

Reframing Church for the Future

A member asked me on a recent Sunday if I didn't feel that our community had a different feel about it recently. My reply was that the culture and atmosphere of a congregation is always in flux. When I first began to serve this community almost 14 years ago, we had a fairly large number of families with children under 12. We also had a large and very active contingent of LGBTQA folk who were just coming off the high of helping UUCFL become an official welcoming congregation. We also had a significant number of childless couples with both partners active.

Over the years most of those original kids became young adults and the upcoming generation of young families did not seem to find our congregation in large numbers. We still have a significant number of members from the LGBTQA community but since so many of them became involved in running the



whole church, specifically focused social functions and activism sank into the background for a long time. Now Interweave is back. While we still have an active Covenant of UU Pagans group here, the other theological affinity groups have not been functioning for a while. We once had active UU Christian, UU Buddhist and UU Humanist groups here.

Two other demographic changes I have notice over the years are more and more single people joining us and more and more folks who have spouses or partners that don't find church involvement to be important to them. Still another shift I have noticed is that more of our retired members and friends are younger, more prone to travel a great deal and therefore attend services less frequently. Also the number of members and friends from a range of racial, ethnic, educational and economic situations has increased significantly. All of these changes are really positive and exciting but they do create a very different set of needs for a religious community. These changes have had an impact of our level of financial support and the number of people with large blocks of time available to volunteer for church duties. Yet another factor I am aware of is due to the economic situation we have all been faced with in the last five years or so. More and more people are working longer hours, working extra jobs or even working on Sunday. These factors also affect our bank of time, talent and treasure.

On another front, our Sunday attendance is sometimes affected because people attend a Vespers Service, an Adult Religious Education class, a Labyrinth Cafe Concert or participate in some type of church related social justice activity during the week. Therefore they feel they have already had their UUCFL fix as it were by Sunday. The end result of all these changes is that while still being a welcoming, diverse, intellectually stimulating and friendly haven, our church looks and feels very different than it once did. I am sure I missed out several important trends and changes but I think I have addressed several new frames through which we need to understand our spiritual home. I welcome more conscious group and leadership discussions on these and other changes you have noticed and the development of creative ways to respond to these changes to keep UUCFL a thriving place long into the future.





Budget Challenges



Other folks may be writing something about our Stewardship campaign or budget challenges but I feel a minister's perspective is also called for. We have lost several of our highest donors in the last three or four years. This small group of people often accounted for almost a quarter

of our pledge revenue. Without them, we are in a challenging situation. Even with greatly increased rental income coming from our two large church renters and small groups, and the fact that we no longer are paying an administrative salary we are still in a major deficit situation. I offered to work a 4/5 time schedule last year which also saved the church \$10,000. Even with all these changes, our pledged income is just not enough to support a healthy church. If you involved with the church at any level and want us to be here, please consider increasing your pledge, making a pledge or offering some services that may save the church a significant amount of money. We are blessed with a legacy fund which will enable us to continue function more or less as we are for a few years. However, as our church Treasurer Benny Rivera has pointed out we really need a long range financial and growth plan for our church home.





Kwanzaa this year. The concept of Kwanzaa is rooted in the ancient African tradition of the 'first-fruit harvest'. The model stresses the cooperative creation, gathering and sharing of good, gratitude for the bountifulness and beauty of the world and the commitment to protect and preserve the earth as



both a source of life and site of the sacred.

Kwanzaa was created by Dr. Maulana Karenga who introduced seven Principles or the Nguzo Saba: Umoja (Creativity); Kujichagulia (Self-Determination); Ujima (Collective Work and Responsibility); Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics); Nia (Purpose); Kuumba (Creativity) and Imani (Faith). Racial Caste System in the U.S.? - Two Part Series

The program is open to the public and is free.

Part 1 - Sunday, December 2 at 1:00pm - Free Film and Discussion

Civil rights lawyer and legal scholar Michelle Alexander argues that we have not ended racial caste in the USA but have simply redesigned it. Primarily by targeting black men through the War on Drugs, the US criminal justice system functions as a contemporary system of racial control. We will be showing, "Broken on All Sides: Race, Mass Incarceration & New Visions for Criminal Justice in the U.S.", a documentary by Matthew Pillischer that features interviews with Professor Alexander and others. The movie dissects the role of mass incarceration in the U.S. and explores possible reforms and solutions to ending mass incarceration and this new racial caste system. A discussion will follow.



Part 2 - Thursday, December 6 at 7:00pm - Review of Michelle Alexander's The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness. The New Press, 2010.

The majority of young black men in American cities are locked behind bars or labeled as felons for life. Jim Crow laws were wiped off the book decades ago but today an astounding percentage of the African American community is housed in prisons or trapped in a permanent, second class status – much like their grandparents, who lived in an explicit system of control.

In this incisive critique, civil rights lawyer-turned-legal scholar Michelle Alexander argues that we have not ended racial caste in the US; we have simply redesigned it. She shows that, by targeting black men through the War on Drugs and decimating communities of color, the US criminal justice system functions as a contemporary system of racial control.

Alexander challenges the civil rights community and all of us to place mass incarceration at the forefront of a new movement for racial justice in America.

Discussants: Rebecca Doggett and Joseph Thomasburger are life-long activists and leaders with the Undoing Racism Committee of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation at Montclair, New Jersey which addresses mass incarceration and immigration reform. Rebecca recently retired as Senior Fellow of the New Jersey Institute



for Social Justice a non-profit research and advocacy organization. She previously held responsible positions with the Newark Public Schools, the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey and Tri City Peoples Corporation. She was the first Director of the Essex County Department of Citizen Services and has been involved in early childhood care and education for many years. She had been the board chair of the national Center for Community Change and had been active with Newark-Essex Congress of Racial Equality in the 1960s. Joe Thomasberger is a retired clergyman as well as a retired executive of non-profit organizations. His community work included the operation of a multi-service organization based in Newark, New Jersey that provided housing, child care and protective services to low income families. He was also instrumental in organizing a coalition of 50 community based child care organizations that negotiated service contracts with the Newark Public Schools and the NJ Department of Education that significantly raised salaries for low income workers.
