

Remembering Well

I have closed down more than a few bars in my wild 1960's youth and I have certainly been the last to leave a party on quite a few occasions but only once or twice in my life have I closed down a funeral or Memorial Service. One such occasion happened last month at the amazing Celebration of Life that we had for Susan "Sunny" Goldenberg. Because Sunny had been loved by so many of us and because she had had a huge impact on our church becoming a more open and welcoming community, I really wanted to honor her memory, make her family happy and provide a space for people to remember Sunny as we had known her at the



church. It turned into an event like no other. Her four children and most of the grandchildren participated. Her Uncle Jim told stories of Sunny as a child for which you simply had to be there to imagine the laughter that was evoked. Ira read the words they had used in a renewal of their wedding vows that they had done after her cancer was diagnosed and there was not a dry eye in the house. It was a day of tears, laughter, stories, feasting, new friends made and new understandings achieved. We in the church learned much we had not known about Sunny as a young wife, as a mother raising four lively children on a country homestead where they raised food, took care of animals and had a sort of back to the land existence.

Her family got to know a great deal more about the woman we knew as "Sunny" who came into our lives and changed them in such positive ways. We all stayed much longer than one normally does at a memorial service reception. True the family provided us with a wonderful and tastefully laid out banquet of food and it was a mild evening so we were able to sit down on the patio and have a serious time eating and chatting. But it felt like much more than that. It really was as if Sunny was gracing us once more with her presence and making us all stay late, eat up, share stories and build community.

The event reminded me once again of how very vital it is to ritualize rites of passage and important moments in our lives. Some people who are not part of a traditional religious community say that they want no service or event to mark their passing, and some families and partners make promises to this effect, and despite the toll on them emotionally they feel obliged to honor the requests of their loved one. I don't know how often I have counseled the surviving partner or family that the departed really should not have a say in the matter. The ritual or memorial service or celebration of life is for those left behind so that in the words of UU minister Rev. Sarah York we can begin the processing of "remembering well." The typical UU memorial service starts a healing process by letting us hear the funny stories, the honest stories and finding new ways to know the person we lost. Please do your loved ones a huge favor and never say anything like " oh, I don't want anyone to make a fuss. Don't spend your money on a funeral or memorial service." They need to have this service because it is a first step to what is called "good grief." Without ritual we can be stuck in unresolved grief for years. Let your survivors have a send off that makes people want to stay and close the place down.

We also won't attract any new kids. Children bring

If we want our faith to lead the way toward a peaceful future, we need kids who will lead it. Our religion is one that has so much to offer-we need to get the folks here so we can offer it to them. Even though it is not part of who we are generally, let's start getting evangelical. Tell folks what a great minister, music, adult RE, children's RE, building and grounds, and of course, food that we have here. How can they resist?

Nominations for Endowment Fund Trustees Solicited

The Trustees of the Endowment Fund Inc.(EFI) will have two openings for Trustee this May. Any UUCFL member who wishes to be put on the ballot for the May Congregational Meeting must submit to an EFI Board member a "written petition signed by at least one (1) voting member delivered to an Endowment Trustee at least twenty (20) days prior to the date of the Annual Meeting." A "voting member" refers to a UUCFL member meeting the church's requirement of voting members. "Voting members may nominate themselves."

Particularly welcome are UUCFL members who have a keen interest in investments and in having input to EFI's charitable disbursements. In the meantime the nominating committee (composed of the Rev. Gail Tapscott, President Ken Beier, and Finance Chair Douglas Paul) "shall prior to the Annual Meeting of the members nominate two (2) persons each for the two (2) positions" open on EFI Board of Trustees.



March 7 – What Is Your Religious Literacy Quotient?- Rev. Gail will ask us to assess how equipped we really are to face a world of staggering religious pluralism. Between the God's Favor brand of Christianity and the almost oppressive affirmations of some New Age modes of thought any kind of pessimistic thinking has had bad PR lately. Rev. Gail will use this sermon to explain to us why she chose to be a Unitarian Universalist rather than a Unity minister.

March 21- A Visit To Spoon River- Today's service will be based on an idea of Rev. Gail's that has been picked up and facilitated by Taylor Mattis. It will be presented as a reader's theatre piece. There is a little bit of Spoon River in the Ft. Lauderdale church and every community. Come and hear how these timeless poems from the fictional town of Spoon River mirror our own stories. **March 28- The Day After Passover**- We all love the story of the escape from Egypt by the Hebrews but we don't always hear so much about the long 40 years in the desert before reaching the Promised Land. Today Rev. Gail will try to unpack some lessons of that wilderness period that might be of use to Unitarian Universalist and others today.

April 4- Resurrections Galore- Rev. Gail will share on this Easter Day why she does not believe that Jesus literally rose from the dead but that she can understand how his disciples did believe it. She will discuss some of the many views about an afterlife.
