I really felt in those few hours at David's service (which he had directed with Reverend Gail when he was ill) that we were experiencing his last gift to us. All of the volunteers who helped to serve the meal and clean up afterwards were so enthusiastic and tireless. I remember everyone being joyful while at the same time, missing our friend. We all gratefully embraced the spirit of his generous gift as a community that loved him well.

Consider helping out on the Finance Committee, Human Resources Committee, Sunday Service Committee, Membership Committee, Building and Grounds and the Caring Committee. In a season where we are starting to think about what we are grateful for, I find myself in the position of soul searching about why I often feel that I am never satisfied. While I feel that I enjoy and am grateful for all the emotional and physical gifts of my life, I realize that I frequently feel that I always crave more in situations where I should just be happy with what I have.

As many of you know I had a great time in Santa Fe this summer, taking a class on Hawthorne, doing a tutorial on <u>The Magic Mountain</u> by Thomas Mann (a book I have been trying to read for over 30 years). I spent time working on some of my personal writing projects, visiting with friends in the area and just enjoying the wonderful spiritual

energy of the high southwest desert. By any definition I was blessed. So many people barely get a week off and often have to spend it at home doing life maintenance stuff. Then just recently, I spent a week in Washington, D.C. which is kind of my own personal Emerald City. Normally, I spend more time there each year but this summer, I just could not pull a trip together for some reason. Suddenly, at the end of September I started feeling that I just would not be able to go forward for the rest of the year without a little fix of D.C. I had not been there in autumn for maybe 20 years and it was amazing. The air was cool and crisp and there was a lot going on. I went to an amazing play at the Studio Theatre which used to be almost a living room theatre and now has a great building and two stages. It is located in a newly hot area called Logan Circle which is an area around 14th St. When I used to live there it would have been risking your life to walk down this area of the street. Now it is full of great eating options, bars and coffee shops and the biggest Whole Foods store I have ever seen.

So much of D.C. looks very different from what I remember but I always feel so energized when I am there. I feel like I have almost a personal relationship with the city as a whole. There are memories on every street corner and I always feel like there are more memories to be made. Whenever, I leave I feel a strange grief as if I should never have left. I always love seeing my friends but in some ways it is the city itself that is the draw. I love the different flavor of each neighborhood- the charm of Georgetown, the amazing ethnic mix of Adams Morgan and the youthful associations I have with DuPont Circle. I always leave wanting more. It makes me feel a little guilty but in the end, I guess that the feeling of wanting more is what makes me feel young and full of energy at an age when some of my friends seem to have little passion for life. I am wondering if feeling the tension between being grateful and always wanting more is something to apologize for or celebrate. It would be awful to find myself with nothing else I wanted to see, experience, feel or have. I think I will just keep wanting more. I hope that this season you both feel grateful and want more.





The Swerve: How the World Became Modern

by Stephen Greenblatt (ISBN: 0393064476) One of the world's most celebrated scholars, Stephen Greenblatt has crafted both an innovative work of history and a thrilling story of discovery, in which one manuscript, plucked from a thousand years of neglect, changed the course of human thought and made possible the world as we know it. The copying and translation of

this ancient book--the greatest discovery of the greatest book-hunter of his age--fueled the Renaissance, inspiring artists such as Botticelli and thinkers such as Giordano Bruno; shaped the thought of Galileo and Freud, Darwin and Einstein; and had a revolutionary influence on writers such as Montaigne and Shakespeare and even Thomas Jefferson.

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District Executive Message

"How can we live in a world partly prosperous and mostly miserable?"

~ Wm. Sloane Coffin

Most people are not facile when it comes to discussing economics. I am among them. However, most grasp readily the idea of economic justice.

You don't need a PhD nor espouse socialism to know there is something basically, morally wrong with the increasing concentration of wealth and income to ever fewer people in the last generation. The emerging "Occupy" movement taps into that sense of unfairness, especially that those who were most directly responsible for the Great Recession have prospered by the various bail-outs given (at taxpayer expense!) to Wall Street. Curiously, it is the same resentment felt by supporters of the Tea Party.

Is this a religious issue? Yes, given that one's religious life attempts to address the large questions of how we are together in the human family. Our faith, Unitarian Universalism, long has been concerned that many suffer miserably while a few prosper. Social justice always gets around to economic justice. How can anyone defend a few having far too much and many having far too little? This is anathema to the social implications of Universalism, where every person matters ultimately. (Quick theologic aside: you can defend the status quo only if you are a Calvinist, believing that your "having" is a sign of your being right with God, being chosen, and those "not having" are deserving of their fate.)

Our UUA has not had an opportunity to discuss how our faith might address the "Occupy" movement. No doubt, it will be among our conversations at **"Justice GA"** in Phoenix next June. Meanwhile, I call your attention to a recent letter from our UUA President, Peter Morales, (see:http://www.uua.org/news/pressroom/pressreleases/188405.shtml) in which he notes:

"Unitarian Universalism embodies a long tradition of working for economic justice and workers' rights. Today is another opportunity for us to live our faith, and the Occupy protests are a first step on the road to repairing our country.

"I reach out to Unitarian Universalists everywhere to consider how you might be of service to any among us who are struggling to provide for their families, those who have been cheated and abused by financial institutions, and all those whose backs ache under a burden of debt, unemployment, and fading hope. Let the world see the power of our faith in action."

To pursue this conversation further in your congregation, take a look at the resources available at uua.org as well as Unitarian Universalists for Economic Justice (http://www.uujec.org/). I welcome hearing from you of the ways your congregation is engaged in economic justice work. Please send me a note; I'll be glad to share your information with others who may be eager to partner with you.
