From Your Board President

Our church is entering the time of year when discussions about stewardship and the budget are happening regularly. What approach to stewardship will we use this year? How can we generate enthusiasm and promote greater pledges? We are fortunate to have Jeff Hutt lead the committee on Stewardship to help answer these questions. He brings a fresh perspective on how to lead our stewardship campaign and how we can stimulate the process with creative ideas. See his article on page 8.

We are using a more holistic approach to budgeting this year, focusing on programs rather than just line items. Last year, the congregation voted on the drawing down of \$50,000 from our Legacy Fund. This amount covers almost one third of the church expense. For the Board to be fiscally responsible in our decisions, we have to consider avenues of reducing costs where they can be made while mitigating negative impact on Sunday Service. The Board of Trustees recently voted to eliminate the position of Office Administrator. This decision was not made lightly. The Board thanks Sandy Walker for her many years of service with UUCFL. We hope that she will continue to regard the church as her spiritual home.

For more information about our financial standing, please read our Treasurer's article on page 5. The information that Douglas Paul shares in the article is important information for every church member to read.

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Rev. Gail's Space

Change and Continuity

It is the fall season, the start of the long holiday period and a time of change in the world, in the country, in the Unitarian Universalist movement and in our congregation. Change is unsettling for everyone. However, like death and taxes it is one of the inevitable aspects of life. Change happens by chance and by choice. Any change brings a series of consequences. The world economic and political climate has been in a roller coaster mode for the last few years. The political swings and personal loyalties of voters have been changing every two years in the U.S. as people take out their very understandable frustrations on politicians.

Our UU movement has been changing a great deal in the past couple of years with a new President Rev. Peter Morales, who much like President Obama, came in full of ideas for change and growth and encountered a catastrophic financial situation within our denomination that has put many sacred cows on the table. Both UU seminaries have been in a constant state of flux, there has been talk of selling much of the historic UU property on Beacon Street in Boston and the structure of the UUA staff and board has been going through drastic changes. Many long term and hardworking



staff people have been laid off or reassigned. Here at UUCFL we have long lived with considerable budget deficits. It is important for all church members to know that it is considered unsustainable and dangerous for a church to operate on a budget where less than 60% of the money needed for the operating budget comes directly from the financial pledges of the members and friends. For several years, UUCFL has barely been raising enough money in pledges to pay the minister's salary. Indeed this year, I was so concerned about our huge deficit that I volunteered to put \$4,000 of my financial package back in the budget. Director of Religious Education, Susan Friend likewise sacrificed a piece of her salary as DRE. Her compensation as choir director is already barely an honorarium. The board recently made a very difficult decision to function without the administrative position in an effort to be able to offer a more realistic budget for the future.

I suspect more savings will be needed. I am in the process of discerning whether I could manage to live on less than a full time salary as your minister. Whether that is my decision or the congregation's decision depends on your response to our upcoming stewardship campaign. If the congregation can increase its financial commitment we can clearly have more services. If not, clearly the community will have to live without some services we have grown to feel entitled to. I know many of you have never known the church without Sandy Walker in the office. Others of you have been here long enough to recall other Administrators and also know there have been two lengthy periods in the last 10 years when we have had no one in the office. Sandy has been a helpful and comforting presence to many of you and the continuity her role provided will be missed.

However, we will survive this change and any others that may arise. Congregations are amazingly resilient and a crisis can also bring out new talents, energy and commitments. Some of the office duties like email, replying to phone messages and some scheduling tasks will fall to me in the short term. The existing staff and I will provide some hours of office presence but in order to move to having more office coverage for deliveries, pickups, answering the phone in person etc. we plan to put together and train a volunteer team. Many other administrative tasks will be divided up into small pieces and can be handled by individuals. Already much of the financial work that is often covered by staff in larger churches is being handled by hardworking volunteers. Several hundred small UU Fellowships survive with no paid staff at all. While I hope that is never the case here, it is amazing what these small groups are sometimes capable of accomplishing.


We have new people joining us this year as members and friends. New gifts are coming into our midst and the future is always open. Blessings on our ability to weather change in a peaceful and constructive fashion.

Happy New Year! For those of you who are thinking "boy, she is really getting out of it" I have not lost two months. It is the beginning of the new year on the old Hebrew calendar and we are in the midst of the High Holy Days, which will lead to the Yom Kippur day of atonement. I think we could all do well to consider the concrete aspects of this time of year. For religious Jewish people, the first day of Rosh Hashanah is when God cracks open the book, takes a look at everyone's good and bad behavior, and perhaps, gives folks an opportunity to make amends. After a ten day period of

Are we, by our constant obsession with our I phones, TVs, computers and other gadgets, leaving those that we care about most without our attention and companionship? Are we neglecting our own spiritual lives in our attempt to be the best, have the best and do the most? I hope you will join me in this time of reflection, connection and renewal in trying to make the world just a bit better by sucking it up and saying those words that are so hard in any language, "I'm sorry", or "You were right", how about, "I will take care of that", and my favorite, "I was wrong".

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UUCFL Finance Notes



Throughout the year your Finance committee and Board is engaged in balancing ongoing church expenses with income. This can get especially difficult during the summer months, and towards the end of the church fiscal year. This year, income from pledges has been on-track –

thank you. But income from other sources like ongoing canvas, bingo, service auction, and rentals are below budget projections. It is only because of the substantial amount we access from the Legacy Fund that we are able to continue uninterrupted operation.

The Legacy Fund covers almost one third of church expenses. Even with this generous draw there is a concern that we would run out of funds to meet ongoing expenses as we close 2011. This concern obliged the Board to take proactive steps to avoid a crisis. Your Board decided to continue focus on Sunday activities - including congregation-expressed priorities of Music and Religious Education. The resulting cut in Administrative expenses should allow us to operate within our budget for this year. However, it might result in a reduction of some administrative services. Your voluntary and monetary assistance is appreciated as we continue to explore challenges through the end of this year. Please join the Finance committee meeting on 9/26

(Monday) and 10/24 (Monday) as well as the Budget 2012 workshop on 11/20 (Sunday) to share your ideas on getting our income to meet our expenses in 2012. Your thoughtful ideas are always welcome.

Adult RE Will Take A UU Look At The Bible

In conjunction with our all church focus on Bold Justice which is an Interfaith group comprised of mainly Christian and Jewish congregations, we are going to be offering a two part Adult Religious Education series on learning how to be conversant with aspects of the Hebrew and Christian scriptures with particular emphasis on



parts of them that argue for building a more just world. In the fall we will focus on the Jewish scriptures with particular attention to the prophets. In the winter months we will take a look at some of the ethical and justice teachings of the Christian scriptures. Hopefully, we will have some guest speakers or panels as well as looking at some readings and engaging in discussions. This will be facilitated by Rev. Gail. The fall series will begin on Tuesday Oct. 25 and run for six sessions. This is not your parents Bible study so come join us to get the real story on what your Jewish and Christian friends are hearing and thinking about their own teachings.

The classes will all begin at 7:00 p.m. and the suggested donation to the church will be \$35 for the six sessions. The series on the Christian scriptures will start in late January and run into early March.

Stewardship Will Follow The Yellow Brick Road



It is that time again. We are kicking off the 2012 Stewardship drive and our theme this year is going to be The Wizard of Oz, so keep your eyes peeled for Munchkins, Witches (not too uncommon for us at the UUCFL!) and apple throwing trees. This year we have decided to take a new approach to stewardship. Instead of trying to reach an x number of pledges we're going to ask the members to give a percentage of their total income. This will all be explained at a later time so as of now don't get caught up too much in the Math, just know that we're going to ask most of our members to give more.

Why are we taking this approach this year? It's very simple; each and every year we have been over budget and we have to keep drawing from the Legacy Fund to cover the shortfall. We have decided that this has got to stop and we need to reverse the ship now before we run through our entire Legacy Fund and have to institute a lottery – based upon a very complicated mathematical equation that takes into account age, total accumulated wealth and disposition- to see who we're have to kill off to get through the following year. Therefore this year we will begin the long road –for theme's sake let's call it the Yellow Brick Road- to becoming a healthy self sustaining fellowship. In the upcoming weeks we will announce the dollar total we will be trying to reach and we will keep track to see how well we are doing in meeting our goal. If the recent crisis has taught us anything it's that we can't keep our heads in the sand but we need to become clear and accountable for ourselves and the things around we value. Now we realize that in these hard times not everybody can give a lot of money. Many of us are without work, staying with friends and family, and trimming the fat where we can to make ends meet.

Our situation reminds me much a story I once heard. (The names have been changed to protect the innocent.) The story that comes to my mind is the parable of the older but stylish lady. It goes something like this- Jesus is hanging out at the back of the sanctuary because it's his turn to help with coffee hour watching all the rich people put their big wads of cash into the collection plate. When he notices an older but very stylish lady put two very small coins into the collection plate. He looks to one of his entourage and says. "Mark my words. All of those rich people were able to give a lot because they are rich but, the stylish older lady, even though she was poor, gave more because she gave everything she has and now she has no money for the \$3 lunch."

I love this parable because it cuts to heart of giving. Unfortunately, the question the parable never answered was why did she give so much? That little tidbit is left for the listener to ponder on their own. The way I see it is that she gave because she believed so much in the work. This is what we're going to ask the congregation to do. We need to know how much do we value this very special community around us and how much we are willing to give –and maybe sacrifice- to keep it healthy and self sustaining. Just like in the Wizard of Oz sometimes it's easier to sit down and smell the poppies, sometimes it's easier to believe that we don't have the brains to get where we need to go, sometimes it's easier to just sit beside the road, and other time it's easier to run from our shadow because we're truly scared of what giving might entail. Ok, you'll be hearing from the Stewardship Committee during the next couple of months and join us for our first steps down the Yellow Brick Road at Sunday Service on October 23. Let's have a great meaningful stewardship season!
