REV. GAIL'S SPACE

A World of Gray

One of my favorite singers in the 1960's was Oscar Brown, Jr. He wrote a wonderful song about how, when he was young, the world seemed so well delineated. There were good guys and bad guys and the choices seemed clear cut. He notes that as he got older he noticed the shadings of gray started to be more obvious in an adult world where black and white or good and evil seemed much less clear. He sang, "how does a man find his way in a world full of gray?" It seems more and more that we are living in a world where the nuances, complexity and the many shades of gray in life are no longer grasped by our leaders. We are hearing so much of, "We are so good. They (fill in the blank) are so evil" and the "You are either for us or against us" rhetoric these days. The kind of conservative thinking, whether religious or political, that takes this absolutist stance is so opposite of the liberal world view which is really about loving the gray areas.

My colleague in Lakeland, Dr. Robert Tucker, says that ultimately being one of the much maligned liberals is not about holding certain positions. He notes that intelligent, responsible liberals can and do have honest and valid differences on every issue. He adds that being liberal is about recognizing the undeniable fact that life is complex, that there are no simple questions or simple answers, that few things are very truly black or white, that the color of reality is gray- many, many different shades of gray! I totally agree that seeing gray when others see only black or white is proof positive that you are a liberal. It has nothing to do with muddled waters or muddled thinking. It has to do with having perfect visual acuity.

Right wing thinkers hate ambiguity and shades of gray above all else, and yes it is hard as Oscar Brown, Jr. sang, "to find your way in a world full of gray". But the ability to find our place in that complex and nuanced world is what makes us adults. Let us salute ambiguity and the shades of gray in this new year and recall the Unitarian Universalist mantra, "I could be wrong!" in all that we do. Let us not fall into the trap of another kind of absolutism to counter the current social climate. Let us continue to revel in ambiguity. Blessings on our struggle in a world full of gray.

Congregational Budget Meeting January 4, 2004

The meeting was called to order by Gary at 12:35PM, with a quorum of voting members present. Following remarks by Gary, the 2004 budget as approved by the Board was presented by Steve Zorn. The budget reflects real world numbers and shows a deficit of \$28,444.50. Subsequent to comments made by Rev. Gail, Ronnie and Erik, discussion was opened on the budget.

Following discussion, a motion was made to move the budget to a vote and was seconded. Another motion was made to amend the current budget and was seconded.

Three motions followed. The first by Sharon Page, requested that the interest income of \$9,000 be removed from the budget. The motion was seconded. On the vote, the motion failed.

A second motion was made by Bill Rusch to increase the Publicity/Advertising budget from \$1,500 to \$2,500, thus increasing the total budget deficit to \$29,444.50. The motion was seconded. On the vote, the motion carried.

The third and final motion was made by Carole Wilschke, requesting that \$1,500 be added to the Choir Director budget, thus increasing the total budget deficit to \$30,944.50. The motion was seconded. On the vote, the motion carried.

The original motion moving the budget to a vote was entertained with the two line item increases and total budget deficit reflected. On the vote, the motion carried.

Unpacking Deepak

Well, I've been in my new house for a few months now, and I've finally come down to the last box or two that got left in the closet. Among them was a box of books, some I have read, some I haven't, so I thought I would pick one out since they may have thought they were unloved in my closet. Chance had it that I picked out *The Seven Spiritual Laws for Parents* by Deepak Chopra, and it inspired me - being here in my new surroundings, feeling a new awakening of my spirit and wanting to share that with Jennifer and Amy, my daughters. After reading the book and visiting our own www.uucfl.org, I was happy to learn that Deepak Chopra was coming to Florida. I plan to attend his lecture, *The Spontaneous Fulfillment Of Your Desire*.

The Seven Spiritual Laws... is a light and practical little handbook with some actual exercises that parents can do with their children to help them on their own spiritual journey. It is also very Unitarian Universalist. It presents views from Emerson and Maharaj, to Buddha and Hans Christian Anderson, and more.

The book focuses on making children feel like everything really is possible, and helping them realize that they are here for a reason. These are empowering thoughts that our children may only hear from parents and a select few sages in their lifetime, but ideas that are the seeds that allow them to explore and fulfill their own human potential. It also shows how to teach children that in order to get something you first need to give it, and to ultimately enjoy the journey and reflect on its meaning. I realize more and more, as time passes by, as Jennifer has passed into teen hood, that my children are here to carry on after me. I need to slow down some of the craziness that life can become to regroup, and to share more of that kind of time with the girls. We have to talk with our kids, listen to them, plant seeds with them and allow them to plant their own before those precious few years of childhood get away. We also need to know, as Chopra puts it, that we can "guide children but never control them." Let's make sure we give them the tools to let them really feel like they are the ones capable of making a difference.





SUNDAY SERVICES

Feb. 1 – Late Night T.V. – Despite her reputation as a bit of an intellectual, Rev. Gail has a dark secret. She spends a great deal of time channel surfing late at night. In this service she will try to justify her bad habits by trying to find some useful lessons in sitcom reruns, old Hallmark specials and other offerings not found on PBS, CNN or the History channel.

Feb. 8 A Natural History of Love – Preparing for Valentine's Day, Rev. Gail will address everyone's favorite four letter word. She will try to find something new to say about the history and future of an emotion that is infinite in its variety.

Feb. 15 – Roots and Wings VI: A UU Mysticism- Rev. Gail will take a look at the sense of transcendent mystery and wonder that Unitarian Universalists draw on, as set down in the first of our living traditions. She will also look at more traditional approaches to mysticism and transcendence in other religious traditions.

Following the service we will have time to ask additional questions to a panel of faith leaders.

March 7- A Unitarian Universalist Style Tour of the Criminal Justice System- Guest speaker Mara Taub of the National Coalition for Prisoners Rights and author of Juries: The Conscience of The Community will help us understand the jury system and the need for prison reform in our country. Prison Reform was voted on at the 2003 General Assembly as an item for Study/Action within UU congregations. Mara will be available for further dialogue after the service.
