Social Justice Updates





over health care legislation as well as some of our current efforts at UUCFL. While I don't really like to identify political parties or segments of our congregation as enemy camps, when you keep in mind the admonition of most religious traditions to love your enemy as yourself, the term "enemy" takes on a little different meaning. I think there is a lot to be gained from listening to our "enemies", or those with whom we disagree, instead of treating them with distain.

In the health care debate, proposals to tax health care benefits, or restructure insurance markets, have met with substantial resistance, and even the fabrication of potential impacts, such as coverage of non-citizens, to demonize the proposals being considered in the House and Senate.

In our congregation, it is obvious that we need to grow our membership in order to continue to support a full time minister and have a larger presence in Broward County. To support that growth, we may need to change elements of our Sunday Service, reinvent our approach to being a Welcoming Congregation, or invent new forms of outreach to the larger community. Changes in these areas of congregational life will face resistance from those who are comfortable with our current approach.

As we make changes, it is essential that we listen to and respect each other. I'm confident that we can do a better job of dealing with differences at UUCFL than the U.S. Congress whose members are often more focused on scoring political points than reaching solutions.

Dealing with the Unexpected

In ways international, national, community wide, in the church and in our individual lives, we are constantly being assaulted by the unexpected. Sometimes the unexpected is something fun and serendipitous and sometimes it is unwanted, unpleasant or even disastrous. I recall saying to someone once that every time the phone rings I am always prepared for my life to change. It has been calls telling me I had a new job, a new apartment or that a good friend or family member is planning a visit. It has been the calls telling me that each of my parents likely did not have long to live. It was the calls telling me that a whole series of wonderful and talented friends were dying prematurely of AIDS or had been in a terrible accident. Now that I am a minister I get both the good calls and the bad calls as well as emails related to the lives of a hundred and fifty other people for whom I serve as minister.



Every time I turn on the T.V. or radio or log onto certain sites on the internet I can be assaulted with new information that can make me either euphoric or massively depressed or frustrated. Some times I feel like I am on a constant roller coaster. It can be very difficult to stay centered and keep a coherent sense of identity in the midst of such perpetual ups and downs. The weather roller coaster we have all been through lately was also tiring and rewarding in almost equal measure. I got quite behind in several of my current projects and in general felt sort of thrown off kilter by having to desert my own heatless home for several days to avoid illness. However, that distress factor was mitigated by the marvelous hospitality of church member and Committee on Ministry Chair Kathleen Rhoad. She fed me hot chili, hot cocoa and wonderful hospitality. I heard other such stories of people who made do during this uncharacteristic Florida moment.

Certainly, the horrible news of the Haiti tragedy made all us feel guilty about our minor complaints and problems. Watching yet another mass tragedy on T.V. was of course made even more poignant by the closer that usual connections we have to Haiti geographically and with our church renters and friends and family of some members. Again the roller coaster image comes to mind as we then see the better side of human nature with the outpouring of contributions of all kinds.

Life of course has always been full of the unexpected and for sure as one of our hymnal readings says, "joy and woe are always woven fine." However, things do seem speeded up now. The euphoria for many of Obama's becoming president just a year ago gives way to the horror of losing the Ted Kennedy seat to someone who may destroy the hope of fulfilling Kennedy's lifelong passion for health care reform. We seem as a people to be made fickle by our fears and insecurities. I find sometimes that I need to turn inward, turn off the television and read an old style novel or watch a classic movie where the good guys and bad guys are clear. Primarily when it is all too much for me, I turn to reconnect with family and friends, to be grateful for small pleasures, and to remind myself of my mother's life mantra "this too shall pass." Blessings on you as you deal with the joy and woe and the unexpected that you are dealt in your life journey.

Once again Tuesdays at UUCFL will be a day for learning, fellowship, fun and feasting. Transformative Tuesdays will be starting up again on Feb. 9 with two classes, a lovely and healthy soup supper and a free meditation. A brochure should already be available by the time you are reading this with more details. Briefly, Rev. Gail will offer the 4:00 pm class this time. It will be called RELIGIOUS PAST; SPIRITUAL FUTURE and will draw on pieces of an old UU Curriculum called "The Haunting Church" which looks at what you loved and hated about your early religious experiences and moves into helping you more clearly

articulate how you want your current and future spiritual life to unfold. Then we will have our all church soup and bread supper and a free meditation time that will draw this, on music, chanting and guided imagery from many different spiritual traditions. Endowment Grants for 2009-2010

The UUCFL Endowment Fund, Inc. (EFI) announces its grants for 2009-2010. Three are going to community recipients, one new and two repeat grantees. The new community grantee is Gilda's Club, a non-profit organization providing support for cancer patients, their family and friends. The specific project the grant will partially support is a winter party for both child clients and children of clients at Gilda's Club. Two repeat grantees are the Cooperative

Feeding Program for ongoing support, and the ongoing hospice work of Laura Sue, the Silver Nightingale. Her flute playing offers solace for patients and families.

One new grantee has an international focus: The

One new grantee has an international focus: The Heifer Project. The aim is to provide an ongoing source of income to primarily rural families. Our grant will provide a llama to a South American family.

Within the church, we are granting Susan Friend, our Director of Religious Education, funds to support her continuing education. She will use this for training to enhance her professional growth, enriching the Religious Education programs. Our other grantee is for Building and Grounds, to support their project of reclaiming the picnic tables, expanding our capacity to accommodate the growing popularity of our afterservices Sunday coffee hour/luncheon hour.

Taddeo Tidings



As I write this I am half-way through the January term of seminary classes in Chicago, keeping warm by the light of my book-lamp each night. In preparation for one of my courses this semester I spent some time researching the history of African American involvement in our congregation. I spent several hours in the UUCFL library perusing the scrapbooks and archives (an activity I highly recommend), interviewed several people about their experiences, and did some research about the history of race relations in Fort Lauderdale. I am grateful for all who assisted me in this research. I have observed that in many ways UUCFL is currently a well-functioning, culturally diverse Unitarian Universalist congregation. In the 1990's UUCFL had a very active Racial Justice Council. Through their efforts, we engaged in meaningful relationships with three African American churches through "Churches in Cooperation" and hosted district anti-racism training events and

lectures. While we currently enjoy a high level of diversity, I am learning there is great value in maintaining an active focus on strengthening multicultural skills as new people enter the community and new ideas develop in the art of developing a racial justice ministry of inclusion and reconciliation.

There are some opportunities this spring to engage in exploring race and building multicultural skills. On the first Sunday of each month, February through May, I will host the Sunday Enrichment program to explore ways in which the concept of race impacts our lives. On March 13 the Florida District Racial Justice Council is hosting a conference at the UU Fellowship of Boca Raton. Dr. Mark Hicks, JUUST Change Consultant and Professor of Religious Education at Meadville Lombard Theological School will lead this program on "Building the World We Dream About." Participating in this conference will be a wonderful opportunity for UUCFL to renew its ongoing commitment as an intentionally diverse community of individuals creating a loving, respectful, safe, and peaceful environment for personal growth and the celebration of life. Rev. Gail and I will be there ... we hope you'll join us!

UUA Trustee Tidbits

There is always information to be written about governing as a board using the Carver Policy Governance method. Although both the Florida District Board and the UUA Board of Trustees (BOT) studied and were trained in Carver PG, the UUA BOT has adapted much of what is appropriate in policy governance as we govern on your behalf. The BOT has begun to tackle more deeply the issues on whose behalf we govern and to whom we are accountable.

For the readers of this column it may be good to understand certain aspects of policy governance which are affecting the deliberations, decisions, and operation of the BOT. It is necessary to clarify who the "owners", also known as one of our Sources, are in our governance structure. Owners are all those UUs who are the people on whose behalf the BOT determines the Ends: the benefits being produced, for whom at what cost. Owners in our Association are the congregations. An owner is sometimes perceived as a "customer" when requesting services from the District and/or UUA Staff. The use of the term "stakeholders", who are not "owners", refers to those who have an interest in our Association and includes employees and other UU organizations. The time frame and expected results for owners are long-term, involves the big picture and future returns. For customers expectations are much more short term. The connections our UUA has with our owners and customers are very different.


The BOT will govern with an emphasis on outward vision, an encouragement of diversity in viewpoints, strategic leadership, a clear distinction between the roles of the BOT and President, collective decisions, the future, pro-activity, and an open, transparent process. Our primary focus will be linkage with our congregations in a process of engaging the relational, cooperative power of covenant. The work of the BOT in connecting with congregations will not be "telling" or "reporting" but rather "listening" to perspectives regarding needs and what benefits our UUA should produce, be accountable, and let you know what is being achieved.

The BOT will be concerned with congregational values and who in the congregation speaks for these values. This will help determine the values of future generations of UUs. The BOT may involve itself in the history and theology of UUism to be sure the values inherent in our UU traditions and heritage are understood. We will be involved with much questioning and researching.

Hopefully in March I will be able to write about the method of selection that will identify a random sample from a variety of representative groups, perhaps determined by congregation size and location. Food plays a big part in the life of UUCFL/ Student Minister, Jan Taddeo will ask the question "what does the Unitarian Universalist tradition teach us and how does it guide us in our relationship with food."

February 14 - In for the Long Haul-Love and Commitment -On Valentine's Day Rev. Gail, will ask us to celebrate the kind of love and commitment that is around for the long haul. We will pay special tribute to the late Mary O'Conner who was a long haul committed member of UUCFL and who set the bar high for loving without expectations of return in our Community.

February 21 - Message from the Larger UU World - A special surprise guest UU minister will grace our pulpit. Come and be enlightened by an outside voice and share the gifts of our community with our guest.

February 28 - The Age of the Unthinkable -

We seem to be living in a time things can change in the blink of an eye. An election that seemed like a huge game changer may not have changed all that much. A sudden weather emergency makes us question everything. Money we thought we had isn't there anymore. Rev. Gail will look at strategies for living in an age when the unthinkable seems always just around the corner.

March 7 - What Is Your Religious Literacy Quotient? - Rev. Gail will ask us to assess how equipped we really are to face a world of staggering religious pluralism. As liberals we think of ourselves as philosophical and rational but how ready are we really to grapple with the religiously committed in a sophisticated but open dialogue?
