mass shooting on Feb. 14 at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School which left 17 dead and 14 injured. I have had different careers, difference positions and areas of expertise in my chosen fields, and many moves within my area of expertise. Many years ago I read a book my sister recommended to me and I have tried to live by the general philosophy ever since (and even before). I feel that whatever I have a passion for and feel called to do is worth at least investigating and most likely setting sail to a "new port of call". So I entice you to find your own adventure and change your outlook, your investment of time or talents, and your path to enhance your life, and to create some sort of movement in your own life. It will enrich your life and keep your mind young, whatever stage you are in or think you are in! Healing thoughts and Blessed Be.



Rev. Susan's Space

I love a meeting, a retreat, a convention, even though I'm basically an introverted person. I'm glad to be on my own for days at a time, in restaurants, in theme parks and movies, at zoos. It recharges me. But in my work, I'm expected to not only spend a lot of time with people I know but to be radically available to strangers as well. This embodies what religious organizations writ large are meant to be – radically available, welcoming, refuge, and sanctuary – but this can be a challenge for the individual members who may not be completely comfortable greeting newcomers.



In a growing congregation, we can't know everyone. Because a lot of people attend church sporadically, you may not even be sure that the person you see but do not know IS a newcomer. What if they're a member of the congregation and will be offended if you take them for a newcomer? Introverts like me wonder whether the person sitting next to you wishes to be greeted at all. And of course (as we discussed during the Season for Nonviolence) that part of our brain inherited from our ape ancestors is most comfortable with familiar faces.

So, the reason I love a meeting, a retreat, or a convention is that the day-to-day norms are suspended, and most of us feel an expectation to greet everyone wearing a name tag, to chat up the person sitting next to us in the convention hall, to even propose sitting with someone else in the crowded hotel restaurant. Every time we step into the church, we are entering a space just like that – a place of radical hospitality where it is okay to introduce yourself, to come a bit closer, to open yourself to the stranger.

When we embarked on our Visioning process, we identified four values that we share and wish to amplify. A culture of welcome involves them all. Because we wish to be a compassionate congregation, we mean to welcome everyone whoever they are while knowing that they will be unique. Because we wish to be a connected congregation, we want to involve the newcomer in all that we do and involve ourselves in their journey. Because we wish to make conscientious choices, we want to intentionally choose to overcome our qualms and make ourselves a tad vulnerable for the sake of deepening our community. Because we commit to do this and then do it, we grow closer to that transcendent experience of Beloved Community that we seek and the world needs.

JUST SAY NO TO DEADLINE BUSTERS





Peter Mulvey throws you smack-dab in the middle of a trainwreck between Leo Kottke, Prince and Michael Stipe ...bizarre, yes, but the low, deadpanned, detuned growling funk is unmistakable, while the lyrics speak with an insight that peers beyond the experience of his twenty-something years. Building and Grounds Workdays continue the second Saturday of each month (April 14) starting at 8:00am and going to about noon.

WE NEED YOU'RE HELP. There are projects to be done inside and outside for all abilities.

Much thanks are given to everyone for their tireless work inside and out on our work day.

We are working on several projects around the building, and you will be seeing some improvements in the tower entryway, and we are shopping new sanctuary doors and we thank Bob Zumstein and the new Daytime Group for their help in gathering information and preparing to meet with people during the day which is a challenge for many of us on B&G. The sound system will be updated and modified to fit our more current needs and acoustic panels will be installed around the sanctuary. You will also be seeing some rest room upgrades.

Meanwhile we continue to face a fairly large challenge with replacing the air conditioning unit in the Sanctuary between designs, the work that will be involved, backorders of equipment, and, of course, the cost. Unfortunately this is not a Home Depot - We Can Do it - They Can Help project. We thank Doug Friend for the research and legwork as we try to solve the situation as soon as possible. We are asking for special donations as you are able toward the funds needed. If you are able to make a love gift large or small, please see Sandy Lange, President, or Nelson Lamis, Treasurer. Any amount would be greatly appreciated. We thank the mercifully cool weather we have been experiencing as we work through this and everyone for being patient while we enjoy nature's natural cross-breeze (with a little help from electrical fans) with added help from high-tech, handheld, portable, self-cooling devices.







In the wake of the shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, Sheriff Scott Israel was observed self-aggrandizing, as politicians presumably must do. To my amazement, half the major achievements he listed were reduction of youthful offenders burdened with arrest records (our Civil Citation Program) and that his officers have been getting CIT Training (Crisis Intervention Team Training). The stuff BOLD Justice made him do! He's not giving BOLD Justice credit, just claiming that our stuff makes him a great sheriff.

For more than a decade now BOLD Justice has been making a difference in Broward County. From successfully lobbying for treatment rather than prison for 4,000 non-violent drug offenders to greatly positively affecting the Broward County Sheriff's office, we have become a force to be reckoned with. But BSO is not the only law enforcement agency in Broward County.

There is much work to be done! We've got to keep fighting and we need to keep growing!



April 1 – "Intergenerational Easter Celebration" by the Rev. Susan M. Smith.

Through Christian scripture, special music, and ritual, we will experience the great mystery of the central story of Christianity: the betrayal, trial, crucifixion, and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth. Choir and soloist Larry Bressler will sing. Lunch will follow. Easter bonnet prizes will be awarded for most humorous and most beautiful. Please bring plastic eggs stuffed with small favors or non-melting candy for the Big Egg Hunt.

April 8 – "Internalizing the Web" by the Rev. Susan M. Smith. In April, we will explore our 7th UU Principle: "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part." Much of human philosophy has described us as being estranged or separated from "nature". How can we know ourselves as "natural" beings?

April 15 – "Repairing the Web" by the Rev. Susan M. Smith. We will prepare for our Earth Day workday and celebration by asking what our responsibility to existence is when we understand ourselves as part of the whole. We will have special musical guest Peter Mulvey perform during this service.

There will also be a ceremony for new members.

April 22 –"Love Your Mother" by Susan Moss and Janine Griffiths. To celebrate Earth Day, Susan and Janine team up to present a service on loving, respecting, and taking care of Mother Earth, accompanied by fiddle tunes from Sarah Paulus. A pot-luck BBQ lunch will follow our regular service, with pre- and post-service work periods. Bring a dish to share.

April 29 -Who Benefits from Florida's Stand Your Ground Law? By Rhonda Felder. In 2005 Florida became the first state to enact a Stand Your Ground (SYG) Law. In 2012 in Sanford, Florida, 29-year-old George Zimmerman murdered Trayvon Martin, an unarmed 17-year-old. Only after a blast of community outrage was he indicted - but not convicted. The jury's decision, highly influenced by the SYG law, shocked the watching nation and brought the murder and racial injustices of SYG to national awareness. Since then, studies have demonstrated that SYG increases inequalities and endangers our most vulnerable citizens in three critical ways: (1) it intensifies racial inequality; (2) it increases gender inequality; and (3) it increases homicide rates. Rhonda Felder, a leader of Black Lives Matter Alliance Broward, addresses this social injustice. Please participate in a discussion at 12:45 - 2:00pm for audience response to Rhonda's presentation and what is to be done!
