

Rev. Gail's Space

ADVENTURES IN THE MEDICAL WILDERNESS

Public intellectual and writer Susan Sontag, who fought a long and ultimately unsuccessful battle with cancer, wrote a book called "Illness as Metaphor." In this provocative work she attempted to show, among other things, how when we become ill or disabled we move instantly from what she called the kingdom of the well to the kingdom of the ill. She observed that there is sort of an invisible wall between these two ways of being in the world and argued that those in the kingdom of the well will go to almost any lengths to avoid really understanding or identifying with those on the other side of the wall. Even if there is no communicable disease involved, she argued, the well may still feel on a gut level that they can be contaminated in some way by associating with those on the other side of the invisible barrier.

During my various illnesses over the years, I have truly found this to be the case. If people think of you as being especially animated and cheerful they will be truly almost offended when they see you suddenly looking pale and weak and having no interest in being entertaining or even optimistic.



I get it. People don't want to feel they have to pity someone who they look to for help. Even my not driving, which as far as I can determine has never prevented me from performing my duties, is disturbing to some when they first learn about it. There are people who have attended church here for years without knowing I don't drive but when it finally hits them one day, some have suddenly seen that as a handicap like an illness or the walker. We have several ministers who are visually impaired, several who have done years of ministry from a wheelchair or a scooter and the congregations who are served by these hard-working professionals often feel like they deserve extra points for diversity. I think this sometimes arbitrary division between the worlds is one of the last acceptable prejudices.

The minute I walked into the hospital on Aug. 10 to have my knee replacement surgery it felt like everyone thought my IQ had dropped 40 points. Some of the nurses quickly got that I was able to help in my own care and acted accordingly. Others just continued to treat me like I was mentally impaired. It is a hard wall to cross between. Now at Manor Pines I have managed to convince most of the staff that I can participate in my own recovery and that no one knows my body as well as I do, but it is a struggle with each shift change. However, on Saturday a young man from occupational therapy had heard there was a new patient who was really motivated and totally alert. He came to get me because he was so excited to work with someone who really wanted to work hard on getting better as rapidly as possible. We had a great conversation. There was no wall between us. He was interested in my views on the healthcare system and my frustration at the way PT is approached here as though everyone wants to do as little as possible. He did not see me as a sick or impaired person but as someone interested in learning a new skill. We worked on my arm strength. To him, after working with so many weak people I seem strong. Now staff are just coming in to see me and they all say, "Oh you are so young. You are a star. You are an inspiration." It sure goes to show that like race, class and sexual orientation, how we see the boundaries between sick and well, able and impaired are largely a matter of perception.


Is there anyone in your life who you have prematurely pushed behind a wall into a different kingdom? For sure, some day you will be in the kingdom of the ill, impaired and elderly yourself. That is a guarantee. Blessings on all of you and thanks for all the good wishes as I try to learn to walk better again.



SEPTEMBER 2015

September 6- Labor Day Panel and Celebrating Labor History with Music- Join us on Labor Day for a special service put together by Bob and Patti Bender and Rev. Gail. Patti will facilitate an exciting panel of speakers updating us on current issues in Labor and Income Inequality. Pink Slip will join us to sing special uplifting music focusing on labor issues.

September 13 - Water Sunday– On this annual ingathering of the community, we celebrate a ritual to share who we are and how we want to be together in a loving church family. UUCFL President Dave Griswold and Rev. Gail (if her recovery from surgery is on schedule) will share readings, stories and a homily focused on water and community. However, the centerpiece of this Sunday is always the water ceremony, where members and friends bring water from their inner and outer travels and mingle them

together as a symbol of our fundamental unity. Our UUCFL choir returns for the program year.



September 20 – Scary Words – In the season when our Jewish brothers and sisters celebrate the High Holy Days, Rev. Gail Tapscott will talk about some of the words associated with these holidays that can be problematic for Unitarian Universalists. She will also look at some additional terms from the Abrahamic religions that have had bad connotations for many of us and try to reframe them in a meaningful way.

September 27 - When Staying the Same is Not an Option— We all understand that along with death and taxes, change is one of the few things we can depend on in life. Nonetheless, we tend to try to avoid it at all costs. Using, among other resources, a book called "Oops, My Iceberg is Melting," Rev. Gail will attempt to help us come to terms with those situations where, rather than providing comfort and the familiar, not changing can become destructive and scary.

October 4 - Religion at a Turning Point: A New Axial Age- At a couple of previous times in human history, shifts in the religious landscape on a large scale have taken place. These changes have tended to be paradigm shifts and to have taken place in many locations at once. Many are saying we are somewhere in the cycle of a new world-wide shift. Rev. Gail will examine what happened in the last "axial age" and compare with what is going on now.
