There will be two budget workshops after services on January 18 and January 25. Please attend with your positive ideas on how to shape our budget.

With the Long Range Plan Workshop on January 11, the two Budget Workshops on January 18 and 25, we decided to give you February 1(NFL Superbowl Sunday) off. The Two Faces of Janus

The name for the first month of the calendar year comes from the Roman god Janus, who is always depicted as having two faces—one that looks backward to what has been and one that looks forward to what is to come. This has been a strange year for me personally, for our church and for the country and the world. Big changes everywhere: some that seem negative and even scary, and some that seem very positive and exciting. I have said a lot this year that I have personally felt kind of like I am on a roller coaster. I had my much-looked-forward-to sabbatical which, as all of you know, turned out quite differently than I had planned. Part I of the sabbatical was pretty



normal as I got a lot of paperwork and life maintenance things accomplished, did a lot of reading and took two exciting trips to DC and San Francisco. Part II got pretty strange as I did a wedding in Santa Fe and had a great visit with many friends out west while continuing my research on memoir writing. Then my always-problem right leg started acting up so I spent much of the rest of the summer struggling to find the right medical intervention and then getting physical therapy. It was scary and frustrating but I made a lot of new friends, with some surprising people coming forward to help me and make my life easier and even fun at times. It was quite a lesson in patience. Then I was back at work for two months in which it seemed like the church was experiencing growth with new families, etc. The church family has been hit by losses and changes as well, with beloved members relocating permanently or temporarily, and people being hit with serious illnesses or other life setbacks. We began our Long Range Planning process, which promises much more change in the future. The world news has been very much a roller coaster with promising gains on marriage equality and saner drug laws, and then some reversals. The controversy around the apparent rise of a police state atmosphere both in cyberspace and on the streets has been alarming and the November election was a very sobering experience for many of us. Things can seem very out of control at every level of our lives. Unfortunately, some people react to both personal and external adversity by isolating and staying home and licking their wounds. That approach will likely only make you feel worse. This should be an important time to show up on Sundays, at Vespers, at concerts, at parties and take advantage of your church family. We all should be able to hold hands as we do after church each Sunday and share our challenges and triumphs, and recall that all of us are always smarter than any of us. As individuals, as a church community and as a country, we have survived great challenges before and we likely will again. Knowing we are not alone can literally save us. Show up, tell your story and seek refuge.

So as 2015 goes forward, remember that there will be good days, bad days, and some days that are both. Just keep your head up, your heart open, and your soul and spirit receptive to the world and its people.

Drilling for oil in the Midwest. Selling ice cream from a truck. Running a bakery. Starting points for just a few stories **Nick Annis** deftly weaves between and through song and performance banter. One man medicine show? Itinerant philosopher? Nick Annis is an award-winning songwriter, but he is also admired by folk fans for the storytelling talent that makes his performances so memorable. Audiences return to hear him deliver spoken word pieces in the style of brilliant songwriter/storytellers like Gamble Rogers, John McCutcheon and Dave Carter. Drawing on his diverse background and Greek roots, Nick crafts "true" stories and timeless accounts of humanity.





Jeffrey Foucault grew up in a small town in Wisconsin. His father played a plywood

guitar and his mother liked to sing. Winter Sundays were for church or ice fishing. He went to college and dropped out, took a job on a fruit farm and started writing songs about a girl from Iowa. He finished school, roofed houses, drove a snowplow, and home-schooled the son of the local bar owner in exchange for beer. He cut his first album in the winter of 2000. Longtime disciple of the rich and strange music that sings behind the American veil, Foucault has spent the last decade mining the darker seams of country and blues, producing a string of spare and elemental albums of rare power while garnering accolades across the United States and overseas for a tersely

elegant brand of songwriting set apart by its haunting imagery and weather-beaten cool. He lives in Western Massachusetts.

Susan Friend and a small but loyal crew continue to work at LifeNet 4 Families most Saturdays. We and all our affiliated groups continue to fill our food pantry baskets. Bob Bender is still coming up with excellent speakers on social justice issues for either our Sunday service or for presentations and discussions after service. I am deeply immersed in the ongoing fight against the Ft. Lauderdale Homeless Hate Laws and am now a plaintiff in a complaint against the city filed by Rabbi Barry Silver, a friend, colleague, activist lawyer and all-round good guy. I also continue to help organize protests, speak out at the Ft. Lauderdale City Commission, etc. Several church members and friends have joined me at either the City Commission or at one of the other events. We are still active in BOLD Justice, which has chosen issues affecting the elderly as its new issue for the year. The big Nehemiah Action for the year will be on Monday April 20, 2015, so mark your calendars now. We will also be doing our annual Empty Bowls Dinner to raise money for LifeNet4 Families sometime in April, and in May we will again participate in the yearly mail carriers' food drive, when we go to the post office and sort and box food. There should be something here for everyone and it is a great feeling to reach out beyond your own troubles and help a larger cause. I know some of you are also active in the political arena, on environmental issues and working in some other areas. Let us know what you are doing and invite others to any event that might be of general interest. For a small church, we do a lot and we should be proud of our role in the larger community.

Challenges to New Jim Crow

Accomplished activist, researcher, advocate, administrator and pioneer Rebecca Doggett will update South Florida on Challenges to the New Jim Crow on Sunday, Jan. 11 at 1:00 pm, sponsored by the Social Justice Committee. Like hundreds of thousands of others, Becky's lifelong social activism was ramped up by Michelle Alexander's landmark The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness, and like many, redoubled her effort toward building the new social movement for which Alexander called, emphasizing the current Movement to End Mass Incarceration, Police Terror and the Criminalization of Youth. She will update us on progress of the past four years nationally and in New Jersey, with opportunity for discussion about relevance for Florida.



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

JANUARY 2015

January 4 - Coming from the Red-Eye - Rev. Gail Tapscott will be just back from her first trip as a differently-abled person. She will be preaching with too little sleep, prompting her to take as texts a book and lifestyle she has been dying to preach about for years. She will explore the culture of the night person and will ask the question "Is staying up late a character flaw or the sign of a creative spirit?"

January 11- Signs of the Times- Coming before Martin Luther King Day and at a time of great racial and class strife in our culture, Rev. Gail will look at some of the many intertwining issues that have brought us to this troubling and decisive moment in American life. She will attempt to give this topic a unique UU spin. After church, UU activist Becky Dogget will lead a discussion on The New Jim Crow for the church and the community starting at 1:00 pm.

January 18- The Passion of the Western

Mind- In a time of international culture clashes, Rev. Gail will explore some of the main ideas that have shaped our collective consciousness over the last several centuries. We will examine some ways we share certain assumptions at a deep level despite seeming differences.

January 24—Exploring the Shadow and the Problem of Evil Through the Lenses of Fairy Tales We Grew Up With— Coming on the heels of the release of the movie version of "Into the Woods," Rev. Gail will examine the ways that fairy tales and folk tales reflect us back to ourselves and how we can grow to a new level of understanding from looking at them psychologically.

February 1– Demilitarization at Home and Abroad– Medea Benjamin of Code Pink will offer the sermon and an after-church presentation and discussion at 1:00 pm.
