DOING THINGS FOR THE LAST TIME

I had a bit of a shock after church on Water Sunday when Susan Moss said that even though it got off to a bit of a confused start, she had really enjoyed the breaking up of the Water Ritual into the four directions themes, with a poem to introduce and call in water fitting each direction. She said, "I hope you do it again next year" and I said sure, that it had seemed to go well and that most people had understood they could come back a second time if they had something else to say that fit another direction's theme. Then, after we finished talking, I realized that for the first time in 17 years I will not be doing Water Sunday at UUCFL next year. I am going to need to leave that outline for the four directions and themes and the poems with the Sunday Services Committee. They can suggest the idea to your new minister but he or she may have very different ideas about how the Water Ceremony should go.



Indeed, after this awakening I realized that every event or special holiday party that we share together this year will be our last time doing them with me as part of the UUCFL community. Since I have been here for so long, it also occurs to me that many of you have no idea of the extent to which this long relationship we have had will simply cease to exist at the end of June 2016. In order for a new minister to able to claim his or her rightful position as the new spiritual leader of a community, it is considered appropriate ministerial ethics for the departing minister to wish everyone a fond farewell, unfriend them on Facebook, change his or her email and phone number if feasible and just sort of disappear. I can't come back and do your Memorial Service or even attend it unless I get explicit permission from the new minister. I could not do a wedding or child dedication or any other ritual. After a reasonable interval, normally a couple of years, I might be invited back to preach or for some special occasion, especially if I am named Minister Emerita before I depart, as would be the norm for someone with my lengthy tenure. It may sound a bit harsh to some of you and to be honest it is a bit scary to me. I have worked and played and laughed and fought and struggled with many of you for over a decade and a half, but we need to clear the slate on both your side and mine so that new things can come in. You need to learn to like, love, hate or be indifferent to your new minister without my ghost, as it were, hovering around. Be assured that I will be following your progress on the website, through the Journey, etc, and cheerleading for you and wishing you well just as I have always continued to do with my first congregation in Flagstaff, AZ.


I went back to Flag two years after I left and attended a service and went on a picnic with folks and saw a few people for lunch or dinner. Then I had very little direct contact with anyone there for almost a decade. I stayed in occasional touch with a few members who had left the Fellowship and moved elsewhere and I kept track of the ministers coming and going over the years. In 2012, when the Justice General Assembly was held in Phoenix, I decided to go up to Flag for a few days but I did not really contact many people ahead of time. Within minutes of registering for GA, I had run into a dozen former congregants, including a woman I had worked with closely on many projects and who just happened to be in charge of the upcoming worship service. So after 13 years, I got to return and preach in the congregation that made me a minister and so graciously ordained me in May of 1999. They had changed a lot and not at all. I was amazed that so many people I had known were still there. Of course some had passed away, many had moved away from the area and some had simply stepped out of Fellowship life. There were lots of friendly new faces. They had all seemingly heard some nice things about me. They had heard that I was funny and that I had done a lot of work in the community. Even a few people who had not been my biggest fans when I served there appeared to have developed more charitable feelings about me over time. I imagine that some of you might say similar things about me to new people I might meet one day. A bunch of old and new people took me to lunch and we talked UU stuff and it was all good, and that is how it will be with us. All will be well for all of you and for me if we do our work well this year and say our goodbyes fully; our paths will likely cross again. That is how things go in the Unitarian Universalist Tribe. I just thought we should start preparing now for this long good bye. It will be hard but it can be beautiful.

Pacetti represents a culmination of the best of the American and British traditions. Martin Simpson, Richard Thompson, Joni Mitchell and Merle Travis are touchstones to Pacetti, and while there are strong elements of the American primitive school of guitar wizardry throughout his work, there is a powerful raw emotionality evident as well an earthy sensuality more reminiscent of a Greg Brown or

a red-dirt blues master than of a musical academician.

October 4– Religion at a Turning Point— At a couple of previous times in human history, shifts in the religious landscape on a large scale have taken place. These changes have tended to be paradigm shifts and to have taken place in many locations at similar times. Many are saying we are somewhere in the cycle of a new world-wide shift. Rev. Gail will examine what happened in the last "axial age" and compare with what is going on now.

October 11 - Healing the Broken Places— Most of us at different times feel wounded in body, mind, spirit, or soul. How can we move toward healing some of the holes and broken places in our lives and how can we move toward developing the skills to help others do so? Rev. Gail will open up these questions and wrestle with some suggestions.

October 18 – How to Create Church
Communities that are Healthy Systems – We often compare churches to family and say the people in the church are like extended family. However, we all know that families come in all varieties, some happy and highly functional and others not so much. Many of the same dynamics that apply to helping families become healthier can also be applied to churches. Rev. Gail and friends will share some of the exciting insights of this work in today's sermon.

October 25 - A Samhain Ritual for Unitarian Universalists— UUCFL Treasurer Donna Guttierrez once again offers a service in the ancient Pagan tradition. Join us for this special day that will include a Day of the Dead altar. Bring pictures and objects related to those who have passed on.

November 1 - The Blues and Poetry– Long a lover of the many forms of the blues idiom, Rev. Gail will take a new and different look at this all-American poetic and musical expression. We will have live and recorded blues music and enjoy a new take on a major influence on American life.
