THE TWO-FACE GOD

In the world of Roman mythology the God Janus had two faces in most statutes and pictures and was understood to be the God of Transitions, Gateways, Arches and Changes. William Faulkner always said the past isn't over, it isn't even past. 



Jennings & Keller is Laurie Jennings Oudin and Dana Keller, an acoustic duo based out of Miami, Florida. They bring a wealth of experience to their collaboration, from the Broadway musicals of New York to the honky-tonks of West Texas. Their music is called "Fusion Folk Americana' - a blend of many different elements that comes from their vast and wide-ranging musical backgrounds. Laurie Jennings Oudin is well-known as the former proprietress of The Main Street Cafe, which was viewed across the country as the premier acoustic music venue in Florida. A former Shakespearean actress, Laurie has been a singer and songwriter for many years. Since the cafe's close in June 2006, she has been devoting her time to her musical career

with Dana Keller, a veteran pedal steel, dobro, and guitar player who has spent years performing on stage or in the studio with such luminaries as Vince Gill, Ricky Skaggs, Stevie Wonder, Larry Graham, Marvin Gaye, Dave Mason, Johnny Rodriguez and The Allen Brothers, to name a few. The synergy created from these two diverse talents is not easy to define, but will leave a lasting impression on all who listen.



JANUARY 2016

January 3- Adventures in UU Land (Real and Virtual)- Rev. Gail Tapscott and friends will share stories, insights and information from the UU world beyond our own four walls. Travel is broadening and learning about what goes on in the diverse worlds of our rapidly changing movement and is needed in a time of dizzying change.

January 10 – Mary Poppins and the House Next Door- As long time members know well, the figure of the most famous nanny of all looms large in Rev. Gail Tapscott's psyche and life. In the Mary Poppins books she is always coming and going. In looking at the last of the Mary Poppins books, Rev. Gail will share some totally new lessons from the great cosmic caretaker and teacher.

January 17 – World Religions Day- Rev. Gail will focus on the special Unitarian Universalist perspective of how all the widely varied religious traditions can play a part in the worldview that each of us needs to create for themselves.

January 24- We were told stories of Homer's Odyssey; Moses going to the top of the mountain; Jesus living in the wilderness; Mohammed going to his cave; or Buddha leaving his palace—all stories about the outward journey and the fruits it bears. But what about the other journey—the journey within? Inspired by the book The Buddha's Wife (Surry & Shem), Rev. Opal Murray explores the unsung but beneficial practice of staying and the journey within.

January 31 – UUCFL partners with CUUPS to celebrate the ancient festival of Imbolc. The Celts celebrated the earth's waking from the darkness and cold of winter by honoring the Goddess Brigid, the Goddess of fire and fertility. But this may not be new for you– you may already celebrate Imbolc's grandchild: Groundhog Day!
