When they knew they were moving, the church was their first thought of where to donate their furniture. They told me, whatever the church needs, to please take it—for free!



Rev. Susan's Space

One of the most memorable days of my life was when I entered a room in the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston in 1976 and was confronted with the massive painting by Paul Gauguin entitled in a corner of the canvas "D'où venons nous? Que sommes-nous? Où allons-nous?" Or as the chant in our teal hymnal translates it, "Where do we come from? What are we? Where are we going?" It is 4'6" tall and 12'3" wide and crowded with Tahitian figures representing infancy, childhood, youth, householders and sages. Gauguin said of it, "I believe that this canvas not only surpasses all my preceding ones, but [also] that I shall never do anything better, or even like it."




These were his questions in 1897, and they are still ours today. As we embark on our developmental ministry, our Director of Religious Education, our Board of Trustees and I propose that this be the theme for this first year of our work together. We have many engaging activities planned for all ages to explore our identity personally, demographically and culturally and to use this knowledge as a launching point to envision the difference we wish to make in the world around us.


We will begin with identifying 3-5 shared values that inspire and empower our lives individually and together. What will they be? Once we've identified these values, we will spend some time exploring what we mean when we invoke these high purposes. What is love, peace or justice to us where we are at this time? We will sing about them, celebrate holidays in honor of them, learn from world religions and human experience what others have thought about them. This is great work for artists, dreamers, philosophers and makers of all kinds. At the same time, we will be studying our "ministry field" and learning about the city around us, the natural world that supports us and our own lives. Where do we live, and where are we "from?" What are the deeply felt concerns of our neighbors, and with whom can we partner to work on these issues? These are good tasks for the curious, the scientists, the sociologist and even the busybody. I can't wait to see what we will discover together.



In the winter of 2013, right after his twin boys were born, John John Brown started writing songs that would turn into his debut album "The Road", and Brown's live acoustic performances of the album have garnered much critical acclaim. In May of last year, he was chosen as a 2015 Kerrville Folk Finalist for the legendary "New Folk" competition, and in January of 2016 he went home a winner of the prestigious South Florida Folk Festival Songwriting Contest. Seeped in good storytelling and fingerpicking melodies, John John Brown seems to have discovered part of the mystery that surrounds the great singer/songwriter tradition. "The Road" was just released in the Spring of 2016.

If Joni Mitchell and Gordon Lightfoot had a love child, raised with the help of godmothers Judy Collins and Maria Muldaur, surely this is how singer/songwriter Kirsten Maxwell got her start. A listen to her voice and turn-of-phrase/lyrics, and these luminaries will be brought to mind. A prolific songwriter, Kirsten was awarded first place in a contest sponsored by the Rhode Island Songwriters Association. (RISA) and opened for Michael Johnson in concert in November. She was selected for a coveted slot in the Suzi Wollenberg Folk DJ Showcase at the 2015 Northeast Regional Folk Alliance (NERFA) Conference. Kirsten was also named a winner of the 2016 South Florida Folk Festival Singer Songwriter Competition, and will return in January 2017 to perform on the festival's main stage. Kirsten released her debut album this year. A compilation of eleven original songs on love and longing, "Crimson" is the kind of album you embrace when it's time to let go.





Jacksonville, FL singer/songwriter Larry Mangum has nearly 3000 performances over 4 decades as a folk, rock, country and Americana artist. A Floridian since 1970, known for his butter smooth voice, Larry has released 10 albums of original music and 2 live albums since 1980. An award winning songwriter, Larry writes from a keen sense of observation and experience capturing the moments that reveal the human truths that bind us all together. An evening of Larry's songs is an emotional roller coaster touching the heart, the mind and the soul that stays with the listener long after the performance. Larry makes regular appearances at the Florida Folk Festival (featured performer in 2010), the Will McLean Festival (featured performer 2010), the South Florida Folk Festival, the Sarasota Folk Festival, the Gamble Rogers Folk Festival, Barberville, the Lake County Folk Festival, Riverhawk and many more.

BOLD Justice Listening Process: Sacred ConversationsSharing of ourselves to be part of something bigger than ourselves

After my father passed away, I fell into a deep depression and had a nervous breakdown. It wasn't until my sister made me get medical treatment that I got better. And if she hadn't, I don't think I'd be here today. When I tried to get treatment, I struggled to find care I could afford. It was \$175 per appointment and I couldn't pay that on my own. My sister was able to put me on her insurance, which covered four appointments, and then my doctor helped me get care by being part of a case study.

This is my story, and I share it with you to explain why I am part of the justice ministry. As UUs, we have 7 principles that guide our beliefs and our work.

I want to talk about two in particular and how they relate to my story:

1st Principle: The inherent worth and dignity of every person. 2nd Principle: Justice, equity and compassion in human relations



Both of these principles call us to be concerned with our neighbors. The first principle asks us to recognize the inherent value and worth of every person we meet. My sister and the doctor saw my individual worth and treated me with dignity.

Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations, however, point us toward something beyond inherent worth and dignity. While it is good that my sister and my doctor acted in my interest, our responsibility doesn't end with just helping one person in need. The 2nd principle points us to the larger community. It gets at collective responsibility. It reminds us that treating people as human beings is not simply something we do one-on-one, but something that has systemic implications and can inform our entire cultural way of being.

Justice means we should be holding our mental health care system accountable to ensure everyone has access to the care they need, and no one finds themselves in the situation I was in—deeply in need of care but without access to it.

Compassion is something that we can easily act on individually. We can demonstrate openness, give people respect, and treat people with kindness on our own. But we need one another to achieve equity and justice. On our own, we cannot change the healthcare system to provide care to everyone who needs it, or stop unnecessary arrests of children, or make sure that housing is affordable for all families in our community.

We need to work together to achieve justice. As a single person or a single church, we simply don't have the power. But when we work together with other concerned people in our community, we can build the power necessary to confront our leaders and bring justice, equity and compassion to all of our relationships.

This September17, we will be embarking on a Listening Journey at UUCFL. I will host a House Meeting along with Rev. Susan and Betty Brantley, and invite UUs to come and share your stories and journeys. Choose to attend one of the two sessions at 3:00pm or 7:00pm.

What is worrying you? What's going on in your own life? Through this process, we will begin to create community and build relationships. And through those relationships, we will build our capacity to solve what's ailing us and create a more just, harmonious community where every individual can be treated with dignity and respect. I hope you will join us as we begin this journey.

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




