

UUCFL Book Group Gears Up For 2007



A Jubilee Year Is Upon Us

The 50th anniversary of a marriage of is the golden anniversary and a time of great celebration for those who have worked through all the challenges of a long and intimate association and have come to a remarkable culmination point. When a company or an institution like a church hits that 50th anniversary point it is also a golden time to celebrate obstacles overcome and the survival of a vision. Unlike a marriage, however, when the golden anniversary of a church comes along, it is entirely possible that no one is still there who was there at the beginning. Still we celebrate their existence and vision that has led to us having a spiritual home even though we may never know their names or what they looked like. We have a few people still attending UUCFL who go back more than 30 years and that in itself is unique in South Florida.



In the Hebrew tradition every 50th year was supposed to be a Jubilee year in which all debts were forgiven, old grudges were forgotten and people in a very real sense could get a new start. Like all churches and all personal relationships, UUCFL has had many ups and downs over the years. I have read the history in the Long Range Plan and talked to long time members, both those still here and those who have moved on. I have spoken to former ministers and District Executives who have followed the churches progress. UUCFL has often had issues with money, with ministry, with lay leadership, with theological and life style diversity. And yet through all the challenges, visionary people have kept the community alive and viable for yet another group of seekers coming out or religious oppression or coming in to search for their unique spiritual path. Now it falls to the 160 or so folks who are currently members, friends and visitors to this special place to celebrate what has gone before, strengthen what is here now and develop some strategies for a future that you will not ultimately control. What a special privilege to be right here , right now. In this very year 2007 we will celebrate the first gathering of a group to plan for a Unitarian presence (it was just before the merger) here in Broward County. The in 2008 we will hopefully have several celebrations to mark the group becoming an official part of the UU national community. We must get a Jubilee Committee in place in the next few months. Please talk to me or Membership Chair Jay Donnelly about how you would like to get involved in this exciting process.

Endowment Grants

End of year giving can reduce your tax bite come April. Think how you could help your congregation make a big finish or what improvements around the property you might sponsor.

By January the kitchen renovations should begin along with the privacy fence out back. The new sign will follow.

Your Endowment Trustees also completed their 2006 Grants program. We gave \$600 to Hospice of the Gold Coast so Silver Nightingale can serenade their clients. We gave \$600 to ARC Broward for their Senior Day Program and \$750 to ChildNet. We gave \$500 towards awning repair to Lucanus. This gets their aging clients out of the rain. We gave \$400 for books for Bennett Elementary gives to students learning to read. We gave \$500 to Schott Ministries for their Literacy Camp and \$500 for a new student PC to ACTs. We gave \$2,000 to the Cooperative Feeding Program.

Within our own UU Community, we give \$500 towards our RE Kids' Annual Trip to Boston and \$900 to replace our Church Assisted Hearing System. We are giving a Growth Grant of \$2,000 to our Membership Committee to encourage them to carry out their good ideas.

Yes, we make a difference in the greater Broward community and plant seeds within our own church.


**Thank God

In this richly illustrated talk, he will explore the most common "evolutionary epiphanies" or "religious awakenings" that people experience when the discoveries of mainstream science are presented in ways that integrate all the threads into a meaningful, sacred, inspiring, and thoroughly up-to-date creation story. The talk will also explore these questions: Is it possible to use "God-language" in a way that theists, atheists, and pantheists can all truly celebrate? What exciting new light can this perspective offer on age-old questions about human nature and human destiny? 


Exhibit at the Museum of Art in Ft Lauderdale

UUA Trustee Tidbits

May I be among the first to wish you and your congregation a fine 2007. May you prosper and grow in a manner amenable to your aspirations and goals. One of the frequently addressed topics in our UUA is governance. As you know our District Board was one of the first to adopt policy governance and many others have followed their lead. Church boards across our UUA are also studying and often times changing their boards to follow this model. Although not an expert in policy governance, I believe one of the questions needing to be asked when considering policy governance is, "What is the difference between management and leadership"?

Management is what is done to make an organization run smoothly. Sometimes leaders are satisfied by doing management things and are too often satisfied with, and rewarded by keeping the congregation and certain individuals happy. While management-type leaders often ask if they are doing things right, leadership involves continually asking if right things are being done. According to Rev. Dr. Gilbert Rendle, Alban Institute, studies show there are two types of church members: those who have been in the congregation over 20 years and those who have been there 10 years or less. Each group has different values: long-term members value a "team" approach to fixing wrongs, deferred gratification, and saving money; short-term members are more individual-centered. As individuals they want to spend money because its worth today is more than it will be tomorrow. For various reasons long-term members may become the leaders at church. Leaders, whether long or short term members, need ways to work with both groups, because leadership trumps management.

I offer from Dr. Rendle the following suggestions for making leadership work: keep your congregation focused and informed (surprised people don't behave well); remember change comes from the "edges" of your congregation, not the center; be models of civility so that expressing oneself occurs at a meeting rather than the parking lot; keep folks in the conversation by using descriptive rather than evaluative language, i.e. describing, rather than evaluating what was wrong with it; and when necessary, leaders need to get nurturing by a colleague or someone else outside the church because leaders cannot be nurtured by the congregation they are trying to serve.

Please know your UUA Board of Trustees is always asking if the right things are being done. Our Board profits when we hear from you through me. 
