President's Message



Saturday, May 17, from 7 to 9 PM our church will be hosting the second Wisdom and Enlightenment Forum. The forum is loosely fashioned after the highly popular, Ted Talks. The first forum was held last November on the topic of "expressions of hope" and those in attendance agreed that it was indeed enriching and enlightening. "Happiness" is the theme for this upcoming forum

Does a Wisdom and Enlightenment series and the topic of happiness have anything to do with being a part of a Unitarian Universalist congregation? Indeed they do, for the free and responsible search for truth and meaning is a large part of who we are.

So wisdom and enlightenment are an important part of what Unitarian Universalism has to offer. And so is happiness. It has been said that what we as a denomination offer is more complex and subtle than more traditional denominations. More than one wise person has said that pursuing happiness directly is likely to be futile. Instead, happiness is a byproduct of finding meaning and purpose in life. Such a quest is an important part of our denominational purpose.

In his famous interview with Bill Moyers, Joseph Campbell, beautifully stated the idea that it is not that we are looking for the meaning of life, it is rather that we are looking to experience life as meaningful in our everyday existence. At its best, our Sunday service provides us with nourishment for our hunger for a full and meaningful life. The Wisdom and Enlightenment Forum series is the brainchild of the Rev. Opal Murray, whose inspired leadership is making her idea come to life for us all. It is her hope, and the hope of the committee that supports her work, that these forms will provide another experience for such nourishment. It is our hope that this series will become known in the community and be a source of fundraising for the church. It is also our plan that the forum will increase community awareness of who we are and what we are about.

By declaration of the Gen. Assembly of the United Nations, March 20 was international happiness day. The declaration reads in part, "– happiness is a fundamental goal, (and) the declaration invites (everyone) to observe the international day of happiness in an appropriate manner, including through education and public awareness-raising activities." So our forum is being planned at an opportune time.

There will be more detailed information forthcoming regarding this planned event. In the meanwhile, please mark your calendars for May 17th and plan to support this worthwhile endeavor and experience.

Soapbox time again. We have an opportunity to make a real difference in our community. On April 3rd at 7pm at St. Mark's Catholic Church (5601 S. Flamingo Road, Southwest Ranches FL 33330) the Bold Justice Nehemiah Action will happen. We will have the Broward County Commission there to see how many folks support the jobs ordinance that they are going to vote on. We are also going to show our numbers for our criminal justice issue of civil citations and our reading program. The powers that be will respond to numbers. If we could have 2000 people there to show them that this community supports real change in these areas, it will have an impact. Remember, they know that for each person they see at the rally, statistics tell us that there are at least 100 other folks in the community that feel the same way. 2000 is a lot of folks, but 200,000 is a whole big lot of folks. I know that some of our church members have a problem with the Christian underpinnings of Bold Justice, but justice in our community is more important than our belief differences; whatever our spiritual beliefs or practices, we all believe in justice for everyone, not just us. This is an opportunity to work together with our very diverse community to change things that we know are not right. This is an opportunity to link arms with people that we disagree with on other issues, but who also support our belief in an equal opportunity for everyone, not just those who have the education, means and time to demand it. Make sure that you have the evening of April 3 on your calendar, and encourage everyone that you can convince to come with you. Organize a carpool. Tell your friends and family to just do it for you, if that is what will work. Call in personal chits.

This is the time to do it; this is our chance to make a real change in our community.


