From Your Board President

A jug fills drop by drop. \sim **Buddha**



We are entering the time of year when the stewardship process is being discussed among Board Members and the congregation.

The above quote made me think of how absolutely important it is for our church to be self-sustaining by all of us making the highest and most reasonable personal financial contribution possible.

Only through this achievement can we guarantee its existence for many years – for more Unitarian Universalists to come together.

During the congregational budget meeting in January for 2011, we voted to draw over \$49,000 from our bequests account, now referred to as the Legacy Fund, to meet our operating budget deficit. At that meeting a "Going Beyond the Budget" group was formed. This group's purpose was to try to find ways to decrease expenses and increase revenue. From that group's initial conversation, Ken Beier and Douglas Paul provided actionable suggestions to reduce costs which included offers from Rev. Gail and DRE Susan Dirgins-Friend to reduce their salary lines, and a reduction in the UUA annual contribution. This resulted in savings of almost \$10,000. These changes were discussed and approved at a subsequent board meeting. A few church members also promised to increase their pledge level.

In this month's issue of the Journey, Douglas Paul, Board Treasurer will invite members to look at how we prepare budgets in a new way. It's based on programs that the congregation values versus the traditional line-item format we have used in the past. It will take into consideration the congregation's priority for meaningful Sunday Service Programs with a focus on music and Religious Education. It is reasonable that costs relating to our Sunday Service be the most significant expense. Through the Finance committee, Douglas will conduct budget meetings prior to the annual budget meeting in January for everyone to attend. Please participate in these meetings and help us develop a budget that we can all agree on.

The Board will lead the congregation in stewardship this year by being the first to make pledges. As your elected leaders, we want to encourage everyone to get involved and to give as much as possible to keep our church operating.

One uncle felt that the service was too much like a sociology lecture – enjoyable but not something to abandon the New York Times for every Sunday. Another cousin appreciated the meditative Vespers services at his college. One relative credits a UU service with locating a newfound best friend and drinking buddy. Although these are entertaining and conceivably true depictions of Unitarian Universalist congregations around the world, those identifiers are just not good enough for me.

What do you want to come to mind when you tell someone that you are a Unitarian Universalist? Our vision states that we create "a loving, respectful, safe, and peaceful environment for personal growth and the celebration of life" and our current mission statement requires "concrete action" on our part to better the world and fulfill our vision.

I want people to know who we are and what we do for the world without them ever walking into our building. We have the opportunity to do good works and to make a name for ourselves in our community – local and global. Get involved in creating our new mission statement. Who do we strive to be? Will you represent UUCFL as we work with other religious congregations under the BOLD Justice banner in order to improve South Florida communities? Can you demonstrate your UU belief in the interdependence of all living things by aligning your eating habits with the UUA's Ethical Eating Statement? How will you give back to the Earth at the next Building and Grounds workday? Can you make a pledge to help keep our doors open, lights on and A/C running and to provide ministry for all those in search?

Being a UU requires work and comes with a lot of responsibility. The reality is that, unlike some ministers I have made my home phone number and my cell phone number and my email address widely available. You can call or email me anytime.





Many years ago UU minister Peter Lee Scott wrote a column called "When to Call the Minister." In the intervening years, his column has been adapted, messaged and added to by others. Here's the latest version:

CALL THE MINISTER WHEN...

- * When you don't know me, but would like to.
- * When you have problems you would like to discuss with your job, children, marriage, or anything else where a sympathetic ear might help.
- * When you are going to the hospital or know of someone else in the congregation who is.
- * When someone close to you has died or is critically ill or you're dealing with a significant loss of some kind.
- * When you are planning to be married or divorced.
- * When you would like your child dedicated.
- * When you are pregnant and glad you are or wish you weren't, also if you want to be pregnant but aren't.
- * When you feel ready to join the congregation.
- * When you have concerns or suggestions.
- * When you have religious or spiritual questions.
- * When you are seeking to deepen your spiritual life.
- * When you are upset with me or would like to express appreciation.
- * When you have won the lottery and want to make a large donation to the church.



- * When you want to giver her "the real scoop" on another member.
- * When you want to explain that you'll have to cut your pledge in half because you are spending the summer in the south of France.
- * When you want to tell her you didn't like what she wore in the pulpit last Sunday.
- * When you want to tell her that one of the reasons you are a UU is that you have always distrusted organized religion. (Our church is, after all, a part of organized religion).

Take this with a sense of fun, and remember that I am a servant leader, not a CEO. My job is to serve you.



Finding Our Role in Bold Justice



It has been very exciting to see how wonderfully our congregation members have responded to requests for interviews from Bold Justice intern Mathew Pigot. He has visited with a sampling of our membership with an eye toward each person he speaks to getting another member or two

interested in attending the major public action events that will be set up by the group to hold public officials accountable on various issues of public policy. Individual members will also hopefully get involved with the committees that will research future issues the group will promote.

Broward Organized Leaders Doing Justice (BOLD Justice) is a Congregation Based Community Organization founded in 2007 and is currently composed of 20 diverse congregations. The group is organized to give congregations and their membership the ability to address the root causes of injustice in Broward County. This is accomplished through a process of listening, research, action and reflection. Through this work BOLD Justice congregations have been able to win victories in the areas of Affordable Rental Housing, Unemployment and Drug Rehabilitation. Currently, they are working on an education campaign and are about to select a new community problem for research and action. This next year Rev. Gail and some of our members will be serving on groups doing the research and choosing the next topics for action.

A few of you have expressed some concern about the biblical language used by BOLD justice. While we do not normally use that language we draw on the same idea of the prophetic imperative to do justice in the world and we can be much more effective when we work in conjunction with other groups.

Let this be a year of justice here at UUCFL.

"May you live in interesting times," is a well-know curse – poignantly asserting that when times go interesting they are also trying.

The last few weeks, fights over national finances have roiled our confidence in both our economy and our political process.

I ask: What role might a Unitarian Universalist community serve in these far too interesting times?

First, to be aware that our people are not exempt from the national anxiety. We might create learning and sharing circles where we might coach each other in handling our finances, being attuned to members who may suddenly be in need, or to ask how our faith might address the social justice implications. It is important that we help each other not feel helpless or victimized and to discover anew our power in our powerlessness.

[As an aside, leaders may also be alert for how this increased anxiety spills into other arenas of congregational life. This is a time for compassionate listening and tending to our relational covenants.]

We are also in the seasonal moment of schools re-opening and seekers of all ages trying on new faith communities. In our busy-ness on Sunday mornings, it is easy to forget the need for every member to offer genuine hospitality. The Minister and/or Board Host should greet people at the front door as people arrive for worship. Your Greeters ought to have a name tag for both members and guests. Be sure to introduce new guests to other members.

Remember this important lesson: **New arrivals want to be noticed but not singled out!** Welcome, welcome by name, introduce people to individuals (no mass greetings which are just embarrassing to the tentative and shy). If you say you're friendly, be so. If you are welcoming, welcome. If love is a core teaching, love your quests.

Anxious times are when we most notice the need for a beloved community. Somehow amid our own anxiety, we need to find the grace to minister. It's easier if we all practice the humble art of hospitality. Exercise our faith, hold one another gently and speak truth to power.

May your ministry make a difference.

What is a Freethinker?

What is a freethinker? A person who forms opinions about religion on the basis of reason, independently of tradition, authority, or established belief. Freethinkers are naturalistic. Truth is the degree to which a statement corresponds with reality, namely that which is perceivable through our natural senses or indirectly ascertained through the proper use of reason. Reason is a tool of critical thought that limits the truth of a statement according to the strict tests of the scientific method. For a statement to be true it must be testable (what evidence or repeatable experiments confirm it?) falsifiable (what, in theory, would disconfirm it, and have all efforts to disprove it failed?), (is it the simplest explanation, requiring the fewest assumptions?), and logical (is it free of contradictions, non-sequiturs, or irrelevant character attacks?)



There is no great mystery to morality. Most freethinkers employ the simple yardsticks of reason and kindness. What is moral is simply what does not hurt others.

Most freethinkers are humanists, basing morality on human needs, not imagined "cosmic absolutes". This includes respect for our planet, other animals, and feminist principles of equality. Freethinkers argue that religion promotes a dangerous and inadequate "morality" based in blind obedience, unexamined ultimatums, and rewards of heaven or gruesome threats of hell. Freethinkers try to base actions on their consequences to real living human beings. Freethinkers know that meaning must originate in a mind. Since the universe is mindless and the cosmos does not care, *you* must care, if you wish to have purpose. Individuals are free to choose, within the limits of humanistic morality.

Freethinkers find meaning in human compassion, social progress, the beauty of humanity, personal happiness, pleasure, joy, love, and the advancement of knowledge. Most freethinkers consider religion not only untrue, but harmful. I agree with Bertrand Russell that religion, on balance, has done far more harm than good. It has been used to justify war, slavery, sexism, racism, homophobia, mutilations, and oppression of minorities. Most religions have consistently resisted progress. Freethinkers apply the term religion to belief systems which include a supernatural realm, deity, faith in "holy" writings and conformity to an absolute creed. Secular humanism has no god, bible or savior. It is based on natural rational principles. It is flexible and relativistic – it is not a religion.

Being a freethinker and opposed to religion means I am a de facto irreligionist, one who, in principle, opposes the existence of religious institutions. I accept individual religious practice as reasonable and probably inevitable. Rather, it is the political power of religious institutions that endanger my freedom. That said, I'm a practical cat and make some compromises that seem reasonable to me. That's how I can remain in the UU Community (not Church) of Ft. Lauderdale.
