If that brought to mind horrible images of paper cut perils, perhaps you can avail yourself of some of the other projects around our building instead. Our first challenge is to identify the different purposes and uses for each room (for ourselves and our renters) to make them as comfortable as possible and increase their efficiency.

Creative Sacrifice

This time of year as we end a period of reflecting on our lost loved ones (Halloween and All Souls), being grateful for our blessings (Thanksgiving) and move to considering the rebirth of wonder, peace and newness into our lives (Christmas, Hanukkah and New Years), we need to reflect honestly on what we are willing to offer and indeed perhaps sacrifice to keep our religious community alive, viable and welcoming. How many places are there in your life where you can bring all of who you are to the table? Many of us have families who are problematic and even the healthiest of families aren't always approving of all the choices we make in our lives. Most of us find ourselves in workplaces or living spaces where we are forced to be a bit closeted as it were in some way. Perhaps we have to hide something major about or identity like our sexual identity, or our religious or political identity. Other times we just need to dress differently or present ourselves in ways that may seem a tad phony to us.



While certainly not always achieving this as fully as we would like, at its best Unitarian Universalism in general and UUCFL in particular strive to be a place where you can show up and bring all of who you are- your strangeness, your confusion, your lack of success, your tremendous success, your doubts, your insecurities and your contradictions. This is a pretty great gift. What are you willing to do and to sacrifice to make sure that we are always here and equipped to continue providing this sanctuary to those already there and those still trying to find it?

By fulfilling your pledge of support from last year and offering up your generous and sacrificial pledge of financial and hands on support for 2012 you are making the world a better place for yourself and others.

We have already lost our administrative support position this year. If we don't come much closer to our goal for 2012 pledges you may lose some portion of your ministerial services as well. Some churches manage pretty well for a while with reduced staffing services but the toll on volunteer energy is tremendous and eventually leads to total burn out. This congregation has always been very staff dependent and I have so far seen no trends in a different direction. I am happy to continue serving you in a slightly reduced time capacity for a time but I cannot offer full services if I am not compensated at a full time rate. I encourage all of you to submit your pledge forms if you have not yet done so and to try to pay as much of last's year's pledge as you are able. Then please plan ahead to attend the Jan. 15 Budget meeting to express your views about honoring the congregation's stated goal of maintaining excellent Sunday offerings as the main congregational priority. I believe we have the power to create the future we want.



District Executive Message



Whew! Are you getting dizzy by the whirlwind of events: The European Zone in crisis, Occupy Wall Street is now Occupy Everywhere, Alabama surpasses Arizona for mindless immigration legislation, and Florida is still near the top when it comes to foreclosures. What's it all mean? Is there any good news?

As Unitarian poet, Wordsworth, summed it up: "The world is too much with us, late and soon." I am bewildered. How do I live my Unitarian Universalist values in this maelstrom of worry? Well, there is good news: I have this community of faith to sustain me, to challenge me, to guide me. Together, truly, we are stronger!

Of late, I am looking to Cooking Together: Recipes for Immigration Justice Work, a project of our UUA (See: http://immigrationjustice.blogs.uua.org/). This page is designed to help us think about justice issues together. Your postings are welcome.

The other day, I came across this faith-filled prayer by the Rev. Parisa Parsa (Milton, MA.), offered at the Unitarian Universalist Vespers service at Occupy Boston on October 16. It lifted my heart. Perhaps it will touch yours. In part, she said:

"It is a thing of beauty to see people coming together across political persuasions and ages and ethnicity and just about everything else in order to say: we are all in the same boat and we are not about to let it sink! This is our world. Let's make it whole together. "We are the 99%" is the slogan of this movement. But our faith calls us to know deep in our bones what it means to be 100%.

100% born from a thread of goodness and hope that is woven through 100% of beings on this planet.

- 100% able to see and cultivate that goodness in ourselves and each other.
- 100% the ones in whose hands this world rests.
- 100% infused with the power of divine love, forgiveness, grace.
- 100% of us are destined for the arms of a love that knows no limit.
- 100% of us were born and offered the breath of life from a source we cannot fully name."

The centrifugal forces at work in our society are born of greed and ignorance. They are sustained by fear and indifferent hearts. There is good news: Our faith calls us to be the ones who can love universally and to work so that all, all!, are treated justly and given an equal opportunity to thrive. Human forces created many of the ills that worry our nights. And human hands can work to change that in the hope of our days. This is ministry.

Reverend Parsa concludes:

"100% of us hold the power to turn the ship around, to mend its leaks, and repair its sails to set it right again. We need all our stories, all our hearts, all our spirits, all our anger and frustration, all our hope and laughter to make it new. Let us be together. 100%."
