Hello from the Board

I hope to see you less often. Really! This year's stewardship campaign has encouraged me to reevaluate our Three T's: Time, Talent, and Treasure. Stewardship is the time we pledge a financial contribution to our congregation, but your time and talents are just as valuable.

My pledge involves more than just

treasure. I want to spend more of my time with the youth in our community and helping with RE. Perhaps I could use my talents to teach them anthems of other nations as they study world religions. What will you do? How will you contribute to the development and growth of our community? If you need some inspiration, here are some of the current going-ons in our community:

Rev. Gail has shouldered many of the administrative tasks as of late, including bringing in rental income from a number of sources. We appreciate all her work, but would really like our minister to return to, well, ministering. Any volunteers or ideas on how to manage some of these office tasks would be welcome.

Our renters have an enormous impact on our congregation. They have helped us in getting closer to our goal of a balanced budget but at a (nonmonetary) price such as scheduling conflicts. The Board has been reevaluating each lease as its renewal approaches as well as reassessing other property usage arrangements. Jeff Hutt is pursuing other potential rental income that is more closely aligned with UU values and less aligned with our service schedule (perhaps some weekday rentals that won't interfere with UUCFL events).

There has also been some shuffling of committee chairs lately and the inclusion of many new faces. Myra and Rev. Gail will be holding a Council Retreat for committee chairs and anyone interested in joining these movers and shakers.

Judy Knopp is on a shopping spree to add new seating to our foyer. Ideas, coupons, and pickup trucks are all welcome!

The 2013 Budget Meeting is tentatively scheduled for January 20th, 2013. More details to follow, including budget workshop dates. See Benny Rivera if your talents lie in budgeting!






Your religious education committee (Laura Lange, Valerie Heller, Dave Griswold, Gary Ladka and Alexis Blasenheim) and your DRE (that would be me) had a very productive meeting before church a couple of weeks ago. We decided to do a few things differently. Kids are going to start every Sunday in church. We decided that they need to be in there to be part of the ritual at the beginning of the service. We are also going to try and get them into church for the whole service more often. We want them to understand better than they do what it means to be in church. Will they be bored? They might be. Might they make a bit of noise? They might. Most of our kids are not babies anymore, and they know how to behave. They can behave at least as well as some of the adults. That is all I am going to say. We will keep them in until after the teaching story, and they will then go into the back to do their RE class. We will shorten the lessons a bit to accommodate this. The best way to teach kids to be UUs is to see adult UUs in action and the worship service is part of the action. We also talked about the whys, hows, etc of our small children's RE program. One thing that we are convinced of is that even if only one child is here on any given Sunday, they are deserving of a high quality RE experience. We have a good RE program here, one that I am proud of. I wish we had more kids, but I am also glad that I have the opportunity to be a teacher and spend as much

time with the kids as I do. A huge program would require me to be more of an administrator, and less of a hands on person. I would spend my time making schedules and wrangling volunteers, instead, of helping the kids understand what Hindus or Jains believe, and listening to them make sense of the world around us. I hope that you will welcome the children in to the service every week, and greet them especially heartily. Remember, they are our future.



Reproductive Justice Wakes Up the Cluster

This is going to be an exciting Annual Meeting for the SE UU Cluster. Our focus will be on "Reproductive Justice: Expanding Our Social Justice Calling", the UUA's Study Action Issue for 2012-2016. Our keynote speakers will be: Jane Caputi, Ph.D, Professor, Center for Women, Gender and Sexuality Studies, Florida Atlantic University and Jessica Halpern, Women's Issues Program Associate at the Unitarian Universalist Association.

The UUA says, "Reproductive Justice works against the cultural, political, economic, and structural constraints that limit women's access to health care and full reproductive choice. It also includes GLBT adoption issues and equality." And, Reproductive Justice is an issue for both men and women. Jessica Halpern reminds us, "Sure, the availability of abortion and contraception immediately affects women's bodies and are tied up in sexist ideas about control and decision-making, but women don't get pregnant or need contraception all by themselves - men are physically half of that equation! The fullness of every person's reproductive and sexual life is on the line."

Rev. Kenn Hurto, Lead Executive to the UUA Southeast Region, will talk on "What Does District Reorganization Mean to Local Congregations?" Since this is our Annual Meeting we will have brief cluster elections and food.

Trustee Tidbits

Welcome to a "new" season in many congregations. In some of our congregations September begins with a "Water Communion" which is an expected and welcome rite.

There is also something new for us at the national level. The UU College of Social Justice (UUCSJ) is an endeavor of the exciting collaboration between our Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) and the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC). This new College has been a part of a UUSC strategic plan dating back approximately two years.

The UUSC, founded in 1940, is a nonsectarian organization that works to advance human rights and social justice worldwide. Partnering with grassroots organizations and advocating for changes in public police the UUSC helps people in needed areas such as organizing workers and relief in the wake of a disaster. Without writing too much about our UUA, established in 1961 as the result of a merger of the Universalist Church of America and the American Unitarian Association, let it be said our UUA helps UU congregations thrive and promote the values of Unitarian Universalism. Both institutions share the mission of becoming true allies of oppressed people, and acting as catalysts for justice.

The UUCSJ is directed by newly appointed Rev. Kathleen McTigue who will lead the organization in offering current leaders and future activists of any age a broad and effective portfolio of service-learning and justiceeducation experiences. There will be no funding from the operating budgets of our UUA or UUSC because the UUCSJ is being funded by designated gifts from donors. At General Assembly (GA) it was announced there has already been a \$1million gift. In approximately a year the UUCSJ plans to provide programs at the congregation level the help them determine justice priorities and develop local social justice alliances and partnerships. I venture to say all of us have been challenged to make a difference in our world. The various social justice experiences/trips the UUCSJ already has offered and/or will be offered in the future are a way to experience an opportunity for personal transformation. Recently a group of 60 UUs traveled to Haiti to assist in the continued re-build there. Another recent trip involved a group of youth/young adults who journeyed to Tuskegee, Birmingham, Selma, and Montgomery to learn about the history of the civil-rights movement. They returned with reports of being overcome with emotion upon learning about Bloody Sunday, and the use of tear-gas and brutal beatings, including the death of one man, during the ultimately successful march to Montgomery. October 7 - A Gathering of the Tribes - A Report on Justice GA- Rev. Gail and other Phoenix veterans will bring back tales, inspiration and war stories of the recent one of a kind General Assembly. We will try to bring you a little of the excitement of that special moment in time.

October 14 - Trauma and Healing - Almost every human being has experienced some type of minor trauma in our lives. However, some among us experience individual and collective trauma so severe it seems almost incomprehensible that it can be healed and yet often it is. Rev. Gail will examine some of the spiritual implications of trauma and possible healing options.

October 21 - Vote No on Proposed Constitutional Amendments 5, 6, and 8 - Bill Schoolman,

Vice President of the American Civil Liberties Union in Florida, will inform the congregation on the real issues and ramifications contained in these amendments that will affect church and state relationships, the structure of the state Supreme Court, and Women's reproductive rights in Florida.

October 28 – Trying on Costumes, Trying on Identities - As we look to a time of playing with masks and personas, Rev. Gail who loves Halloween, will share some of the costumes and identities she has tried on over the years. You will be able to decide which of these you can still see peeking out from behind her ministerial identity. As a special part of this service we will honor our ancestors in a Dios de Los Muertos (Mexican Day of the Dead) ceremony. Feel free to bring a picture or memento of a dearly departed

November 4 - At War With the Gods of Addiction, A Jungian Look at Dealing with

loved one whose life you would like to celebrate.
