

Rev. Gail's Space The Gifts of Family

As I write this column, the next to last one I will be sharing with the UUCFL community, I am in the coffee bar of the Graduate Hotel in Oxford, MS. I am looking out the window on a rainy spring day in my home state, a place I have a true love/hate relationship with, as do many liberal southerners. The street I am looking out on was the one where my parents lived when they first retired to Oxford 45 years ago. The town has more than doubled in population since then and Ole Miss (the University of Mississippi) has doubled its enrollment. It has become the Austin of Mississippi, an oasis of liberality and culture as well as a literary mecca in a sea of intolerance and backward thinking. Most of my blood relatives and in-laws are pretty progressive compared to the state norms and I was thrilled on this visit to get to know my young cousin David Tapscott a bit better. He is a young man who seems uniquely prepared to keep the family tradition of causing trouble alive and well for another generation. I was right to think



I could live here. The town has several of the best independent bookstores in the country, and many great restaurants, music venues and cultural opportunities. My cousin-in-law Joe Atkins, a published writer himself, says so many of his friends have written books which he feels obligated to buy and read that he feels he may need to take a second job.

I really enjoy my relatives and in-laws. They are all good people who are progressive, well-read and fun to be with. I am very blessed. Discussing memories of family triumphs and tragedies with those who really shared them was a very nurturing experience. I guess I am now sort of the family matriarch and holder of the memories and stories that no one else now recalls. I told some stories and history that no one else was aware of. It is quite a responsibility and I guess I had better get to writing. My cousin-in-law Joe was married to my first cousin Marilyn who died way too young. He has remarried and his new wife is amazingly tolerant of our family and has been warmly welcomed. She travels the world in her job as an auditor and was out of town for part of my visit, so Joe invited all the nearby cousins over on one night I was there. We all went to eat fried catfish at a place called Taylor's Cafe and Grocery in a tiny town nearby. There was some live Blues music. It was a true Mississippi experience. Some of the cousins even spent the night and we had kind of an old fashioned slumber party and stayed up late drinking a bit and talking. Despite all the terrible problems that Mississippi has, it will always be home in a strange way. Although some other options are on the table for the short term, I will, for sure, be wending my way toward Oxford. The Unitarian Universalist Congregation there has a sweet little building sort of out in the country with a great area of land around it. I would hope that I might be able to be of some use there and at other small and underserved Mississippi UU congregations whenever I end up back here.

Try to stay on good terms with your family if possible. No one else will ever know you as well.

Children will listen; they watch, they absorb, and they put it all away in their heads and hearts. As we celebrate Mothers this month (or stick pins in a voodoo doll if that is where you are), I think it is critical that we understand the impact our words and deeds have on what kind of people our children become. I grew up in one of those too often discussed "dysfunctional families" and my mom and I have an odd, strained, semi-loving relationship. For all the craziness, she imparted to me that I was to be honest, truthful, responsible, and that I needed to seek something that was of ultimate concern, something greater than myself. Her methods were not exactly kosher (grabbing me by the hair and yelling "I'm going to heaven and you're going with me, if I have to kill you myself"), but for all of what we would call today "abuse", I got the best of what my mom had to offer to her kids, because I was the oldest, and things went downhill fast with each succeeding child. I try to be a good person, and I have often failed in my guest, but I keep trying. I tried to teach my kids to be good people, and tried to be a decent example. I am pleased to say that both of them seem like good folks, and I was especially pleased that when I asked Savannah to come out for the Bold Justice Nehemiah Action, she said "of course", and brought her boyfriend, and clapped and yelled, and when we went to dinner afterward, she was indignant over things that should be different than the way they are. Elder care was one of the action items, and she was more than aware of the issue, as we are dealing with how to figure out how to take care of her grandma when the time comes, which will be soon. Spike is not a bad dude either (couldn't do Bold Justice due to work); he contributes to charity, leads a team from his workplace in local mercy work, and tries to be the best he can be. I swear a lot, less than I did years ago, but still more than I would like, and to my embarrassment, both of my kids swear like sailors. I get too worked up over sports, and as you might guess, so do Spike and Savannah. The takeaway is that, for better and worse, children will listen, and see, and do what you do.

We stand BOLD --- for Justice!

We had a great turnout this year! Three times the number of UUCFL members that came out last year joined in with the pep rally-like chant at this year's Nehemiah Action. "Seniors count --- and our seniors can count on us!" is the other chant that we started using last year.

BOLD Justice uses specific methods and mechanisms to mobilize large numbers of people. Some of the methods and mechanisms are uncomfortable to many UUs. The way I see it, large numbers are what is called for to solve a few of the smaller social justice problems that we can solve relatively easily and relatively soon. About three dozen of us endured the discomfort to participate in the Action this year. (BTW, the religious vocabulary has been greatly reduced from the early years.)

I'm haunted by the story of the lady having food shoveled into her mouth as fast as the worker could spoon it. When she raised her hand to ask her to slow down, she got slapped. Infuriating and depressing stuff like this is going on all over the place. There is little you or I can do about it alone. One little thing you and I can do is to continue to support BOLD Justice's campaign to pressure the Broward County Housing Authority to champion an affordable Green House Project in Broward County, bringing high quality, affordable long-term care to Broward seniors.

The Civil Citation campaign was blocked this year because of paid lobbyists. BOLD Justice will of course fight on again next year. Certainly, our advocates that make the necessary trips to Tallahassee should at least be reimbursed for their gas and the use of their vehicles.

So, especially if you were unable to come this year, please contribute financially. Make your check out to BOLD Justice. Hand it to Betty Brantley or mail it to the church. Then block out the second Monday in April 2017! That's when we'll gather again with large numbers of other people to continue to fight the good fight.



UUCFL Committees Meeting - Some Fresh Thoughts

On April 3, a meeting of committee point people was held, and I am pleased to report much productive activity going on in various little corners of our church!

The RE Committee, represented by Janet Logan, has accomplished an amazing amount of work on the playground, working closely with the Building and Grounds Committee. Go check it out, whether you have kids or not! There is brand-new equipment which has been installed, along with a truly impressive amount of repainting, resurfacing and de-spidering of the entire area. Additionally, the kids have created their own meditation space, and the two committees have done some classroom painting for both our own benefit and that of the Yellow Woods School, one of our valued renters. There is a bit of painting still to be done, which is anticipated over the coming weeks – please contact Janet Logan or Michael Coburn to lend a hand with that. Regarding curriculum, the focus continues to be on our 7 Principles, and the committee would like to have parents teach a Sunday on any given principle (again, please see the above individuals to get involved).

Switching to her Aesthetics Committee hat, Janet did further networking with Gary Ladka of the B & G Committee to assess what kind of structural issues need work before moving on to recommending paint colors for the remaining areas of the RE wing and color and design ideas for the sanctuary stage area. The new mirrors in the ladies' room are part of a work in progress, with the end vision being a collection of variously placed and decorated mirrors representing the diversity we welcome into our congregation. Much discussion was had about the need for all potential projects, no matter how small or universally benign they may seem, to be presented for Board approval, even if church funds are not involved.

Gary reported that Building & Grounds is working on replacing the front doors, making sure that all aspects are thoroughly researched, including code compliance. New flooring is under consideration as well but much more research is needed on that. Dot Muise, representing the Music Committee, requests that we take acoustics into consideration when making that decision. Draping for the sides of the stage has already been purchased and awaits installation, which will create wings (hello, theatrical productions!!!) and a more unified look to the stage. A more urgent priority, though, is to have windows sealed against leakage, as we've had some water damage occur already. Other long-term projects being looked into include replacing all the mercury lighting with compact fluorescent to improve the light quality as well as save money; building enclosures at the back of the sanctuary to create storage, expand the kitchen work area and muffle kitchen noise; and possibly installing a projector system.

Switching hats one more time, Janet Logan, along with Nelson Lamis, noted that the Ministerial Compensation Planning Committee has just gotten started and is beginning research, and will be coordinating with the Ministerial Search Committee.

Betty Brantley gave an update on the Social Justice Committee with her focus on BOLD Justice and its April events. LifeNet is of course an ongoing project, but there was discussion of others which have fallen by the wayside in recent years, such as the Empty Bowls dinners. Our Social Justice Committee is in particular need of more volunteers to help us be a congregation that walks our talk! On the community support side, we have several groups which we've given space for monthly meetings, such as the local Black Lives Matter, a group involved in working for a minimum wage increase, and another looking to overturn the Citizens United decision.

For the Nominating Committee, Jerry Waltz has obtained several members willing to be on the ballot for the upcoming Board elections. Still needed are a candidate for secretary and one more trustee.

Opal Murray, chair of the Sunday Services Committee, reported that services are planned through the end of June and that they're looking into speakers to bring in for other summer Sundays. There was lively discussion regarding some feedback received regarding how we tend to present Christianity, often in an apologetic or even ridiculing manner, not something inductive to our stated "intentionally diverse congregation." This issue will be further explored by the committee.

Dot Muise reported that the Music Committee is trying out three potential pianists/choir directors. Dot is ready for a hard-earned retirement! Staffing will remain the same through June while decisions are being made.

Last but surely not least, we have potential new members Don and Patty White taking on the Membership Committee, which has been more or less in hibernation lately. They will be in need of some folks to do greeting on Sunday mornings, so please see either one of them or myself to sign up for a Sunday.

We are still in need of a few individuals to join the Caring, Stewardship, and Finance committees, as well as assistance with any of our others. As the saying goes, many hands make light work; plus, we each have particular talents and areas of interest with which to enrich our church community. I encourage everyone to get involved!

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
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


