During the last few weeks, I have listened to thoughtful church members in several contexts discuss what they love most about the church and what they think needs to be improved or changed in order for us to move forward with more members, more diversity and more financial security.

It should certainly come as no surprise that I have heard very different opinions expressed very eloquently by people with strong intellectual and emotional attachments to their opinions. What has been most exciting, however, is seeing most of these conversations take place in a civil and friendly manner. Sometimes in the last couple of decades, church life in general and UU church life in particular seems to have taken a page from the current slash and burn tactics of the national political conversation and has frequently been pretty unpleasant. How great it is to hear good friends sitting next to each other and disagreeing while still liking and respecting each other. I grew up in a family where arguing, vigorous discussions and sometimes even some good natured yelling were common. My father thought that controversy was good for the soul. I learned so much from these friendly arguments. It is so wonderful that we can totally disagree about some words like God, Church, Prayer and Spirituality and yet still enjoy feasting together, protesting together, or working together at the Cooperative Feeding Program or on our church projects. Diversity is the future for the world and for our movement if we want to survive and thrive. We must learn to learn from each other, listen to each other and honor different opinions and model this approach for a wider world that needs it desperately.

The other thing I am obsessing about this spring is how we can put a stop to the Fox news commentator Glenn Beck who has been saying all over the T.V. and radio waves that any church that engages in social justice is really a front for either communism or fascism. Rethinking the Committee on Ministry



The COM has participated in and reflected on a Nov 9, UUA Webinair/ printable Powerpoint: Rethinking the Committee on Ministry.

It suggested that the COM is akin to

a feedback meter like a thermometer or a compass and functions as a "process observer" practicing a "ministry of presence". The essence of the COM is the responsibility of each member of the congregation. The congregation owns the ministry, described in part by Gorden MacKeeman as: "that quality of being in community that affirms human dignity - beckons forth hidden possibilities, invites us into deeper, more constant, reverent relationships, and carries forward our heritage of hope and liberation" and that "Ministry is all that we do - together."



A major figure in the 80s folk renaissance of Greenwich Village, Rod MacDonald is a prolific communicator well known for his passionate interest in the events that shape our world's societies. As distinctive an entertainer as he is a songwriter, his engaging delivery, musical versatility, timeless ballads and modern folk songs place him in the elite of singer-songwriters performing in North America today.

Influenced by songwriters Phil Ochs, Richard Farina and Bob Dylan, and his own background in journalism and law, Rod is not afraid to get political, take chances and ask tough questions. Approaching the genre differently from most contemporary singersongwriters, his "protest" songs are non-judgmental narratives that rather invite his audiences to draw their own conclusions.

David Stoddard has been called "the George Carlin of Folk Music" for his ability to zero in on and expose the foibles and inanities that make us who we are... He's won a bunch of awards including Kerrville New Folk, Minnesota New Folk, and the South Florida Folk Festival song contest... He's been on the



radio all over the globe and shared the stage with people like Leon Russell, Iris Dement, Rik Emmett, and Robin and Linda Williams, which means he's played for a ton of people without actually having to do much... When he enters a room, it suddenly smells like fresh-baked cookies...
