Rev. Susan's Space

Silence is often the best that can be done. Our Transcendentalist "Uncle" Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote something that I have embroidered on one of my clerical stoles as a reminder to me about my relative importance in the scheme of worship: "I like the silent church before the service begins, better than any preaching." As a public speaker, I know that people remember what comes directly after a silence. I'm frequently encouraged by those who wish that the congregation would be silent during the musical interludes of the services to hush and admonish the assembly more firmly and more often. Silence is golden, as many an engraved sign above a library door will tell you.



When I think of silence as the best that can be done, I think of the story of Job in the Hebrew scriptures. Job is a prosperous and pious man with successful grown children, a loving wife, much property, and societal respect. In the course of the story, he loses all his property and his children are all killed. Still he will not curse God even though his wife begs him to do so and loses her respect for him when he will not. Finally, he is afflicted with a horrible skin disease and sits on an ash heap in despair. Three of his friends come from nearby lands to visit him. When they see the condition of Job, they cry and wail and tear at their clothing in shared despair before they approach him; however...

The first thing that these friends do in the face of all that Job is going through is sit with him seven days and nights in silent vigil to his pain. Who can be so restrained and so wise? Perhaps you, like I, know that you would very quickly try to find something helpful or comforting to say in the same circumstances. Ask questions? Try to come to an understanding of what has happened and why? Offer platitudes? Advice? Stories from your own life? Who can take the time to be profoundly silent and wait and experience the pain and discomfort without talking it away? I go back and back to this teaching story from the Jewish tradition to try to learn this restraint.

As a consultant, I was expected to and rewarded for quickly diagnosing the problems of congregations and offering possible solutions. It is the model of Western medicine: Diagnose a disease; prescribe a medicine. Consultants get rewarded for this behavior, so it is a hard habit to break. I have found (and struggle to practice) that it is wiser to take your time and observe a church, sit with its pain and its joy, watch what it turns toward like a sunflower, notice what makes it wilt and what makes it bloom. Using not a medical but an agricultural model, we seek to know not only what the church appears to be doing but also what nourishment the world receives from the doing. As we approach the annual meeting on May 20, many of the actions that I had thought would be ready by this time are not in place. I hope you and I can be patient with the process.





Interview of UUA President Featured in Online Religious Journal NO TIME FOR CASUAL FAITH: THE FIRST UNITARIAN WOMAN ELECTED PRESIDENT ON OUR URGENT MOMENT

As an activist local minister in Phoenix, Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray was deeply immersed in fighting ICE deportations when, in 2016, she entered the race for president of the Unitarian Universalist Association. In June of last year she became the ninth UUA president and the first woman elected to the position during a fraught time for the progressive body, which has long been a leader in every significant human rights struggle...

You have said that this is "no time for casual faith." Can you unpack how you frame the urgency of the present moment in the United States?

For too many people, for too many families, the urgency of this moment is literally about life and death. Families are being broken up, young students are being shot down in their own schools, Black people continue to be vulnerable to extra-judicial police killing, and a militant and unapologetic white supremacy is on the upsurge... Looming over all this is also the lurch toward authoritarianism and the blatant corruption of our institutions under the Trump administration, with the intentional targeted redistribution of wealth from the lower and middle class to the wealthy.

Language and meaning are being degraded in precisely the ways George Orwell prophesied...

We in the UUA are clear about our core commitment to the dignity of all people—that's our touchstone.

But the challenge for us, as for all people of faith, is putting that commitment into everyday practice. And here I don't just mean activism and advocacy but also the indispensable practice of showing loving kindness and generosity toward one another as we struggle together toward a different kind of society.

The Sanctuary air conditioning system has been completely replaced as the old one suffered complete catastrophic failure. We appreciated your patience as much research needed to be done into all of the options and availability of equipment, plus approval for the chosen system by the city. We didn't want to just swap out one system for another and be faced with the same problem shortly down the road. A world of thanks to Doug Friend for taking on this humongous task. Also thanks to those who made special donations to help fund this large ticket project including the IBS Church who rents from us.



We are working on several other projects around the building. You may notice one colorful improvement in the tower entryway as Bob Zumstein has completely refreshed the Chalice tile mosaic. The remainder of the front patio will be repaired and refinished and there will be large planters placed at the driveway to enhance the curb appeal as people approach the building. Many thanks to Janine Griffiths and all who attended our special Earth Day work day. So many things needing doing were completed around our beautiful grounds.

Sound system equipment has been ordered. We will be combining some of the still good components from our current system with some pieces from the Labyrinth Café system and some new and updated equipment to create a system that will be versatile for many uses in the sanctuary. Acoustic panels have been created to baffle the sound from bouncing about the room and we thank our members and friends for heading up that project. Shortly our world religion banners will return along with some new banners carrying UU messages. We are also shopping new sanctuary and classroom doors and we thank the new Daytime Group for their help in gathering information and preparing to meet with people during the day, which is a challenge for many of us on B&G. Once again we invite you to please lend a hand, especially on workdays, to help make our church home even more beautiful.


