## On Having Done My Time

I have to admit it was all worth it in the end. Some of you have heard me whine a bit now and then about my four year tenure as an officer of the Florida Unitarian Universalist Minister's Association. First, I agreed to be Vice-President and plan the programs for the two yearly gatherings where we deal with business issues pertaining to ministry, enjoy collegial sharing and support and have various continuing education type workshops or trainings. I did that for two years with the programs and worship services I coordinated being generally well received and appreciated but with a lot of small complaints and gratuitous nit picking along the way as well. Then as often happens, having completed two years of doing a job at which I was fairly skilled, I was asked to be the President of the group for a two year term, a job for which I am uniquely unqualified by both skills and interest. However, I was told that essentially it was my turn. Several other senior ministers in Florida had done their bit and now I was the chosen one.



I do not think I run a great meeting as I am easily distracted and don't know Robert's Rules too well. However, we all survived and decisions got made and most of us are still on good terms.

The big reward for being president of the chapter is that you get to put together the Friday night worship for District Assembly and if you so choose you can be the preacher for that event. With a lot of help from Rev. Kathy Schmitz, Interim Minister in Miami, and her pianist Sally Pyle, and cooperation from my colleagues around the state who did other parts of the service, I think I got the job done. I focused on the theme of "Finding Keys to Our Future in Treasures of our Past." It was fun to remind people about the spiritual practices of the Transcendentalist movement and the fact that the small group ministry movement which many think we borrowed from the Mega Church movement really came from the Pietist wing of our own Universalist ancestors. There is so much richness on both sides of our dual tradition and much that can help us serve our existing members better and attract new people if we only learn about and use our history creatively. I will likely give a similar sermon here at UUCFL sometime early next year.

Among the highlights at District Assembly were learning from our dynamic and witty UUA Moderator, Gini Courter, about ways we can deepen and enhance our faith and organizational efficiency, as well as learning from our District Staff about a huge national study called "Faith 2020" which indicates some demographic trends that could bode well for our movement if we seize the day. It appears that more and more people are not feeling served by the narrow claims of much traditional religion and might be ripe for our message of openness to ongoing search and conversation on any subject under the sun. I look forward to sharing more insights gained with all of you in the future.

#### **Pastor's Fund Helps Our Own**



It has come to my attention that with so many new or relatively new members, friends and guests in our community that not everyone knows what the Pastor's Fund is and how they can help others including those in our own midst by being a regular contributor. Most churches have a special fund called either a pastor's fund or a discretionary fund available for the minister to use to help individuals who find themselves in difficult financial situations. Historically, this work has normally involved offering grocery coupons or paying an overdue medical or utility bill for a stranger looking to us for help. In the past couple of years with the economic challenges we have been facing as a culture, more and more of these requests for a little extra help have come from our own community. At one time I had several regular donors to the fund in addition to our annual Christmas Eve collection. Now, however, my number of dependable donors and one service collection is not bringing in enough money to help in a meaningful way. The board has agreed to more of our 5th Sunday Collections

going to the Pastor's fund including the one coming up at the end of May. However, if you have a windfall, bonus or raise and would like to share your good fortune with others not so lucky, feel free to make a contribution anytime. Make the checks out to UUCFL with Pastor's Fund designated on the memo. Board member Mara Newman has agreed to help me make decisions about administering the fund and she and other board members are helping me find other resources to refer folks to for help. Now is the needed time as an old folk song says and you can offer money, time, skills and resources to help someone get their life back together. So very many of you have been going the second mile to help others thereby proving that we really are the beloved community.

On Saturday, May 1 9:30am – 1:00pm, a blockbuster program on gay and lesbian adoption will take place at the church presented by The SE Florida UU Cluster.

The event entitled "We are Family" will include guest speakers

Wayne LaRue Smith & Dan Skahen who have successfully challenged the State of Florida in court and have adopted their foster son as well as preserved the benefits he is due as a former foster child.

Also speaking will be Bill Schoolman Current Chair of the ACLU Broward Speakers Bureau, Bill will talk about lawsuits challenging Florida's gay adoption ban as well as provide background on the issue; why the State is both wrong and hypocritical in their prohibition as well as why Florida's ban is harmful to the children they profess to help and protect. If you could not join us this year, please make a point of coming next year and share in an evening of friendship and a great meal.



#### Office Notes May 2010


Last month, Nature was kind to our beautiful gardens. Our precious Cypress trees have put on green leaves. Lovely. Just one of our many great blessings.

From a single tomato plant and a pot of Basil, to small and medium sized gardens intended to supplement the household food supply. Remember, if something is new to you, ask a veteran of South Florida gardening. As an example; Many seed packs that instruct panting sprouts in full sun, should instruct 60% to 70% sun. Our climate and conditions are unique. Your local agricultural cooperative extension service exists to help citizens, and offers great information and literature. On and off line. Put on sun protection and hats when you garden and work in the shade on the warm Summer days.

Keep in mind 'Lost & Found' is in the office. Be mindful of your surroundings and do not leave valuables in your car. Lock up the Church if you are the last one out. Safety First is the best policy. You are important. Act the part. Take the extra step to be safe and secure. Have a good May. Let me know if I can help.
