





President's Message

In September we begin our Congregational year with many new beginnings. We will have a new pianist starting soon. And on September 23rd we will be voting on Bylaws revisions and a name change. Susan Dirgins-Friend and Robert Smith will be directing choir.

New beginnings are always a little unsettling and exciting at the same time, but we move forward. You can never stand still; the universe and Murphy will not allow it. So in our changing times, why not pick an area of congregational life which you would like to make a difference in or help out. It doesn't have to be much, but to make our community function, many hands make light work.

Another thing I've been thinking about is a potluck once a month either on a Sunday or maybe another night of the week. I believe we should get to know each other more on a social level, not only among ourselves but with other groups that make up our community, such as the Pagans, Black Lives Matter, the Democratic club, the Baptists: all those who share our space and ideals, though they may walk a different path. Bylaws, or "How I Got My Geek On At Church"

Lastly, for the uninitiated, Bylaws are really a thing. There are two main legal documents that we as a congregation live by: The Charter, (which is filed with the state when we incorporate and lets the state know who we are and how we define ourselves as a corporation,) and the bylaws, (which are created by a committee and the board and then presented to the congregation and voted on.) By approving the bylaws the congregation decides how it wishes to govern itself. Any changes to the bylaws must be approved by the congregation at a meeting called for that purpose or at the annual meeting. As time goes on and many small changes are made to fix or update things or circumstances change but the bylaws aren't updated, sometimes a congregation will end up where we are. There's nothing particularly wrong with the bylaws but some areas contradict each other, some places overlap, some committees are too big, some committees don't work for the church anymore, and other areas don't match what we do now. So, in late June I asked the board to approve a committee to review and update the bylaws in their entirety. Also, last year we approved bringing the Endowment corporation under the church corporation as a committee of the congregation. The endowment board has done their work on how to make that happen so the endowment bylaws must be incorporated into the church bylaws as a whole new section, I'm assuming. The bylaws committee and endowment board are still working out the details.

The bylaws committee consists of Sandy Lange, Edie McAnulty, and Sarah Paulus, with consultations from Susan Smith, Marty McAnulty, the endowment board (Gary Ladka, Doug Friend, Jerry Waltz), and some others.

If you don't wish to have your own email listed on the website, we can set up an alias for your group that will forward mail to any address you choose, like my own minister@uucfl.org. Next, take a look at the e-newsletter and see how your group is listed. Usually, the e-newsletter links back to the website. Is there some artwork that would seem more appropriate?


Once you've checked your online presence, consider how you are connecting with folks on Sunday mornings. We have some new opportunities for you to utilize. We are adding an "events" section to the slideshows to run before and after services and would like photos of your group or class or program to help people connect your announcement with faces. Please send these photos to me. Also, starting in September, I'll be welcoming one person to the pulpit every Sunday for a brief testimony about what the church and your particular program means to you. There will be sign-up sheets and email announcements going out about this. Blessed are they who volunteer. You are welcome to make brochures and fliers with the color printer in the office to be displayed around the building and put in the brochure rack as well.

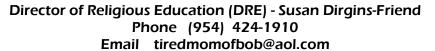
Finally, at some point during the fall, each program leader will be asked to attend a session with the Committee on Ministry to talk about the culture and covenants of your group. This is part of our Values in Action plan. We want to make sure that every program/group/club/class is of the highest quality, aligned with our shared values, serving its members well, and reflecting well on our congregation.

So, if you've taken to heart the personal welcoming tips I've been talking about in my last few columns, please turn now to our welcome in groups. It is true that the welcome that newcomers receive from individuals is key to their returning. Their ability to find a group with which they can connect is the next crucial step.

On Sunday, August 19, our RE classes had a wonderful 7th Principle celebrating example of doing church away from church. Our own resident naturalist Dave Griswold led us on a guided tour of Anne Kolb Nature Center in Hollywood. We saw the fragile ecosystem up close, with all the fantastic flora and fauna. We climbed the observation tower and got a good look at the whole intracoastal area, with its mangrove forest, mud flats and islands. We live in a strangely wonderful place, and unless we start to do a better job of taking care of it, we are going to be in trouble. The amount of development along the coast has increased by crazy amounts in such a short period, and with climate change chasing us, it seems like some folks are burying their heads in the sand. Our kids were amazed by the animals and plants they saw, but were equally amazed and bummed out by the amount of trash we saw thrown around. We all need to do a better job - our 7th Principle tells us so. Don't drop trash, and if you see some, pick it up. Recycle, but better yet, avoid things that can't be reused. Our children deserve the beautiful Florida that used to exist, and still exists in some rare places, but is in danger of disappearing. Our "Blue Boat Home" is relying on all of us. Let us not fail her.

Daytimers is an informal community of anyone available to meet at the church on Wednesdays from 1 to 3. Our meetings are very flexible in content.





Red House recording artist Cliff Eberhardt knew by age seven that he was going to be a singer and songwriter. As a child, Cliff taught himself to play guitar, piano, bass and drums. In his teens Eberhardt was fortunate enough to live close to the Main Point (one of the best folk clubs on the East Coast), and he cut his teeth listening to the likes of James Taylor, Joni Mitchell, Bruce Springsteen, Howlin' Wolf, Muddy Waters, Bonnie Raitt, and Mississippi John Hurt, receiving an early and impressive tutorial in acoustic music. At the same time, he was also listening to great pop songwriters like Cole Porter, the Gershwins, and Rodgers and Hart, which explains his penchant for great melodies and clever lyrical twists. A driving force of the Greenwich Village New Folk movement and well known among his peers, Cliff's songs have been covered by the likes of Richie Havens, Buffy St. Marie, Erasure, and the folk superstar band Cry, Cry, Cry (Dar Williams, Richard Shindell, Lucy Kaplansky). "Eberhardt is one of the most original songsmiths currently on tour, a highly intelligent and articulate artist whose penetrating and profound lyrics are sometimes overshadowed by his extraordinary guitar playing. Upon close listening, the Philadelphia-born singer's gift for the English language is abundantly clear. The words that tumble from his mouth are framed by a raspy yet deeply elegant voice" ~ Folk Music Society of Huntington, New York


