Prez Says..

Thanks to the 24 members who participated in our March 20 session that was requested by the congregation at the January budget meeting. We did not have a guorum, as required by

our bylaws, to convene a meeting, on March 20. However, those who were present heard a report from Jeff Hutt on the recent "Beyond the Budget" sessions and recommended that the congregation reduce expenditures by \$9760 for the current year (2011). The reduction in expenditures consists of:

- A reduction in the minister's salary package (that reflects reduced insurance costs)
- Unpaid summer leave for the Director of Religious Education and
- A reduction in dues payments.

The reduction in staff compensation has been done at the initiation of and in consultation with the affected staff members (Rev. Gail Tapscott and Susan Friend). The reduction in payment of dues is similar to what we did last year—and makes a partial payment of the "fair share" dues to the UUA.

With these reductions in expenses, we anticipate using approximately \$10,000 less from the Bill Rusch funds than were designated at the congregational meeting in January. At the March 20 session, I also reported that we are expecting to receive a bequest from the Jenny Hyde estate in the near future. I think that the generosity of Bill Rusch and Jennie Hyde reflects confidence by our departed members that we are doing something right in terms of our ministry.

I should emphasize that the support expressed by a clear majority at this session is a recommendation from a significant segment of the congregation to the Board of Trustees. Since there was no quorum, the recommendation does not carry the weight of a motion passed with a quorum (35%) of our members.

Rev. Gail's Space

What Really Makes a Church a Community

As we continue what seems like the never ending struggle of a church that never seems to have enough money to accomplish all its laudable goals, we are surely all having much the same struggle in our individual lives. The last few years in South Florida have been hard for most individuals and for many businesses and institutions. Almost all the Unitarian Universalists churches in the area have apparently dwindling memberships and are down in financial donations. However, attendance at both Sunday Services and other activities is often steady or even up a bit. This can only lead me to conclude that people need community and spiritual and intellectual




inspiration as much as ever but really feel unable to make the monetary and sometimes the time commitments needed to really sustain the communities that can help meet those needs. Our church has been more fortunate than many because we have been saved as it were year after by extremely generous bequests left directly to the church by members who were once inspired and sustained by the community and now have completed their life journey. Some folks are appalled that some of this money is being used for operating expenses. There are some perfectly well intentioned folks among us who would perhaps think it would be better to let our community become a Fellowship with little or no professional staff than spend any of this money for day to day operations. Indeed a few churches on Florida and other places have taken that route. As the person who knew virtually all of our benefactors of the last six years or so and the person who often sat at their bedsides or at their homes as they were spending their last days alive and coherent I can attest that each and every one of them knew that they could choose between leaving their money to our Endowment Foundation or leaving it directly to the church. Over and over people made the choice to leave it directly to the church knowing that it would ensure that the community survived intact with some staffing to continue to minister to the spiritual, emotional and intellectual growth of future wondering religious liberals.

Now having said that let me say that I believe deeply in churches having Endowment funds and I think our Endowment has done a great service to our church and the larger community with its grants large and small over the years to specific projects and specific charities. However, the actual purpose of an Endowment Fund is to be a rainy day fund for a church that runs into difficulties sustaining its services to members and the wider world. In the unlikely event that a church can't keep operating and refuses to use its Endowment money to revitalize itself, money left in that fund reverts to the Unitarian Universalist Association. So there could conceivably be a scenario in which a church closes its door and has a million or even two million in an Endowment fund. While we don't have nearly that kind of money in any of our funds, it is important for all our voting members to understand the implications of being unwilling to use capital funds to keep a community alive. I know no one wants our movement to not be here for future generations. I recommend putting both the church itself and the Endowment fund in your will and as a beneficiary for your life insurance or retirement funds. A gift of even \$5,000 could help pay a staff salary for a year . I invite you to become a committed UU like Carl Zingale, Ruth Waskey, Bill Rush, Shala Ranjbaran, Rey and Jennie Hyde who keep on giving long after their physical presence is no longer visible. Also none of these people tried to control the community from beyond the grave by putting any stipulations on how their money should be spent. This is just my personal view and I welcome folks with a different perspective to write their own article for the Journey.

When you see me, ask me what I had for dinner the night before. I hope I can say, "Lentil Soup".

A major figure in the 80's folk renaissance of Greenwich Village, Rod MacDonald is a prolific communicator well known for his passionate interest in the events that shape our world's societies. Influenced by songwriters Phil Ochs, Richard Farina and Bob Dylan, and his own background in journalism and law, Rod is not afraid to get political, take chances and ask tough questions. 

Help Our Partners in Japan

As the news from Japan worsens, I send my heartfelt sympathies to all those struggling to cope with this terrible disaster.

As the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) president, I traveled to Japan last August to meet with our religious partners



As soon as the UUA received word of the tragedies of Friday, March 11, we reached out to our religious partners in Japan: Rissho Kosei-kai, Tsubaki Grand Shrine, the Konko Church of Izuo, the Tokyo Dojin Church, and the Japan Chapter of the International Association for Religious Freedom. We have worked in close partnership with these outstanding organizations for many decades, and have been in contact with them since Friday. I can only imagine the overwhelming sadness and fear they are experiencing, even as they try to determine their next steps.

To this end, the UUA/Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) Japan Relief Fund has been established to support the recovery efforts of our religious partners in Japan, as they consider the specific efforts to take to support the work of recovery. I encourage anyone wishing to contribute to this crucial effort to read more about the UUA/UUSC Japan Relief Fund here.

For several months, the Rev. Eric Cherry, the UUA's Director of International Resources, has had a trip to Japan scheduled for later this month. The situation on the ground is still extremely volatile, but as I write this, Eric intends to make the trip if at all possible. If he is able to make the journey, he will convey my sincere condolences and profound hope for swift recovery on behalf of the entire Unitarian Universalist Association.

We at the UUA will hold the country of Japan in our hearts, as we work to support them in their time of great need.


