I have been wrestling with writing this article for days as so many things are going on that range from grand misfortune and heartache to unspeakable tragedy and mayhem. I seek respite and wholeness to maintain myself in the chaos of which we are in the midst. We have just witnessed the horror of Charlottesville and the unspeakable spoken responses to this horror, the proposed rape of our National treasures, and the assault on every person's basic human rights. Concomitantly, in our parallel universe of the UUCFL, we have been experiencing some very personal and deep losses. People with whom I am very close are experiencing great challenges. It leaves me speechless, at least in the past week. So, I have fought to find my voice and vowed to try to do more good works, healing, and fighting.

As we move forward my personal solution is to seek wisdom and solace to give me some emotional and spiritual respite from the assault on my views, values, spirituality, and the moral compass I hold dear. Thus, I am reminded of the vision quest that many tribal nations use to mark consequential life events. This applies to coming of age ceremonies and/or the search for enlightenment and wisdom that not only Shamans seek out but also leaders and decision-makers, women who are about to give birth or those who are giving birth, and the warriors who, about to do battle, seek to experience spiritual sustenance. They look within this quest for guidance, spiritual growth and wisdom imparted to them. We owe it to ourselves to find our own brand of this quest in groups and in our personal lives.

As we move into the next phase of our visioning process for our church home, we can also seek to assist ourselves and others by turning to whatever power we reach out to or in to and search our souls and our brains for ways to fight, comfort, and heal. Finding solace for periods of time is important to keep us functioning. It assists us to get whatever tasks done that we can to make the world, the nation, our community and neighborhoods, our families and, last but not least, ourselves able to reach some level of comprehension and support with dignity and respect for all. In essence, we are all a part of the interconnected web of life. Let's honor each other and ourselves by growing through this time and doing all we are capable of for the good of all.

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## Rev. Susan's Space

How well do we listen? Your Committee on Ministry was struck with how enthusiastically those of you who participated in the Visioning Event praised the experience of being heard. Using the world café model, we gathered around tables to address Big Questions like, "What do you want Unitarian Universalism to be in South Florida fifty years from today?" and "What are the accomplishments of a compassionate church?" Instead of how we usually address questions by mentally composing our responses and trying to find the moment to get our own two cents in, we were instructed to listen very carefully to the speaker, allow time between speakers to digest what was said, question for clarity rather than to challenge ideas, and rest assured that your time to speak would come. Over and over again in the



feedback session, participants said how profound it had been to listen and to be heard.

September at UUCFL is a time for listening. The Sunday services this month explore our Second UU Source, "Words and deeds of prophetic people..." and encourage us to consider our own UU heritage. What good are words without listeners and deeds without witnesses? What can we do in every generation to make sure that we are open to hear a prophetic word from whatever source it comes? If we want to be a place where people not only have experiences of transcendence but also are able to share them with one another, how can we make the space and gain the tools for that type of sharing?

As a member congregation in BOLD Justice, it is time once again for us and people of faith all over this county to come together and talk about our deepest concerns for this community that we serve. This is the beginning of community organizing – deep listening about what keeps us up at night, what worries us most, what urgently needs to be addressed – followed by choosing some great goal to accomplish together. Lore Bernier, Susan Friend, Marie Turner, Betty Brantley and I will be holding BOLD Justice Listening Sessions toward the end of September so that UUCFL will have an impact on the issues on which all these congregations focus in the coming year. Listen to the pulpit testimonies. Sign up and show up for a Listening Session. Pay attention.

If you have not already accessed the current phase of our own Visioning work, please go to this link and give us your feedback. The document you will find is what we think we heard you say through the 2016-17 church year about your concerns and dreams for UUCFL. There are statements that we believe reflect what you have said and questions that will lead to actual long-term and short-term goals. We need to know whether these accurately reflect what you have said and are wanting. Visit uucfl.org/visioning for more information and some documents that will help you prepare your thoughts. Drop me an email, respond on social media, talk to a member of the Committee on Ministry, and plan to stay after church for Visioning Feedback on September 10 and 17. If you want to be involved in active planning, show up for the All Committee Night at 6:30 pm on Monday, September 11 to join the worker bees who will turn our ideas into goals and plans. We are listening.

There is probably little I can say that has not been said, but just in case anyone might not be sure what I think, Confederate statues memorialize hate and racial injustice and should all be taken down. Seeing people waving Nazi flags and giving the Nazi heil makes me weep and I believe that people of color all over our country and in other countries have been victims of white supremacy, and that we need to start talking to other white people to try to help them understand if they do not. Many do not, nor do some of them seem to want to. It is our duty. It is our mission. If in the past you tended to ignore that racist uncle because it was just easier at Thanksgiving, these ignorings have helped to get us to where we are today. We have all done it. I am lucky that my family is generally in the same space I am today, but that is mostly because the ones that weren't have all passed on. I ignored things, and sometimes I tried but not as hard as I should have. My dad would say, "I know you mean well, honey, but we are just going to have to agree to disagree" or something like that. He was a good, loving man, and I should have tried harder to get him to understand, and back them I didn't have any idea about white privilege. I felt good that my elderly aunt called black folks "the colored" instead of the other word that some others in the family used. But that wasn't good enough. And when I dated a guy of Mexican-American descent, I just ignored the fact that my step-father constantly referred to him as "the spic". I could have told him that Kenny's family had been in America longer than any of his family had been, but I wanted to avoid the constant conflict. I ended up leaving home at 17 anyway so I should have just put up my fists and counterpunched, metaphorically. Waiting and hoping that things will get better slowly is no longer an option because there is a well-organized push from other forces who are working for things to not just stay the same, but to go backward. I hate to use this term, but we are in a war, and the front line is getting very close. Now is the time to take Pork Chop Hill, not retreat and think that we will live to fight another day. We have done that for too long, and look what it has gotten us, look where it has gotten us. Next month I will let you all know our plans for the RE year. We have planned a great year, and I am very excited. We are also going to need volunteers to come in and have fun with the children, so please say yes when we ask you!!

BOLD Justice is an interfaith coalition of 20 congregations that brings together people from the diverse cultural and religious backgrounds in Broward County to build relationships around shared values such as the desire for safe neighborhoods, good schools, and access to jobs.

#### Past accomplishments include:

\$23 million in <u>new affordable rental units</u> from the Broward County Commission

Locally based drug treatment rather than prison for 4,000 non-violent offenders

- 3 employees trained to assist 900 individuals/week to <u>streamlined access to</u> <u>unemployment benefits</u>
- Workforce Investment Act which <u>gave Broward residents first chance at jobs</u> created by \$230 million worth of contracts with incentives to hire the traditionally hard to hire

**This year** more than 1300 people turned out for the annual Nehemiah Action Assembly! UUCFL had a record turnout of 40 people. We asked for justice for:

#### Seniors ~ mentally ill ~ kids with arrest records

<u>Mental Health:</u> Broward County Sheriff's Office agreed to propose \$100,000 in their 2018 budget to expand training for officers on how to deal with the mentally ill

<u>Seniors</u>: Memorial Hospital, John Knox Village, and Broward County Property Appraiser Marty Kiar agreed to create a study group to identify funding and land for a high quality Nursing Home serving low-income seniors

<u>Juvenile Arrest</u>: Thousands of people called our state legislators to get our Civil Citation bill on the agenda to save 9,000 kids from an arrest record that will follow them through life for trivial violations! The bill made it through its 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> committee hearing. (That's farther than we've ever been able to push it.) But apparently the powerful Sheriff's Association was able to stop it from getting a final vote!

The 2017/18 BOLD Justice year will begin with "Listening Sessions" in the fall. We'll hold meetings all over Broward County to begin the process of selecting the issues that the Nehemiah Action will focus on in the spring. My guess is that Civil Citations will again be an issue for us. That means more trips to Tallahassee to do more lobbying.

Most people only contribute by turning out for a Nehemiah Action once a year. A few people keep up the behind-the-scenes work year round. So attend a "Listening Session" in September, then <u>block out time</u> for the next Nehemiah Action: <u>Monday, April 23, 2018</u>, where we'll again, "<u>Stand Bold, for Justice.</u>"



It's time to kick off the New Year with our annual Listening Sessions!!

At listening sessions we discuss things like:

What is it that worries you? What changes would you like to see in our community? what wakes you up at 3am?

Thoughts from Listening Sessions happening all over Broward County will be brought to the Community Problems Assembly on October 23<sup>rd</sup> where we'll determine the issues that BOLD Justice will tackle this year. After that, the Research and Action phase of our justice work begins.
