### **From Your Board President**

**Eight themes that unite us** is the title of one of Rev. Gail's favorite sermons. It was delivered at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of New River Valley on September 9, 2001 by the Rev. Christine Brownlie. Rev. Gail asked Steve Lange to read it to our congregation during our August 11 Sunday service.

My first observation is that Steve is such an excellent reader that I for one forgot that I was being read to. Such was his enthusiasm and command of the text.

My more extensive observation is that this sermon speaks volumes to the challenges that many of us experience when asked what we Unitarian Universalists stand for and believe.

What follows is my less-than-perfect review and summary of Rev. Brownlie's clear rendering of some of the commitments that we share with each other. I hope that this will help those who were present more clearly focus their understanding of the usefulness of these ideas. I'm also hoping that this presentation will help share Rev. Brownlie's gift with those who were not present on the 11th.

#### The eight themes:

**Mystery.** We recognize that no person or dogma has all of the truth. There is a tremendous mystery to existence and we are committed to remaining open to its unfolding beauty

**Revelation continues:** Revelation is not done. There is no book or artifact or person who has the final verdict on the important, essential issues of life and spirituality.

**Variety:** We are committed to variety in ideas and to a variety of people in our midst. We believe that personal faith must be freely chosen not compelled. This commitment to variety gives loving voice to freedom and tolerance.

**Divine seed in every person:** We may not all articulate this idea quite this way but we would all agree that it is the duty of our church and of us all as individuals to encourage the unfolding of each individual in our congregation to bring to fruition this seed of the best that is in us.

**Mutuality:** I can think of no better way to sum this up then to repeat a portion of the affirmation of faith that we say each Sunday:.... "To dwell together in peace, to seek the truth in love and to help one another."

**Acknowledging the negative:** We do not blind ourselves to the evils and injustices in the world around us. In fact we Unitarian Universalists have a well-deserved reputation for seeking out and attempting to address the important and troubling issues of the day. We see it as our duty to combat unjust laws and to advocate for institutional changes to bring about a more humane and equitable world.

**Engagement:** This commitment follows naturally from the first six. It is a basic willingness to get involved in the world in support of the potential for world transformation and healing. We unapologetically stand for the good as we understand it.

**A commitment to the sacred here and now:** Someone once said that God lives only in the now moment. Our free faith celebrates the integrity of the present moment whenever we are together in Sunday service or community service.

The richness of this sermon goes way beyond my humble attempt to paraphrase it here. But I believe that these themes serve to raise our awareness of our common bonds and our common community of ideas and commitments.

### **Rethinking When to Call the Minister**

At least every other year I tend to recycle some version of what is widely known as the "When to Call the Minister" column. Since I will be on sabbatical for a couple of months at a time this year, it may feel at times like I am playing sort of a "now you see me, now you don't" game with the congregation. However, we all know, I have a cell phone, an email and a Facebook page so I can always be reached and or followed. Although I don't universally accept all friendship requests on FB because I don't want my feed to get too overwhelming, my profile is public and I often post mini-blogs and photos of where I am and what I am doing. Unlike some UU and other ministers, I will accept calls and emails from all members and friends even when I am on vacation, study leave or sabbatical so I will always be with you in a sense.

- \*When you don't know me, but would like to.
- \*When you have problems, you would like to discuss about your job, children, marriage, or anything else where a sympathetic ear might help.

- \*When someone close to you has died or is critically ill or you are dealing with a significant loss of some kind.
- \*When you are planning to be married or divorced.
- \*When you would like a child dedicated.
- \*When you are pregnant and glad you are or wish you weren't, also if you want to be pregnant but aren't.
- \*When you feel ready to join the congregation.
- \*When you have concerns or questions about the church.
- \*When you have religious or spiritual questions.
- \*When you are seeking to deepen your religious life.
- \*When you are upset with me or want to express and appreciation.
- \*When you have won the lottery or received a large inheritance and want to make a large donation to the church.

To add a little humor to this stew, retired UU minister, Rev. Marilyn Sewell added several reasons NOT TO CALL THE MINISTER:

- \*When you want to give him her/him the "real scoop" on another member.
- \*When you want to explain that you will have to cut your pledge in half because you are spending the summer on a trip around the world.
- \*When you want to tell her you didn't like what she wore in the pulpit last Sunday.
- \*When you want to tell him/her that one of the reasons you are a UU is that you hate organized religion (our movement is, after all, a part of organized religion.)

Please take all this with a sense of openness and humor and remember that I am a servant leader not a CEO. Although I have my own strong ideas about what my ministry should be, primarily my job is to serve the congregation. I might also remind you that essentially my employer is the whole congregation not just the Board of Trustees.



As a guitarist Livingston employs a style which is a unique mix of ragtime, country blues, and early swing. Comfortably at home with the musical style of the 1920s, he sometimes adds his interpretation of classic songs from the period to his performance of originals.
