President's Message



"I love disagreements. I love the democratic process.

If I'm in a room where everybody agrees, I start to nod off." -- Gina McCarthy

There's an old UU joke about congregational democracy in action that goes something like this: Once upon a time, the minister in one of the older New England UU churches was arguing with the church Board. The minister wanted to take a particular course of action, but the Board was dead set against it.

Finally, in exasperation, the minister said, "Look, it isn't just me who wants it this way. This is what God wants!" The skeptical board members were unconvinced so the minister began praying for a sign from God. Immediately, a lightning bolt struck the room and incinerated all the chairs except for the one the minister sat in. No one was harmed. Certain now that his wishes would be followed, the minister said, "Well?" The Board president answered, "You still lose the vote, 9 to 2."

On the 19th of this month, you and I have the opportunity to live our fifth principle (the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large). We will have two congregational votes: one on our 2017 budget, and one on approving the merger of the UU Fellowship of Hollywood into our church community. As has always been our tradition, members direct how we spend our money, and any decision that affects our community as a whole.

Your Board has been working hard on creating an accurate and realistic budget for you to adopt. If you wish to know more about the budget, there will be two information sessions in the weeks prior to our vote. Make a point to attend one! Also, by now you have heard about the merger with the UU Fellowship. Have questions? Ask! Any Board Member or I am available to tell you more about how this is a win-win proposal for everyone involved. Most importantly, be at the congregational meeting on February 19th at 12:45PM and make your voice heard.

A wise person once said, "Arguing with a Unitarian Universalist is like mud wrestling a pig. Pretty soon you realize the pig likes it." We like to argue, but we like it even more when we speak with one voice...and we need your voice to do that! I always welcome calls to talk about what's on your mind. Our Expanding UU Family - Combining Energies

Dear Members of the UUCFL,

On November 27th, 2016, the Unitarian Fellowship of South Florida voted to merge with UUCFL. This decision was made by the small 12-person membership of the Fellowship.

The Fellowship was formed in November of 1961 by Dr. John J. Latini, originally named the North Dade Unitarian Universalist Fellowship which met in North Miami Beach. After a few name changes, we moved to Hollywood and settled on the name Unitarian Fellowship of South Florida in 1973.

The Fellowship has been lay-led since 1999, when the former Minister, Rev. Rel Davis, resigned and relocated with the Peace Corps. Our services have been primarily eclectic in nature with a strong dose of philosophical and earth-based spirituality. Regular classes of Yoga, Drumming & Eclectic Mind Shoppe have been meeting throughout the month.

Starting in January, the Eclectic Mind Shoppe will begin meeting at 1 PM on Sundays in the UUCFL Multi-Purpose room. Yoga and Drumming should begin meeting at the church once the Fellowship building has been sold. Over the past four months, we have been working with Rev. Susan, Pres. Jim Giblin and the Board to bridge the merger with UUCFL. In February, the UUCFL will vote on acceptance of the merger.

Much of the reason this decision has been made is that many of the Fellowship members regularly attend CUUPS on Thursdays. My husband Marty and I took over leadership of this group in June of 2014. After much consideration we decided that it was best to pool our resources and focus on supporting one church vs. splitting our time between the two.

We are looking forward to becoming part of the UUCFL family and getting to know everyone on a more personal level. The Fellowship will be going on hiatus for January and most of our members will be attending UUCFL services to help with getting to know each other.

It's been a long wild ride for some of us, being a small island unto ourselves for the past 17 years. We are overdue for some serious change. To quote Andy Warhol, "They always say time changes things, but you actually have to change them yourself."

Rev. Susan's Space

A very diverse group of nineteen members and friends gathered at two meetings in January to seek a set of shared values upon which we can build the new vision and strategic plan for UUCFL. Every small group was represented along with every committee and the board. There were newcomers and people with almost two decades of membership, native Floridians and immigrants from other countries, young and older, differently-abled persons and athletes, and every religious persuasion. The conversations were deep. The reflection was sensitive and visionary.



In the end, a consensus was built around four shared values: Compassion, Connectedness, Conscientious Choice and Transcendence. We explored sympathy, empathy and love to reach "Compassion." We spoke of "Connectedness" to one another, to all others, to nature, to that which is greater than us, to our past and to our future. We shared experiences of the point of decision between the road less traveled and our joy at discovering that life is full of unimagined options. We tempered that sense of unlimited "Choice" with the responsibility encouraged by the better angels of "Conscience." We evoked moments of awe and wonder and the certainty of something larger than ourselves to acknowledge the experience of "Transcendence" which seems to be universal. I was certainly struck by how these four values encapsulate so much of the verbosity contained in our UUA Principles and Purposes.

These are a rich foundation upon which to build a new vision and a strategic plan, but what do we mean when we speak these grand words? That is the question. This spring, we will be doing lots of exercises – in person and through social media – to more clearly understand what these high values mean to us in our current situation. Truthfully, this is the lifelong work of the religious community – to explore the intersection between their deepest values, the gathered community and the world that surrounds us. We sing songs, perform rituals, celebrate holidays, write covenants and discuss teaching stories and sacred texts to learn more about the essence and application of the values we hold most dear.

I hope you will contribute where you can in our gathering understanding of what Compassion, Connectedness, Conscientious Choice and Transcendence mean to us here and now. We will need writers, artists, dreamers and creators to help us interpret all of our talk into bumper stickers, tote bags and sacred artifacts, but it is the journey that will be the greatest reward. Our next UUCFL Visioning Event is "Compassionate Conversation" with Rev. Phil Schulman. Please plan to attend either on Saturday February 4 at 3:00pm or Monday February 6 at 7:00pm.

We will oppose any and all unjust government actions to deport, register, discriminate, or despoil.


As people of conscience, we declare our commitment to translate our values into action as we stand on the side of love with the most vulnerable among us.





Sunday, February 5 – "Now More Than Ever: Liberal Religion" by the Rev. Phil Schulman. Rev. Schulman is a highly-trained facilitator of Compassionate Conversations using the principles of Nonviolent Communication. He will be leading Listening Circles on Saturday and Monday, but on Sunday, he'll share with us the compelling reasons why our Unitarian Universalist faith is so badly needed at this time. The Season for Nonviolence (www.agnt.org) continues focusing on our 2nd Principle: "Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations." Lunch will be served and a special program on our work with BOLD Justice will follow.

Sunday, February 12 -"Peacemakers: Building a Just Foreign Policy" by Medea Benjamin. Ms. Benjamin, co-founder of the women-led peace group CODEPINK, will speak about the US involvement in wars and violence overseas, from Syria and Iraq to Yemen and Afghanistan. She will talk about her new book on the toxic nature of the US ties with Saudi Arabia, how the weapons industry pushes sales to repressive regimes, and what we can do about it.





Sunday, February 19 – "Peace in the Mind" by the Rev. Susan M. Smith. As we observe the Season for Nonviolence during February and March and focus on our 2nd Principle, Rev. Smith will preach a 2-part series on the application of peacemaking techniques in our private lives and closest relationships. Much of our modern technological society has a negative effect on the functioning of our minds. How shall we gain control over what Buddhists call "Monkey Mind"? What mental attitudes lead the mind away from violence and towards peacemaking? Lunch will be served.

Sunday, February 26 – "Peace in the Soul" by the Rev. Susan M. Smith. March 1 is Ash Wednesday, beginning the Christian observance of Lent. Meditation, ritual, fasting, prayer and worship are all paths to the calm soul that we seek. There are other secular and even surprising ways that people have found to find an equilibrium in their souls that promotes peace in their lives.
