felt like a festival to me. I fell in love with Embassy Row which symbolized both lovely buildings and the diversity of cultures in our world who are all represented in the city's culture.



#### **UUCFL** to Join BOLD Justice




The Board of Trustees has agreed in principle for our church to join with 26 other local churches and synagogues to be part of BOLD Justice, an interfaith group working on holding local and state officials accountable for their actions on selected issues. The group has already had a significant impact on the creation of more affordable housing in Broward County. The focus for the coming year is on pushing education officials to be more accountable for increasing the high school graduation rate by promoting more individualized reading instruction in early grades. The group is very diverse racially, economically and religiously. It fits very well with our Unitarian Universalists values and has a competent staff of professional community organizers. The financial

investment is 1% of a congregation's annual budget. The board will seek congregational approval to commit this money to the most promising interfaith initiative in Broward County in recent years. More information about this exciting program will be presented at the annual meeting on May 15.

It's a little late to be warning you. So this is for those of you with quick reaction times. GA is not to far away. GA is General Assembly which is a gathering of Unitarian Universalist Congregations. These meeting are very interesting, fun and enlightening. #### 19th Annual Rummage & Bake Sale Results

So far, our 19<sup>th</sup> annual rummage & bake sale netted \$2,074.38, about 8% better than last year, more than two average church memberships, and more than budgeted. We hope for an even higher total after our unsold collectibles sell on eBay. This year, we decided to sell almost no furniture, but resumed having a bake sale. This was the first year that we:

- ▼ Had a How to Run a Rummage Sale at UUCFL resource document from Judy King
- ♥ Had a rummage sale committee
- ▼ Could store rummage sale items in classroom 6 up to a month prior to the sale
- Held a two-day rummage sale: Friday afternoon and Saturday morning
- ♥ Provided tax-deduction letters for donors
- Supplied dust masks for volunteers with allergies
- ♥ Held a post-sale "Lessons Learned" and brainstorming session with the volunteers
- Donated our unsold items to Faith Farm (because at the last minute, Out of the Closet became hard to work with, and Salvation Army's trucks were already booked)



We advertised the sale on our church marquee; with banners and human traffic wavers on NW 21<sup>st</sup> Ave; and in the *Sun-Sentinel*, *Happy Herald*, CraigsList.org, and BackPage.com. Each buyer received a flyer describing current and upcoming church activities.

Our kitchen donated many unwanted items and received some much-needed, donated dish towels, flatware, and bowls matching our existing glass dishes and plates. Donated craft paper went to our RE department, and office supplies went to our office. Nearly rivaling the Miami International Book Fair, this year's rummage sale included over 2,000 books and almost no CDs. In contrast, last year's sale included 100s of CDs. Our best unsold art books went to ArtServe, and we replaced all sanctuary book sale books with selected unsold books.

Thank you to our bargain-bagging buyers; our generous donors of sellable, tax-deductible items; and our wonderful volunteers who warmly greeted and helped shoppers; baked and sold delicacies; hauled, sorted, displayed, priced, sold, and wrapped items; restocked the sanctuary bookshelves; and setup and cleaned the sanctuary.


