GATHERING COURAGE

Sometime during the time period that this copy of the Journey covers, Aug. 10 to be exact, I will be doing something rather counterintuitive. I am going to become worse in hopes of getting better. I have been getting around fairly well without my walker for a while now. I have been on four trips around the country and managed guite well. I have been back to my usual life of

movies, plays, ballet, the pool, meals out, protests, church and community meetings plus sermon preparation, etc. I have never been in much pain, just a bit hobbled. So what am I thinking of to voluntarily subject myself to a lot of pain and inconvenience for both myself and perhaps for the church? Well, it is simple. My knees have been a disaster from childhood on. I have had three major kneecap dislocations and one prior surgery on the right knee. My left knee has also been an accident waiting to happen for many years. I have already spent about three and a half years of my life on crutches, a walker or using braces and a cane. At the ripe age of 69 when everyone else is going downhill, I may have a shot at going uphill. There are no guarantees but almost everyone I know who has had these joint surgeries, even if they have some challenges, is eventually glad they took the plunge.

I am not a fan of pain and I am also not a fan of pain medications and how they make me feel and what they can do to the tummy, but I would love to have an active and wild old age if possible. I have learned that there are lots of interesting opportunities for full and part-time ministries out there for older folks who are not ready yet to let go of a pulpit. Having worked with Dot Muise for 16 years, the idea of being retired is just not a concept that seems really appropriate anymore. My parents retired at 62 and I think it was terrible for them. They did not have major hobbies and though they found things to do, I think they would have been much happier working longer. Many of my friends retired as early as 50. Some started new, less-stressful careers. One DC friend retired from publishing and became an actor. He works all the time. He is not a movie star or anything but he is now an Equity actor. He is having the best time ever. A lot of people start small businesses. Many do amazing volunteer work but I am kind of a lazy person by nature. I am not sure how good I would be at working hard with no compensation, so I think gainful employment as long as possible is a good idea for me. I do not golf or play Bridge and, really, how many hours a day can you spend at the movies or reading? I would like to live somewhere amazing and glamorous and some of you know I am thinking of making Oxford, MS, which is a little literary mecca, my headquarters; but a lot of the small communities that are desperate for ministerial help are in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas according to one of our UU Regional executives. Who knows where I will wind up but I don't intend to shut up anytime soon, voluntarily at least. If I can also walk better, well, that would be a great thing. Please pray for me if you do that or visualize if you do that. Or maybe you would like to draw a picture of me with two working legs. I will take whatever good energy you have. Call me and come visit me. You know I get bored easily and good conversation can distract from pain. Plus I am pretty amusing they tell me. I am on a journey that I hope will lead to greater mobility. What journey are you on? Whatever it is I send my blessings.



The Good News of What is Happening at Our Church

As chair of the Long Range Planning Task Force, I want to bring you up to date on the good news of what is happening with the implementation of the Long Range Strategic Plan. And that good news is that our Church has become activated in a way we have not seen in many years.

Most committees have added Church members who are moving forward regarding the strategic plan. The Ministerial Search Committee is fully staffed with volunteers and has already contacted the person at national headquarters who deals with ministerial replacements. The Membership Committee, which had been fairly inactive for many months, has also become activated and has been doing follow-up calls for non-members who have previously visited us once or twice. Members have also agreed to serve as greeters in the half hour before the Sunday service and this is most important to give a warm welcome to newcomers and to ask them to fill out our basic information form.

The Building and Grounds Committee is now being reconstituted after being inactive but is always in need of both male and female volunteers. Other committees that might require more volunteers include: Membership, Stewardship, Social Justice and Finance.

It is just wonderful to see how our Church is moving to implement the strategic plan after a decline of many years regarding members, finances and congregational spirit. The future is looking bright. One example of a newly positive attitude is that 55 members attended the recent "Pajama Party" and a good time was had by all. More such events are needed as our Church community continues to be just that: a community where we hope our members will want to actively participate whenever possible.

However, it is still critical for members to increase their annual contributions as well as their active involvement in our Church. If you have not volunteered to serve on a committee since the strategic plan was approved, please consider doing so by calling Jeff Hutt (786) 766-1550 to let him know what committee you desire to serve on or to ask questions of what particular functions are performed by the committees. The more members who volunteer and contribute time and money, the more vibrant our Church will be and the more fulfilling our membership will become.

The fact is, with only three other UU Churches in Broward, there are many, many people out there who we should be able to attract as members. Under the strategic plan, we are waiting until the new minister arrives to activate plans for aggressive outreach regarding promotion of ourselves on social media and other recruitment activities but we still can begin some activities now. Gary Ladka has updated the look and content of the Church website, uucfl.org, and it is much more appealing and user friendly.

With almost 25% of adults stating they do not identify with any religion, we have real opportunity to reach out to people in this category to join our movement as well as former members who previously dropped out. We are at a turning point and working together, we can make our Church the wonderful organization we want it to be!

Millenium Clinic Clothing Drive

"Generosity is the most natural outward expression of an inner attitude of compassion and loving-kindness." — Dalai Lama XIV

We talk a lot about helping people, so let's put our thoughts and words into action. We are asking the congregation to look into our hearts to help those in recovery and/or with mental illness at a facility in Broward County called Millenium Clinic. They are a dual-diagnoses psycho-social rehabilitation clinic. There are about 23 houses and 140-plus clients at the Hollywood location. The people who participate in the program are recently homeless, from hospitals or released from corrections facilities. Some of the clients who come in have only the clothes on their backs. These clients need everything you can imagine to help restore their confidence and dignity.

We are asking people to check their closets and storage units for things that they are no longer using that could really help someone in need. The items can be brought to the UU Church on the first and third Sunday of each month. The following is a list of items requested:

Men's and Women's clothing including pants, shorts, shirts, t-shirts, skirts, dresses Shoes, light jackets, bathing suits, new socks and underwear, backpacks/purses/wallets Hair dryers, curling irons, hair accessories

Toiletries - toothpaste and toothbrushes, deodorant, combs, brushes, fingernail clippers, soap, shampoo, conditioner, hair gel, mouse, razors, shaving cream, aspirin/Tylenol, lotion, Chapstick

Make up: lipstick, eyeliner, mascara, face power, foundation, blush, eye shadow, nail polish, nail polish remover.

Cleaning Supplies: laundry soap, fabric softener, dish washing soap, Windex, etc. Household items: dishes, silverware, pots and pans, small appliances, decorations Blankets, sheets, pillows, towels Books/magazines




