


UUCFL Endowment Fund Board Nominees Announced

The Search Goes On

The World Religion text book I used for the classes I taught at Strayer University this winter was truly a thing of beauty. I only wish I had been exposed to such an excellent introductory text when I started seminary at Harvard Divinity School. Called <u>Living Religions</u> the text covered the religious landscape in a remarkably even handed and creative way. I learned a lot about several religious traditions I was not too familiar with proving the old adage "we only teach what we need to learn."

So many of my classes when I was at HDS were classes based on a particular professor's research and covered some rather narrow area in great detail.

While it can be very important to know more and more about less and less, it is also very crucial to have a big picture. Much of what I liked best about the book was the interesting way it connected what one might call tribal religions with many of the new types of religious groups that have cropped up in the last 30 to 50 years. What is seemingly true across all religious lines is that people are absolutely determined to find some kind of meaning in life. Life often feels random and unfair and we all see that the world is full of both beauty and horror. All belief systems attempt to offer some hope in the way of seemingly hopeless situations. Some of the systems that have evolved over the course of human history seem very strange to us and I realize that many of us as Unitarian Universalist take a rather skeptical view of many of the more colorful religious groups. However, in thinking about some of these groups, I realize that they all provide ways to offer comfort to someone. It certainly might not be for me or for you but as almost all the students in my World Religions class noted in our final discussion, we all need to learn to be more open minded and realize that for some people - not just the answers but the questions are different. Each student had to do a final research project that involved attending a service and interviewing someone who was part of a religious group that was way out to their comfort zone. The results were amazing to me and the discussions we had on the last night of class in both my sections were eye opening. I feel like I would like to give each and every one of you the same assignment and see what you would come up with. Where would you go? What religion would you like to know more about? Don't depend on me. Step out of your comfort zone. I think I will make the next year a kind of World Religions revisited.





Music Notes

Laura Sue, the Silver Nightingale brought her lovely and original flute music to the Sunday Service on March 11. Dot joined her in the Offertory, "Sicilienne" by Maria Theresia Von Paradis which was chosen



because the service was about the women's revolution. The composer was born in Vienna, Austria in 1757. At the age of 2, she became blind but her musical talent was already evident. She learned more than 60 piano concertos by memory. Her compositions were dictated. At 20, she was treated by Dr. Mesmer, the doctor-hypnotist and for a brief time she regained her sight but lost her musical abilities. When her blindness returned so did her creative musical genius. She composed choral cantatas, solos, and many sonatas for piano and other instruments. She died in 1824 leaving an amazing musical legacy.

March 18 brought our choir to sing "Cat's In The Cradle" about a father who loved his son but never had time for him as he grew up. It is a reminder to all parents to find time to spend with their children. Gail will be speaking on "The Family Drama".

The March 25 service is about Kabbalah. Don't know what that is, then come and learn about it.

As we move on to April we wonder what Rev. Gail has to say about Fools and all manner of other April 1 personages.

No telling what Dot may bring to this service either. Come and find out! Easter Sunday is April 8 when the choir will sing Alleluias and "I Will Sing with the Spirit". We promise to make this a joyous and worthwhile experience. The choir returns on April 22, Earth Day with the familiar "Garden Song".



UUA Florida District - Trustee Tidbits

March is the month when many of us will begin planning for our attendance at Justice GA (General Assembly) 2012, Phoenix, AZ. Although it will be a "hot" time GA promises to be one of our most important events in our 50+ history. Each month leading up to GA I am committed to writing about something related to this historic June gathering. There are several groups working with the Administration and the General Assembly Planning Committee (GAPC), the primary umbrella group being the Arizona Immigration Ministry (AZIM). AZIM is a ministry of the UU Congregation of Phoenix which fosters UU partnerships with organizations representing those most affected by current immigration and enforcement policies with support from our UUA. To continue my goal of writing about GA 2012 this column will be devoted to continuing information about GA partnership groups.

The Arizona Advocacy Network (AZAN) works to secure electoral justice, political rights and full civic participation, especially for underrepresented and marginalized constituencies, to achieve government for the people, not corporations. The scope of their work includes, but is not limited to: defending, strengthening and expanding Arizona's Clean Elections system, advocating for full disclosure of contributions by corporations, promoting anti-corruption and conflict of interest laws including gift bans, guarding voting rights, voter registration and election integrity, and protecting and improving Arizona's ballot initiative processes.

The Arizona Worker Rights Center/Centro de Derechos Laborales de Arizona (AIAW) is Arizona's only worker rights center. The Center is worker run and led to better challenge workplace injustice in collaboration with faith and labor communities, ethical business owners, and government agencies. It is a place where the state's working people are able to take charge of solving their own workplace issues. Though the Center continues to assist individual workers file claims with courts and government agencies, it is also engaging in activities with build community, develop and educate leaders and community members, and proactively address the socio-political climate.

Humane Borders is motivated by faith and offers humanitarian assistance to those in need through the deployment of emergency water stations on routes known to be used by migrants journeying through the desert. Their mission is to take death out of the immigration equation by provision of water tanks on both public and private lands, in all cases with permission in writing from the landowners.

I am looking forward to being with many, many Florida UUs in June for our work and witnessing at Justice GA 2012. As always you are welcome and encouraged to contact me.



April 1 - On Fools, Tricksters, Clowns and Comics Rev. Gail has done several sermons on the Fool archetype. This year she will focus on a range of figures that play through our lives and bring us joy, fun and enlightened wisdom in some surprising ways.

April 8 - What Was It Really Like? – Using a range of portraits of Jesus and the Easter experience from "Godspell" and "Jesus Christ Superstar" to more disturbing movies like "The Passion of Christ" and "The Last Temptation of Christ," Rev. Gail will attempt to see common elements in what interpreters see in the Easter story. Our choir will be supporting us with song.

April 15 - Nothing is Sure Except.... Myra Symons and her team will present a service on Death, Taxes and tithing. We promise it will be a happy upbeat service with a few laughs to get us through these serious subjects. This is a big promise since the service is not written, but after all Myra is coordinating this and you know how she is... Come and she what she comes up with this time.

April 22 - An Earth Day Puppet Show - Rev. Gail will be presenting some young friends doing a call to environmental activism through the medium of puppets. Some special choir offerings will be in the same vein ecological vein.

April 29 - A History Of The American Labor Movement - An overview of the origins, struggles, achievements, and present state of organized labor in the Western world, from the latter half of the 19th century until the present, with particular reference to events occurring in the United States, and the relationship of Unitarian Universalist principles to those events. Guest speaker Richard Palermo is a retired chiropractor, a former newspaper reporter and columnist, and is an active member of the UU Congregation of the Palm Beaches. He also has made presentations on assisted dying. His partner pianist Susan Gross is also active in that congregation, is in its choir and was its Music Director. She also helps organize and acts in church-sponsored theatrical events.

May 6 - I Lost It At the Movies - Rev. Gail will offer another in her ongoing looks at the incredible richness to be found in movies mainstream and otherwise. She will try to put to rest the idea that they just don't make decent movies anymore.
